County Agents Column

By BILLY REAGOR County Agent

Proper grazing distribution and the degree of forage utilization are factors often overlooked by ranchers in their range management program. Stocking rates may be cor-

rect for the ranch, points out County Agent Billy Reagor, but if grazing is not properly distributed, some areas may be over used while others remain almost untouched. This means maximum net returns are not being received from the management program

Now, at the end of the growing season, is the time to look over your range and see how you are doing with your distrbution and ultilization.

Are areas near water heavily used, while the far corners of the pastures stand unused? Is your salt supply near the water source? The solution to this problem is to place the salt in areas that have been underutilized. Moving salting locations several times during the year will increase grass utilization in the out - of - the - way places.

Research has shown that salt should be considered as a distribution tool rather than as a nutrient.

The degree of utilization during the growing season is often too high, Numerous experiments throughout Texas have shown that a rancher can expect greater returns from moderate than from either from heavy or light graz-

A good rule - of - thumb is to "take half and leave half" of the current year's growth. If this sounds wasteful, remember that the same gress blades which feed livestock or wildlife must also feed the plant and store sufficient food material for early growth next spring, says the county

The present inflation has its roots in the fiscal and monetary mistakes of earlier years. To achieve price stability we will have to presevere in the present policies of fiscal and monetary restraint. deep as 70 feet. Ranch manager Ray Jackson has learned to live with it. His is a light-stocked operation supporting 1,400 cows and 125 bulls, which include a registered herd of 150 cows producing 140 calves a year on the

average. That's 93 percent and close to perfection. Lean and cattle-wise, Mr. Jackson is strong in his preference for cottonseed cake as a supplemental feed. Good grass plus the P.E.P. (Protein, Energy, Phosphorous) content of the cake during the winter maintains strong, healthy cows and bulls and, therefore,

big, growthy calves.

Aware of the many faddish feeds on the market today, Mr. Jackson insists, "I get better performance using one pound of cottonseed cake, which contains 41 percent protein, than three pounds of 20 percent range cubes.

Young bulls from the pure-bred Angus herd get a special ration on the Powell Ranch. As calves, they are placed in a special feed lot at weaning time and given grain, cottonseed hulls, cottonseed meal and molasses. After a month or two, they are turned out to pasture, to self-feed on cottonseed hulls, meal and cake for a week or so to get used to eating the cake. Thereafter, the young bulls get two pounds of cake per head per day until they're old enough to join the bull herd

or be sold.

Mr. Jackson gets \$450 or more for an 18-months-old breeding bull.
