

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



A gay pattern weaves. Violets are peeping

by MRS. B F. COBB Many bedding plants will be set in the garden in the next few days. Precaution should be taken against damage from wind or sun, when the vegetables tender flowers or are first set out in the garden. Protection can be had by using hot caps, paper sups, tin cans or milk cartons. Be sure to anchor the covers well. This can be done by piling dirt close around the cover, or by putting

rock on top of it. Milk cartons, with the top cut off and windows cut near bottom, make real good plant conditioners Invert the carton over the plants. This places the windows at the top. Turn the openings north and south, so the plants get air, but no sun. Close the windows at night. Do this for three nights Then move the whole carton off the plant for two or three hours a day. The weather permitting, plants should be ready in a week, to grow without any




