They reported that the Department "threw out for comment" some alternative approaches to a cotton program, but was careful not to let anything in writing leave the discussion room

However two things emerged as dominant factors in the meeting.

First, the kind of cotton programs which seem to be getting the most serious consideration from the Department, are programs which would involve eliminating acreage diversion payments, have non-recourse loans at about the same or below the current 20.25 cents basis Middling-inch, provide for a domestic alloment well below the present 65 percent of total allotment, permit some form of "open end" production above the cotton grown on domestic areas, and provide in some way for "land retirement" as a condition for program participation.
