### 125 Collon Producers In Stanton Meet

Some 125 cotton producers and interested persons attended a boll weevil meeting held at the Cap Rock auditorium in Stanton on Tuesday, October 8, at 8:00 p.m.

Charles Need, area entomologlist from Ft. Stockton, with the Agricultural Extension Service, discussed, the boll weevil situation in Martin county, and recommendations for control. Ken Lindsey, area agronomist, also with the extension service, discussed defolation and desication of

The specialists, after making a survey of the cotton producing areas of Martin County designated the southeastern part of the county as the "hot spot" that needed immediate attention. This would include cotton south of a line drawn parallel to the railroad track and two and one - half miles north. Producers should also be on the lookout along the eastern part of the county, up to the Andrews - Big Spring high-

Recommendations are that all producers in the "hot spot" area should defoliate or desiccate the cotton as soon as possible and put insecticide in with material to kill all adult weevils to keep them from overwintering. The insecticides recommended will mix with all defoliants or desicants, except chlorates.

If it is late cotton and not enough is ready to kill or de-(Continued on page 8)

Veterans Administration

(Editor's Note: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning benefits their government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.)

Q — I will be separated from military service to late to enter school this fall. Must I start school in the spring semester or can I take it easy this year and enter school in the fall of 1969? I don't want to lose my G. I. Bill entitlement. A - You can delay entering school without losing your G. I. Bill educational entitlement. However, you must use this entitlement within eight years of separation from military service.

- The premium on my \$10,000 National Service Life Insurance policy has been waived because of total blindness. I have now been sufficiently trained, however, so that I can anticipate working fulltime. Will this affect the waiver of premium?

A-No, the waiver of premium continues where the veteran suffers certain disabilities classified as Statutory, which includes total blindness.


Q - I got out of service without an injury and was discharged three months ago. Last month, however, I came down with an unexplained fever, and I wonder if it could be malaria. Can I go to an Army hospital to check on this and to get required treatment?

A - Since you have been separated from service, the Army cannot treat you. However, you are eligible for examination and treatment at the nearest Veterans Administratration hospital or outpatient clinic.
