A birth defects study center, the first of its kind designed to combine cliniby funds from the New March of Dimes, which is now engaged in its January campaign for contributions to fight three major crippling diseases including, besides birth defects, arthritis and polio.

Medical experts say that birth defects are the biggest unmet childhood medical problem in the United States today There are more than 600 differ ent kinds of birth defects, or "congenital malformations," as they are called by doctors. They range all the way from harelip and clubfoot to mental retarda

tion. Some 250,000 American babies are born each year with one or more significant birth defects; and about half of this number are doomed to a lifetime of serious illness or crip-pling. About 34,000 infants each pling. About 34,000 infants each year are stillborn because of these afflictions, or die within the first month of life. Medical science as yet has few clues to the causes of these disorders that occur before birth; and there are few known methods

Shrouded in Superstition

The study center in Colum-bus' famed Children's Hospital thus represents the beginning of the New March of Dimes attempt to solve a medical problem that has heretofore been largely neglected by re-search. It is a problem that has for centuries been shrouded in fear, superstition and shame. By tackling this issue with a three-pronged program of re-search, patient aid and training of skilled medical professionals, the March of Dimes organiza-
