### Heavy Damage Downtown Early Sunday

No injuries but heavy property damage resulted following a two car collision about 1:24 a.m. Sunday, reported Police Chief Ed Sanders.

Two autos, driven by Luisa Medrano Martinez and Eddie Lee Zaricor, collided near the 2nd and North Main intersection and the auto driven by Mrs. Martinez went out of control and skidded into the front of the Buckle and Bow shoe store knocking out two large plate glass windows and doing structural damage to the store front.

Chief Sanders said that there were no tickets issued as a result of the collision. Apparently the two cars sideswiped each other near the 2nd Street intersection and the 1979 Fairmont driven by Mrs. Martinez went out of control and went on north down Main, jumped the curb and came to rest in the store front of the shoe store.

The Fairmont sustained heavy damage and only light damage was done to the 1979 Buick driven by Zaricor.

## County Oil, Gas Revenues Climb

The sale of crude oil and natural gas from Sherman County wells in 1978 boosted the county economy and accounted for \$56.4 million of the \$17.1 billion value placed on Texas production last year, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the top producing counties of Texas, the Dallas-based Association said the county ranked 74th among the 202 counties having marketed production valued at \$100,000 or more, not including the sale of natural gas liquids.

The county's wells produced 167,000 barrels of crude oil, valued at \$1.6 million and 54.3 million Mcfs of natural gas, valued at \$54.8 million. Owners of royalty in the county received \$7 million as their share of the output, the Association said.

"Considering the shortfall in total US petroleum production relative to our nation's energy needs, production from every Texas county is more vitally important today than ever before," said the Association's president, H.B. (Hank) Harkins of Alice, an independent producer and drilling contractor.

In addition to paying local,

million.  
Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 10 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$87,000 in 1978.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas operators spent a reported \$7.6 million in the drilling of 16 wells, including one wildcat, or exploratory, well. This effort resulted in the completion of one oil well and 10 gas wells, although some \$2 million was lost in the drilling of five dry holes.

Principal for Stratford High School, grades 9-12, and his secretary is Mrs. Donna Gilley. His office is located in the high school building on the east end of the school complex at 8th Street.

Supt. Bass emphasized that all Kindergarten students must have complete shot records and in addition to DTP, polio, measles and Rubella. The students must also have a mumps shot.

Supt. Bass also announced that all students under 8 years of age, through 1st Grade, must have the mumps shot.

All school personnel who were employed by the Stratford Independent School System last year do not have to have a TB Test, but any personnel who did not work or teach here last year must have a current TB Test on file.

Bass emphasized again the importance of the shot records stating that the state law allows no deviation from the law on this point.

On the first day of school the following supplies will be required by grades:  
Kindergarten--1 box Kleenex, 2 Number 2 pencils, 1 box Number 8 crayons, 4 oz bottle Elmer's Glue, mat or rug for bus students.

1st GRADE--4 Number 2 pencils, 1 pair pointed

scissors, 2 boxes Number 8 crayons, Big Chief tablet, Borden Paste, hand towel, mat or rug for rest, one big box Kleenex.

2nd GRADE--1 pair sharp scissors, large bottle Elmer Glue, large box Kleenex, 24 crayolas, 2 Big Chief tablets, 2 Number 2 pencils, eraser, red lead pencil.

3rd GRADE--spiral spelling pad or small spiral notebook, red lead pencil, wooden ruler, notebook paper, regular pencils, eraser, scissors, Elmer's Glue, crayons and Kleenex.

4th GRADE--Elmer's Glue, crayons, scissors, ruler, loose leaf paper & notebook, Number 2 pencils, red lead pencils, ballpoint pen, Kleenex, spiral notebook, box of watercolors.

5th & 6th GRADES--notebook paper, Number 2 pencils, map colors, large box Kleenex, blue or black ballpoint pen, red marking pencil, gym clothes.

7th GRADE--notebook paper, Number 2 pencils, blue or black ballpoint pen, red lead pencils, map colors, 3 large spiral notebooks, Texas road map, gym clothes.

**Smokers Get Warning!**

**DUST IN THE LUNGS**

How long does the dust we inhale stay in our lungs? It depends. On whether or not we are smokers.

