The funds advanced are for the difference between what a student may be getting from his parents or from working and what he needs to stay in school. It will apply all the way through a professional school such as medical school.

Repayment is carefully controlled, on either a monthly or similar basis. And when a student becomes delinquent, the State Attorney General's office is emplowered to sue him for the debt anywhere he may be. This and other safeguards placed in the measure have satisfied the Legisltature that the state tax payers will never have to make up any

Adiministration of the program is through the new Texas College and University system co-ordinating board and the loan officers of the college or university at which the student attends. 

2 eggs 1 cup chopped raisins 1 cup chopped nuts Coffee Glaze

Empty cake mix into bowl. Add coffee and eggs. Blend at low speed just to moisten. Beat 3 minutes at medium speed of mixer or with a spoon until creamy. Mix in raisins and nuts.
