

Under the brooder all pigs relax instead of pushing and fighting for the body heat of the mother.





Since 1938, when The National Foundation (for Infantile Paralysis) was organized, a total of \$325,200,000 has been spent for direct patient aid to polio victims. In 1960, the bill was about \$13,250,000 for some 40,000 of the polio-stricken. Although the Salk vaccine has been available to the public for five years, patient-aid costs remain high chiefly for those stricken before the vaccine was developed, or for those who since 1956 neglected to get inoculated and thus contracted polio.

Be used for research. Since 1938 The National Foundation has allocated \$64,600,000 on its broad-based international research program which has produced, among other outstanding achievements, the Salk and Sabin polio vaccines and, incidentally, two Nobel prizes. In 1960, research funds are estimated at \$5,000,000 coverting The National Foundation's three health areas of birth defects, arthritis and polio.

More than twice that sum, or \$10,400,000, is needed for research.