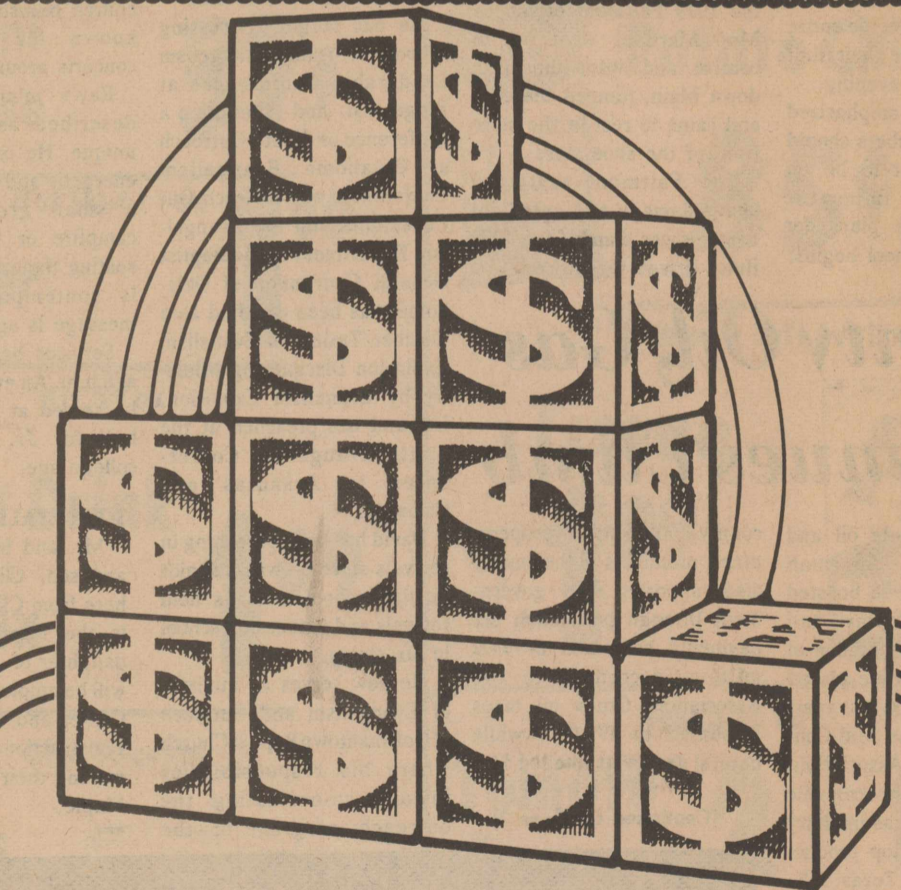
In an experiment using presumably harmless trace amounts of magnetic dust, researchers checked to see how long the inhaled dust stayed in the lungs. What they found was a shocking difference between the ability of the lungs of smokers--compared with nonsmokers--to remove the dust. After an entire year, smokers still retained 50 percent of the dust originally deposited in their lungs!

Nonsmokers, on the other hand, only retained 10 percent of the original dust. Smokers retained five times more of the dust than nonsmokers!

The experiment, conducted by Harvard and M.I.T. researchers, not only illustrates how clearance mechanisms in the lungs are impaired by cigarette smoke. It also shows that inhaled particles can stay long periods even in the lungs of non-smokers.

According to the American Lung Association, many lung diseases are caused by assaults in the air we breathe--smoke, germs, chemicals.

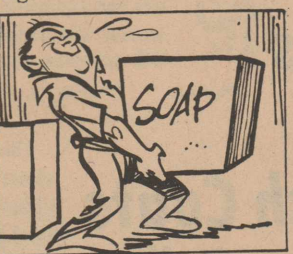

Mr. and Mrs. John Spence, missionary appointees to Honduras, Central America, will speak at the First United Methodist Church Sunday morning at 10:45 a.m., announced Rev. Jim Terry, pastor.

John and Audrey Spence are missionaries with World Gospel Mission, an interdenominational missionary organization with 335 missionaries and homeland staff working in 18 areas around the world. International headquarters is in Marion, Indiana.

John was born in Atwood, Kansas, and spent part of his childhood on the prairies of eastern Colorado, living with his family in a sod house. While John was still a child, his father died in a prairie fire. At 17 years of age, John found Christ and began attending Miltonvale Wesleyan College in Miltonvale, Kansas, where he met Audrey. Four years later, after their marriage, he began

## CHICKEN SOUR CREAM ENCHILADAS

- 12 corn tortillas
- 4 C green chile sauce\*
- 3 C minced cooked chicken
- 1 lb. Jack cheese, grated
- 1/4 C minced onion [optional]
- Salt to taste
- 1 pint sour cream

Heat tortillas on a hot griddle and keep warm under a tea towel. Or heat the tortillas in oil and drain well on paper towels. Mix one cup of the chile sauce with the chicken. Put 1/4 cups of the chicken mixture on each tortilla and roll it up. Place in an oblong baking dish. Cover the enchiladas with the grated cheese. Add the onion, if desired, and salt to taste to the remaining chile sauce and pour over the enchiladas. Bake at 350 deg. F. for about 20 minutes. Smother with sour cream and return to over for 10 minutes, or until everything is hot. Serve immediately. Serves 6.

