## THE VALUE OF TEXAS CROPS

Probably what is to Texas farmers the most interesting of the preliminary statements of the thirteenth census bureau has been issued by the Department of Commerce and Labor. The state ment places the aggregate value of Texas crops for 1909 at \$248,420,956.

The leading crops of the state in 1909, ranked in the order of valuation, were: Cotton, \$162,735,000; corn, \$50,565,000; hay and forage, \$12,824,000; rough rice, \$6,087,000; kaffir corn and milo maize, \$3,785,000; oats, \$3,700,000; wheat, \$2,881,000; sweet potatoes and yams, \$2,198,000; potatoes, \$1,825,000; and peanuts \$1,077,000.

Cotton, in the ten years from 1899 to 1909, increased 2,969,812 acres, or 42.7 per cent. In 1909, 316,704 farms reported 9,930,179 acres, producing a yield of 2,445,175 bales, valued at \$162,735,041. Corn showed an increase of 112,362 acres, or 2.2 per cent. In 1909, 288,357 farms reported 5,130,052 acres with a yield of 75,498,695 bushels, valued at \$50,564,618.

Hay and forage increased 373,943 acres, or 39.9 per cent. In 1909, 128,758 farms reported 1,311,967 acres producing 1,257 tons, valued at \$12,824,433.

During the last decade there was a wonderful gain in rough rice. This cereal increased 227,986 acres, or more than twenty-six fold. In 1909, 1,155 farms reported 236,697 acres with a yield of 8,914, 518 bushels valued at \$6,086,604.

Kaffir corn and milo maize were a close second to rice in gain, increased 550,571 acres or more than twenty-four fold. In 1909, 23,631 farms reported 573,384 acres, producing 5,860,444 bushels, valued at \$3,785,463.

## HASKELL ELKS LODGE STEADILY GROWING

OVER EIGHT THOUSAND DOLLARS SPENT IN EQUIPMENT, FURNISHINGS AND IMPROVEMENTS. MOST ELABORATE LODGE HALL WEST OF FORT WORTH. MEMBERSHIP COMPOSED OF HASKELL'S BEST CITIZENSHIP. PREPARING FOR A GREAT OCCASION SOON

It was the pleasure of the writer to be permitted last Monday afternoon to spend a while in the Elks' lodge hall at this place and view the new furnishings of the lodge. It will be remembered that several months ago the building in which the Elks' hall is located caught fire and most of the furnishings of the lodge were destroyed or injured in the conflagration. Since then the lodge has raised several thousand dollars and remodelled and re-equipped the hall even more elaborately than it was before. It is a very beautiful and inviting place. The reception hall contains a good heater, comfortable chairs and other conveniences. The library is furnished with chairs, settees, tables, etc., and quite a number of the latest periodicals are kept on hand for the benefit of the members and their friends to while away the time in reading and restful ease. In another room are three billiard or pool tables, with all the necessary requisites for a nice social game. The main lodge hall is furnished with plenty of chairs and tables, the furniture all being mission finish, and a fine piano with player. The floor is of maple and waxed. The ceiling is of metal, beautifully decorated and presents a very attractive appearance. Every room

is furnished with elegant light fixtures, in the main entrance hall being an elaborate chandelier. Every convenience imaginable is at hand, even to both ladies and gentlemen's toilets, cloak rooms, etc. One noticeable feature was, there is no "locker," which is usually found in halls of this kind. The membership here is composed of the best citizenship of Haskell and this feature of "lockers" is forbidden. Another commendable feature of the lodge is, that every Thursday afternoon the lodge hall is turned over to the wives, daughters and sweethearts of the members to be used by them exclusively, and on each Thursday night the members with their wives, daughters and sweethearts are permitted to meet together in social intercourse. The ladies frequently avail themselves of this opportunity to spend a few hours in reading and innocent games such as "42."

Since the organization of this lodge in Haskell, it has spent over \$8,000 in equipment and improvements, and this is no little sum to be turned loose in a town this size by one organization. Truly this is a very helpful institution to the town in many ways. It is the most elaborately equipped lodge hall west of Fort Worth and a credit to Haskell.

The membership consists not

only of a large per cent of the best people of our own city, but many persons from the different towns surrounding Haskell are members and frequently visit our town when the lodge has its social events. Only last week Messrs. John B. Baker and C. M. Hunt spent a day at Hamlin and Stamford in the interest of the lodge and as a result six applications for membership are awaiting the approval of the lodge, which shows it is steadily growing.

In this connection we will say that the members are making extensive preparations for a delightful social event on Thanksgiving night, Thursday, November 30th, at which time only the members and their wives, daughters and sweethearts will be present. Not only are those of Haskell who are entitled to enjoy this occasion expected to be present, but those from the different out-of-town places will be expected, and a very enjoyable time is anticipated.

