A sometimes serious side effect of nose troubles can be involvement of the sinu-

ses that empty into the nose. If you must wash out your nose, use mild salt water and put it in drop by drop. Don't pour it in as though you were flushing out a catch basin.

If you want to be extra safe, flameproof the costume by dipping in a simple solution of seven ounces of borax and three ounces of boric acid in three quarts of warm water. Adults can help make Halloween safe too. If you're out in your auto, slow down and drive with extra caution. Keep your pets in the house, especially dogs. Leave porch lights burning, front and back. Halloween "Trick or Treat." can be a memorable night for the small children. Help to make it a safe night.

These brush fire actions are going on around the universe. What ever happened to our stake in LAOS? That's the country that gave the crisis boys in Washington their daily diet for awhile. The Potomac politicians have apparently swept the Cuban problem under the Blue Room rug. But the American people are waiting for action and leadership. MOVING FORWARD-rocking chair style? Yep, up and down! In the meantime American soldiers continue to bleed and suffer and die for WHAT?
