It's cotton planting time on the High Plains, and officials May 14 of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., figure farmers in the producer organization's 25 counties surrounding Lubbock will seed May 14 - Ice Cream Supper, Service No. 2, Abilene something like 2,270,000 acres to the area's number one inome producer.

Acres available for planting to cotton, as indicated by the "sign-up" with Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation May 22 - Junior, Cadette Bridging Ceremony, Dyess AFB Service offices prior to March 20, total 3,522,890. And cotton industry people are agreed generally that at least 90 percent of this total will actually be planted to cotton. However, acreage that remains for harvest naturally will be reduced by hail and other adverse weather during the growing season.

In the past, abandonment of about 10 or 11 percent of planted acreage has been considered "normal" in the Plains, which would leave about 2,050,000 acres of cotton in the area. May 30-31 Last year the 25 counties planted about 2,150,000 acres to cotton, only to have hailstorms and other violence from the heavens cut that figure almost 28 percent, to an estimated 1,555,000 acres by November 1.

Assuming that harvested acreage in 1970 will total 2,-050,000, and assuming a yield equal to the 478 pounds of lint per acre averaged from 1963 through 1968, production potential this year comes out to 2,045,720 bales, including 21 pounds each for bagging and ties. 





The Waco tornado, hitting in that city in 1953, took more lives but I questioned whether the storm damage bannered the property loss suffered in Lubbock Monday night.

On May 11, 1953, I was enroute by train from Longview to Temple. It was necessary to change in Dallas from the T&P to the MK&T-the Katy line. My business in Temple was to keep an appointment I had at SCOTT & WHITE CLINIC. About fifteen minutes out of Waco, a city along the route, a tornado struck that town and 114 persons were killed. Our train finally made it through Waco and on to Temple after a great deal of debris was removed from the track as The Texas Special crawled through McClennan County. Just 17 years to the day, another tornado struck Lubbock, and we all know the story of the death, damage and destruction reported there Monday night, May 11. There is no question about the fact that the month of May seems to be the ideal time for spawning tornadoes.