The following Sunday, after this event, which will be December 3rd, in the afternoon, the lodge will hold their annual memorial service, for which time a very interesting program will be arranged, announcement of which in detail will be made later.

## TEXAS INDUSTRIAL NOTES

Bonds amounting to \$100,000 have been authorized for the construction of gravel roads in McGregor District, McLennan County, and work will begin immediately.

New York capitalists are said to be behind a movement to develop the Texas Gulf Coast as an all-the-year resort, with a half million dollar hotel at Port O'Connor.

There are in Texas 194,993 farmers owning their farms and of these 131,161 own their own farms free of incumbrance.

The total yield of the peanut crop of Texas in 1909 was 1,076,296 bushels.

Reports from Amarillo indicate that extensive acreage is being devoted to wheat in the Panhandle this fall.

Texas produced in 1909 97,936 tons of alfalfa, valued at \$1,339,314.

It is reported that a large cotton mill will be operated at Post City in the near future.

El Paso is constructing a \$100,000 sewerage disposal plant.

The Frisco has bought 2500 refrigerator cars for handling South Texas products.

Fort Worth capitalists have organized an oil company with a capital stock of \$25,000.

The Wichita Falls Motor Com-

pany, the only automobile factory in Texas, has a capacity of ten cars a day.

Corpus Christi citizens are considering plans for a railroad north from that city to Fort Worth and one to Port Arthur.

Fort Worth cattlemen have organized a \$300,000 company for the purpose of erecting stock yards at Houston.

A large party of bankers from the leading cities of Europe and America were in South Texas last week on an inspection tour.

The Pierce-Fordyce Oil Company will begin soon the erection of a million dollar plant at Fort Worth.

It is reported that plans are being formulated for a terminal line to Beaumont with shuttle trains to Port Arthur.

Rice cultivation in this state the last decade increased 227,987 acres, or more than twenty-six fold.

Members of the Inland Waterways League of Texas and Louisiana will stop at all the principal cities between Houston and Washington when they go to the National River Congress, which is to be held at the capital in December.

It is stated that the Santa Fe will spend two million dollars at Sweetwater for terminal facilities and office buildings.

The kaffir corn and milo maize acreage in Texas increased from 22,813 acres in 1899 to 573,384 in 1909.

## UNCLE SAM TALKING TEXAS

Uncle Sam is talking Texas again. He has announced the results of his 1910 census on swine and finds that our herd has increased in value 43 per cent during the past decade.

The statistics pay a glowing tribute to the business instincts of the Texas hog. In fact Uncle Sam has proven by mathematical calculation that the hog has more business ability than any other animal in his barnyard. The reports show the value of the Texas swine per head in 1910 at \$4.98 and 1900 at \$2.86, making an increase in value of \$2.12 per head during the past decade.

The Texas hog has led the movement in high cost of living and has demonstrated his ability to take care of himself on the market which makes him a powerful factor to Texas prosperity.

### The Profits of the Packers.

The Bureau of Census has just issued a preliminary report on slaughtering and meat packing and, apart from the statistical information contained in the report, it definitely fixes the profits of the packers which many of our citizens have been curious to ascertain. The report shows the packers paid out for material and supplies \$1,201,828,000 and the value of the finished product was \$1,307,568,000 making a gross profit of \$168,740,000 and from this amount was paid in salaries and wages \$71,699,000 and a miscellaneous expense of \$42,840,000 leaving a profit to the packers of \$54,201,000 on their investment. It means that on a steer bought for \$20.00 the packers have made an average profit of 90 cents, which is equivalent to 4½ cents on the dollar. The high cost of living is certainly not traceable to the packers.



When the industrial spirit is dormant progress is at a standstill. Let's look out for and try to induce industries to come to our town.

Texas is so resourceful that in her agricultural products and industrial opportunities that, if necessary, she could feed, clothe, and house every person in her domain. Come to Texas.

It is certainly a happy faculty to possess to be able to look pleasant and say pleasant things under adverse circumstances, and the person thus possessing such a disposition ought to be thankful. If possible, cultivate the habit of saying only the pleasant things.

The success of any community is dependent upon the unity of the people of that community. When we boost our neighbors business we help our own. Let's not be selfish and want everything for our own coffers, but remember that in helping our neighbors we are helping the community at large, and likewise helping ourselves. "United we stand, divided we fall."

Texas is an old state, one of the oldest in the south, but the vastness of her domain, the limitlessness of her opportunities and resources, make her practically an infant in industrial progress, and it is all present and future here. In order to have a brilliant future we must have a substantial present, as we have a glorious past. Every citizen in the state can aid in her development, and should.

Texas is big in area, in developed and undeveloped wealth and in citizenship. But there is room for many others here. Probably when the crowded centers of the East learn of our bigness, so diversified in interests, with such a variety of climate and soil, the magnitude of opportunities for those who till the soil and derive a livelihood from the products of the soil, there will be a greater influx of immigration to our state. We have the room and the welcome. Come to Texas and particularly to Haskell county.

