

Nine area citizens, most of them school officials, agreed at the conference there are three fundamntal benefits to be derived from launching the junior college plan - a psychological one, in which some students would be enabled to more easily make the transition from high school to college; a financial one, providing low cost education close to home; and an economic one, stimulating potential growth of all concerned communities.

It was emphasized that under requirements of the law under which a junior college district must qualify for existence in Texas, the possibilities of founding a college in this area will hinge on the fully shared co. operation of a geographic area of three, and possibly four counties.
