





ast week the mayor of Washington, D. C., a black man, was tardy in calling for memorial services for the late MARTIN LUTHER KING. The population of Washington is predominately black. Riots rocked the city on three occasions since the death of the non-violent, but sometimes violent, KING. Store windows were smashed in Washington and crime statistics skyrocketed. MAYOR WALTER WASHINGTON did not ask the Distriet of Columbia merchants to close their stores in memory of KING as he had requested be done in honor of GEN. EISENHOWER earlier in the week. So, the threats started pouring in on city hall and in the end a large number of merchants closed their stores for fear of destruction of their property. The idea of comparing DWIGHT DAVID EISENHOWER, a patriot, wartime leader, and the 34th President of the United States to a black man who never wore a uniform but spent most of his life in planting the seed of discontent in this country is about like comparing JESUS CHRIST to JUDAS ISCAR-

rese nothing wrong at all in granting to black men and women everywhere the right to honor the memory of the preacher of revolution from Montgomery, Alabaha. But for the entire nation to mark either this man's birthday or the date of his long anticipated and predicted denuse is ridiculous. Former President HARRY TRUMAN and FBI Director EDGAR HOOVER described the majority sentiment in this country concerning KING and his activities long before his murder in Mem-

The truth about the matter is that the MARTIN LUTHER KING movement was practically over before he was killed. The successors of KING are not men cut from the cloth big enough to get the movement back off the ground. KING realized this and that is the reason he was in Tennessee engaging in a small-type garbage strike. He needed the limelight and publicity before he started a big march on Washington. The violent black miltants had already quit his cause and KING was desperate to find favor with another group among his own race. His death put a period to any plans he had at the time of uncertainty of his new course. The march—the disgraceful and doomed-to-failure camping out on govcenment grounds led by RALPH ABERNATHY, self-proclaimed successor to KING, was a public joke. ABER-NATHY resided in a plush Washington, D. C. hotel while the more stupid camp followers, some of them said to have been paid to show up, paraded around in mud kneedeep to a tall Indian. Yes, the man KING built a movement in the form of a revolution and his dream—the one about turning America upside down died with him in the darkness of the delta there in the city built close to the banks of the Mississippi River in Memphis, Tennessee.

D NEWMAN interviewed WHITNEY YOUNG, bose L Urban League leader Monday morning and YOUNG remarked that the country needed a weltane program which would pay a candidate for the poverty pay and at the same time preserve his dignity. There is no such formula. When a man takes a handout he gives up his idignity. This is especially true if a person plans to make a career out of getting his name on the relief rolls and trying all kinds of tricks outside of working to keep the gravy flowing. YOUNG insulted the intelligence of the taxpaying people (a dwindling breed) when he called for a measure of dignity to be maintained along with a bountiful blue check from Uncle Sam. The cure for poverty is work. The best way to deflate inflation is to close up the free money mills and send a part of the multitude back to the cotton fields.