There are people in Haskell, as in most all other places, who contribute nothing to the support of the churches or even speak well of the christian religion. It is lamentable that such is the case. Suppose the religious services were stopped in this town for a year and the churches closed? What do you suppose would be the condition of the town, and how long would you want to live in it? Then if the influence of the churches and the christian religion is worth so much to a community, is it not right that you should at least lend your influence in its behalf even though you will not contribute of your means to its support.

### Be Careful What You Do and Say.

As a rule children think their parents are the greatest, the smartest and the best people on earth. How often do you hear a boy say that his father knows everything and what father dees is all right. Likewise the girl will say and think that mother knows more about this and that than any woman in town, or the world for that matter. It is right that they should have this opinion of their parents. But how much more necessary is it that those parents should be worthy of such childish confidence and faith. One should never forget that his conduct has a great deal more to do with molding his boy's character than his teachings. Your laugh, your frown, your dress, your walk, your greetings, your goodbys, your comings, your goings, your habits at the table, the fireside, the tones of your voice, make an impression upon that boy's mind which will last throughout his life, and not only your boy but perhaps some other father's boy. Be careful what you do and say, if you desire to exert an influence that there will be no diminution of its force.

If you could go out and see graders and improved machinery putting the public roads in good condition would you call it retrogression? We hardly think so. Anyone with a grain of common sense would call it progression. But when you go out and see gulleys and other hindrances to travel in the roads you would call that retrogression, and it would be rightly named. Let's have better roads.

It is all right for a nation to be prepared by naval equipment and munitions of war to protect the rights and interests of the country. No patriotic citizen will gainsay that. But the truest greatness of a nation does not come from the force of arms. Such greatness is usually short-lived. The greatest and most substantial glory of a nation is its industrial prosperity. Prosperous farms and flourishing factories are the greatest assets to a nation.

The quarterly reports of W. D. Falkner, sheriff; Emory Menefee, county treasurer; J. W. Meadows, county clerk; T. C. Browning, J. P. Precinct No. 5; Guy O. Street, district clerk; E. W. Moser, J. P. Precinct No. 6; R. C. Whitmire, commissioner Precinct No. 1; W. J. Fairis, commissioner Precinct No. 2; J. B. Davis, commissioner Precinct No. 3; G. W. Sollock, commissioner Precinct No. 4; M. B. Moore, J. P. Precinct No. 4; J. S. Post, J. P. Precinct No. 1; J. E. Walling, tax collector, were approved.

Petition of W. T. Hines, et al. to discontinue public road was rejected.

Petition of S. M. Davis, et al. for bond election in Precinct No. 1. for the sum of \$75,000 for the purpose of building, macadamizing, graveling and claying public roads, was granted, and the election ordered to be held December 23rd, 1911. The following presiding officers were appointed: Haskell, S. A. Hughes and C. C. Eastland. Rule, G. W. Hutto and J. E. Cland; Rochester, A. B. Carothers and Paul Zahn; O'Brien, T. B.

Whitford and W. J. Teaff; Cliff, R. A. Tankersler and Sewell; Jud. A. J. Lett and M. H. Helton.

The county judge was ordered to execute a deed to J. F. Pinkerton for 5 acres out of the northeast corner of sub-division 5, and take in exchange deed from J. F. Pinkerton for 5 acres out of the southeast corner of same subdivision.

An order was granted allowing the janitor to draw his salary each month instead of quarterly.

An order was granted to correct the following tax errors: A. A. Simmons, G. W. Bishoffhausen G. W. May, Wichita Valley Railway Company. We understand there were a number of others whose taxes were adjusted, but we did not get their names.

F. D. Harris and O. B. Norman were employed to count the words in the new index in the county clerks office.

The court ordered \$6,000 worth of bridge warrants to be issued to Austin Bros. as part pay on the Rule and Sagerton bridges.

The petition of W. H. Doyle, et al. asking the court to have a crossing placed on the Orient railroad near Rochester was granted.

It is the order of the court that the furnace at the jail be not used any longer, for the reason that the same is not satisfactory.

(c) Plaintiff says that the defendants ought not to have or maintain any right, title or possession of, in or to any of the aforesaid premises against the plaintiff, because he says that he, the plaintiff, claiming to have a perfect right and title to said land, being all of the lands and tenements embraced in the boundaries and field notes above set out, has had and held peaceably the land claimed and adverse possession of the same, cultivating, using, and enjoying the same for a period of more than ten years before the commencement of this suit, and after a cause of action in favor of defendants against the plaintiff and those under whom he holds for the recovery of said land accrued, if any such cause ever existed.





Plaintiff further shows to the Court that he is unable to set out the claim or claims of the several defendants or the pretended claims of the several defendants herein, for the reason that their several claims or pretended claims are unknown to this plaintiff, unless said defendants are asserting some kind of a claim as the heirs of the respective parties herein-
