

The Attorney General's Con- 711. sumer Protection Division enforces Texas' Deceptive Trade Practices law which presently permits the Attorney General to enjoin certain false, misleading, or deceptive acts or practices in the conduct of trade or commerce. The Attorney General has received some 4,000 complaints in the past year from Texas citizens who feel that they have been defrauded. Such complaints are processed and, if necessary, legal action is instituted to enforce the consumer protection laws. The Attorney General's office is not permitted to render legal advice or opinions to individual citizens, nor may this office obtain refunds for individuals who have been defrauded. The Attorney General may, however, obtain an injunction against those firms which violate the Deceptive Trade Practice Act. If the firm continues its deceptive practices, The Attorney General may secure up to \$10,000 in penalties

violation of the injunction. Law enforcement in this area is emphasized by my office because compliance with fair and honest trade practices benefits not only con-




