The team was sent there to investigate integration in the public schools. HEW found the system not up to snuff and left some criticism behind. San Angelo schools were integrated long ago at the high school level and peacably without coercion. The school system today is integrated at all levels, again without any fuss or bother. But HEW sent a patrol in anyway and a test resulted. The test was not satisfactory to HEW's policemen. Board members in San Angelo cannot be responsible for the low score the students made on the tests. School officials can bend over backwards, make all requirements and regulations equal, but they cannot create instant intelligence. Equal educational advantages such as class size, curriculum and duplicating facilities can be provided but the background - the home surroundings - the characteristics of the colored people, can never be changed to suit






