

Washington can then kick the props out from under the economy of a city or state simply by denying the aid.

The President now proposes to use denial of aid as a threat to make cities and tsates come to heel and the civilrights question. His proposal explodes the old argument that federal gifts would never be used to get political control.

This feature of the President's program should awaken Americans to the danger of becoming dependent on aid.

So far they've been shown the bait. The President proposal now lets them see the hook behind it.






