

Oilfield Burglary Solved; Tools Found

Martin and Ector County Sheriffs Department combined their talents this week to arrest a man and woman and recover \$1,945 worth of stolen oil field equipment.

Martin County Sheriff Dan Saunders told the Stanton Reporter Wednesday that Ector County law enforcement officers had arrested Frank Cousins, 39, and Marjorie Vanover, 22, on burglary charges. Saunders has also issued a warrant for another Odessa man, in connection with the case.

According to Saunders, the burglary occurred May 8 on the Bruce Frazier Lease in

Mustang Draw at Courtney. The thieves broke a lock on a tool house at the rig site, and made away with a portable power plant, acetylene torch with gauges and hoses, a hand saw and eight two-inch high pressure well head valves, valued at \$1,400 alone.

The stolen equipment was recovered by Ector County Sheriffs Deputies Monday night at a motel in Odessa. Saunders said the two were in jail in Odessa pending their transfer to Midland, where Martin County is holding prisoners while the new courthouse is being constructed.

THE HITCHING POST

There is nothing like a trip to New Mexico to make you appreciate our fine Texas highway system. We journeyed to Carlsbad last weekend to attend press day activities for the summer opening of "The New Cave".

New Mexico certainly has more than its share of beautiful scenery and things to do, but the roads which transport the majority of the state's tourists certainly leave much to be desired.

In case you've missed the pure thrills of motoring over New Mexico roads, a trip to the "Land of Enchantment" will provide you with a glimpse at cattle guards on state highways, no stripes on mountain roads and chug holes which could swallow an elephant.

New Mexicans realize their road system plight, however, and are currently trying to get the message over to their government. Let's all hope they succeed.

We were treated like royalty during our stay in Carlsbad, however, and spent one of the most enjoyable weekends ever among the Guadalupe Mountains and Carlsbad Caverns.

Early Saturday morning we were on our way to Rattlesnake Springs Campground for an outdoor breakfast. Helping to make the setting more familiar was a healthy wind which added to the excitement of eating out.

Following the official welcome by Carlsbad officials we formed a lengthy caravan and headed for "The New Cave". The recently-opened new cave is completely unimproved, meaning there are no lights and no paved paths.

Before you can explore the cave, there is a mile and a quarter hike to the entrance, some 500 feet above you. If you're lucky enough to make the climb without dropping over, which we were, you can then start a mile and a half walk through the cave, guided by park rangers.

Hikers have to provide their own flashlights, and either hunting or hiking boots are recommended for the trip. Once inside we discovered what it feels like to descend 200 to 300 feet into the side of a mountain, scrambling, climbing and

Coggin. Charles Blocker was also named to fill an unexpired term.

An advisory board of Carrol Yater, Bud Jones, Glenn Brown, Russell McMeans, Jimmy Wheeler, Bruce Key, Terry Franklin, R. C. Vest, B. F. White and F. O. Rhodes was also named, with Rhodes named chairman.

Tollison stresses the importance of the advisory board. "The advisory board is an important part of this organization, because of the past and present contributions of its members and there's genuine interest in Stanton and Martin County," Tollison said.

The Martin County Industrial Foundation is a non-profit organization that exists for the purpose of making our community a better place to live, Tollison reported.

For the foundation to work and help Stanton and the county grow and prosper, it must work together. "We need a combined effort of these people's talents and energies to form a combined effort to stimulate economic development of the community and cause things to happen which will make Stanton a better place to live and raise a family," Tollison asserted.

"Stanton and the county has a tremendous amount of assets for a community of its size. Our geographical location, transportation, climate, friendly people and an economic base of agriculture and oil industry make it arid to beat," the new president continued.

Tollison concluded by asking for the support and help of all Martin County residents for the industrial foundation.

School Board Okays Equipment

Meeting in its regular monthly meeting Monday night the Stanton Independent School District Board of Trustees approved the purchase of furniture for the business department at Stanton High School.

The board voted to buy 25 adjustable chairs at a cost of \$575, 10 multi-purpose tables for \$575, five new typewriters for \$947 and two electronic calculators for \$200.

With the addition of the new equipment school officials hope to create a multi-purpose business department at the school, which will instruct typing, business law, shorthand and bookkeeping all in the same room.

In other action the board accepted a bid from Eiland and Associates Insurance Co. of Stanton for insurance on CVAE equipment. Eiland was the lone bidder on the insurance and bid \$242 for \$6,000 worth of coverage.

The board also discussed workmen's compensation insurance, which all school districts have to have in effect by July 1, but a decision on which way to proceed on the insurance was

tabled until next month's meeting.

Utility Hikes Listed

A rate increase by the Colorado River Municipal Water District and increasing operating costs are directly responsible for the utility rate hike which Stanton and the surrounding area will receive June 15, according to Stanton City Manager Jimmy Mathis.

Mathis cited a rate hike by the CRMWD, which supplies water for the Stanton area, spiraling cost of supplies and petroleum products, as well as new minimum wage standards as the main reasons for increasing utility rates locally.

"The city council met last Tuesday night and approved the new rates, which should bring in the \$17,000 more dollars which we will need above last year's operating budget," Mathis commented.

"The council certainly favored a slight increase per family on utility rates over a tax increase," Mathis continued.

People who live inside the city limits will begin paying \$6 for the first 3,000 gallons of water used instead of \$5, with the next 53,000 gallons going for 90c per thousand instead of 85c as before. Consumption over 56,000 gallons will cost 65c per gallon instead of the old 60c.

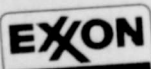

Outside the city limits, city water customers will now be paying a \$9 minimum instead of an \$8 fee. Other water rates for outside of town will be the same as inside the city limits.
Raw water users will now be paying a \$6.75 minimum charge for the first 3,000 gallons instead of \$5 and over 3,000 the water will go for 85c per thousand.
Sewer rates will now be \$2.75 per month in the city limits \$3.75 outside the city limits, instead of the recent \$2.50 in the city limits and \$3.25 outside of town. Garbage collection rates were increased from \$1.75 to \$2 in the city limits and from \$2.50 to \$3 outside the city limits.
Commercial rates on garbage were increased 10 percent, with a \$3.50 minimum per place, which varies with the number of pickups requested each week.
According to Mathis' estimates the new water prices will bring in some \$13,000, while new sewer rates should produce \$2,100 and new garbage rates also \$2,100. These hikes should total \$17,700, enough to meet this year's budget.
