# **Industrial Foundation Acts** To Ease Housing Shortage

ing to ease the critical housing shortage in Stanton, the Martin County Industrial Foundation decided Friday to look into the possibility of forming a corporation to construct new homes locally and endorsed a free want ad campaign by the Stanton Reporter.

Meeting Monday at the Belvue Restaurant, the board discussed the housing crisis locally, and reviewed a new and bright economic picture for Stanton and Martin Coun-

Foundation president Don Tollison told those on hand that many new families will be moving to Stanton as the oil business picks up locally, and also told of a prospective new industry for Stanton which would employee 30 people

Tollison told the group that Stanton should be thankful to have all of its housing occupied, but that the lack of housing was critical. have problems with school teachers finding houses, and Continental Oil Co. has expressed a desire to move 14 families here. I believe there is an interest in Stanton for upgrading the housing situa-

tion," Tollison said. Tollison reported that the foundation has been talking with a contractor in Fort Worth about building speculative housing in Stanton, but that the builder wanted some local people to go into the project with him.

Several members of the foundation and its advisory committee expressed interest in forming a corporation to help fund a new housing project in Stanton and Paige Eiland was appointed chair-man of a committee to look

into the idea. Ed Lawson, B. F. White. Finley Rhodes and Carrol Yater were also appointed to the committee, and pledged immediate action on the for-

mation of such a corporation. Terry Neill, publisher of the Stanton Reporter, then volunteered free "For Sale" and "For Rent" classified

to home owners across the county who have homes for sale or rent which are unoc-

Neill told the group that by renting some of the unoccupied homes locally and by getting others to sell vacant louses, some of the housing shortage could be eased in the coming weeks. Tollison and the group gave their full support to the idea

# Council Undecided On Funds

Discussion of what to do with more than \$20,000 in Federal Revenue Sharing money and a land transaction with Cap Rock Electric Cooperative in Stanton highlighted a meeting of the Stanton City Council last

Wednesday night. The council discussed several avenues of spending the funds, including the purchase of an insect fogging machine, a backhoe attachment, a new street crossing,

work on the city hall, and improvements on the city parks.

After several hours of discussion on the revenue sharing funds the council decided postpone action on the matter until a later date. James Eiland, manager of

Cap Rock Electric, appeared before the council to ask that the city sell his company, subject to legal requirements, a small tract of land north of Cap Rock's main

According to Stanton City Manager Jimmy Mathis, the 90 X 27' lot now contains one of the city's street warehou-

ses and is footage out of the

Humble Tract. The council considered the poor condition of the present building and talked about various ways of replacing it

at another location. Councilman R. O. Rhodes then made the motion that the city sell the land to Cap

Rock for \$10,000 subject to meeting all bid requirements required by law.





AUSTIN, Tex. - The end may be in sight for the historic Texas Constitutional Convention which began last January.

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Delegates have been zipping along since they came back to work after the May 4 primary election, and only one major the catchall, controversial General Provisions was left to complete on tentaive passage at mid-week.

After that, of course, lawmaker-delegates must go back through the whole package on final consideration. And only those articles receiving a twothirds majority vote can be submitted to voters.

Actually, the convention has until the end of July to complete the entire revision

However, President Price Daniel Jr. has expressed hope for a much quicker windup. Daniel, of course, pushed unsuccessfully for agreement on a proposed revision before the primary election, then had to settle for a month's recess during April.

Convention leaders debated whether to submit a \$1 million budget - enough to last until mandatory July adjournment or to budget piecemeal, hopeful of getting through within a few

Daniel preference for budgeting through July, then "giving a lump of it back" on earlier

However, Administration Committee Chairman Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon said he was concerned that ap-propriating through July would tempt delegates to stay that

When the air ed for optimum use reaches the evaporator, it is cooled and moisture is removed by condensation. A thermostat maintains the desired temperature. Grills direct the conditioned air so it circulates efficiently without causing drafts.

Room air conditioners can also be set to ventilate and exhaust air from the room, otes the Texas A&M University System specialist.

'The cooling capacity of room air conditioner is expressed in British Thermal Units (BTU's). This refers to the amount of heat the unit can remove from the air. In other words, an air conditioner with a cooling capacity of 6,000 BTU's per hour is capable of removing 6,000 BTU's of heat every hour."

Allen emphasizes the importance of chosing a room air conditioner of the proper ooling capacity. "If it's too arge, it won't provide proper omfort conditions. If it's too small, it won't do the job expected of it. An oversized unit will cool a room in a hurry but will cut off while the room air is still highly humid. A smaller unit could do the same cooling job while performing its dehumidifying function properly.

Room air conditioners are available in a variety of sizes, models and types. Some of the smaller units can be used on a wiring circuit that is only partialy loaded, points out the engineer. However, it is usually a good practice to provide a separate circuit for a toom air condiioner.