## \*GREEN CHILE SAUCE

- 1/4 C salad or olive oil
- 1 clove garlic [optional]
- 1/4 C minced onion [optional]
- 1 T. flour
- 1 C water
- 1 C diced green chile
- Salt to taste

Saute garlic and onion in heavy saucepan. Blend in flour with wooden spoon. Add water and green chile. Bring to boil and simmer, stirring frequently, for 5 minutes.

- 2 C [16 oz. can] tomato sauce with onion, celery and green pepper
- 2 C [1 lb. can] undrained tomatoes
- 1 1/2 C [16 oz. can] drained whole kernel corn
- Dumplings
- 1 C pancake mix
- 1/2 C cornmeal
- 1/2 C water
- 2 T. cooking oil
- 1 egg

In 3 quart casserole, crumble ground beef. Sprinkle with chili powder. COOK, uncovered, 5 MINUTES, stirring once. Stir in salt, onion, tomato sauce, tomatoes and corn. COOK, covered, 5 minutes or until mixture boils. Meanwhile, prepare Dumplings by combining pancake mix, cornmeal, water, oil and egg; mix until well combined. When mixture boils, spoon dumplings on top of mixture. COOK, covered, 7 to 8 minutes or until center dumpling is no longer doughy underneath. Let stand, covered, a couple minutes before serving. 8 servings.

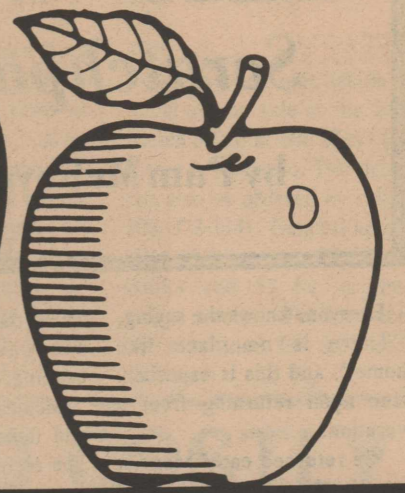

**Ranch Slates Labor Day Rodeo**

At Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, nearly 390 pint-sized cowboys are getting ready for their thirty-fifth annual Boys Ranch Rodeo, a traditional Labor Day weekend event.

In anticipation of record-setting crowds for the two performances on September 2 and 3, the Ranch rodeo arena has enlarged general admis-

sion sections that will accommodate an extra 1,500 people. Most sections of the arena have been covered to provide for the comfort of the rodeo guests. Another added attraction will be Texas-sized barbecue beef plates that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$2.00.

About 150 boys will be contestants in the rodeo. They

will compete in bareback bronc riding, and also be trying for the best time on Brahma bulls, steers, calves and stick horses. It is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation, as the only contestants are boys riding professional rodeo stock under R.C.A. rules. The rodeo is also a reunion for the approximately 3,000 boys who have lived at the Ranch since

1939. Reserve box seat tickets for \$3.50 are on sale at the Boys Ranch office at 600 West 11th Street in Amarillo. The tickets can also be ordered by calling 806/372-2341. General admission tickets are \$2.50 for adults and \$1 for children under twelve. Performances are scheduled for 2:30 each afternoon.

**CURSED AND COSTLY**

The increase in fees is necessitated by the increase in the costs of chemicals, equipment and labor, said Dr. Dale Pennington, soil chemist in charge of the soil testing laboratory at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center here. It is the first fee increase in several years, Pennington said.

Beginning September 1, the Extension laboratories will charge \$4 for each regular soil fertility test, which now costs \$2. A test of soil fertility plus testing for zinc, iron and manganese will cost \$7 instead of \$5. Testing for soil salinity, which now costs \$4, will increase to \$7. Irrigation water tests will cost \$8 instead of \$5.

The new fees will be charged by the Extension laboratories at College Station and Seymour as well as Lubbock, and the labs at Stephen F. Austin University and Wharton Junior College, said Dr. Uel Stockard, state Extension agent, College Station. Kits and instructions for collecting soil samples continue to be available free of charge at county Extension offices.

Even with the fee increase, these tests are still a good investment for the farmer, rancher and homeowner, Pennington said. The increasing costs of fertilizers and fuel used in applying them make it more important than ever to know exactly what is needed and in what amounts to improve the soil for maximum yield, he said.

In the last 12 months, the Lubbock lab processed 8,168 samples. The lab here serves 82 counties in West Texas.

That cursed and costly motorists' bugaboo, the pothole, is a major spring concern to State Department of Highways and Public Transportation maintenance forces. Starting when water seeps into a crack in the road surface, maturing in the freeze-thaw cycles of a cold, wet winter, Texas potholes pop out almost faster than maintenance crews can repair them.

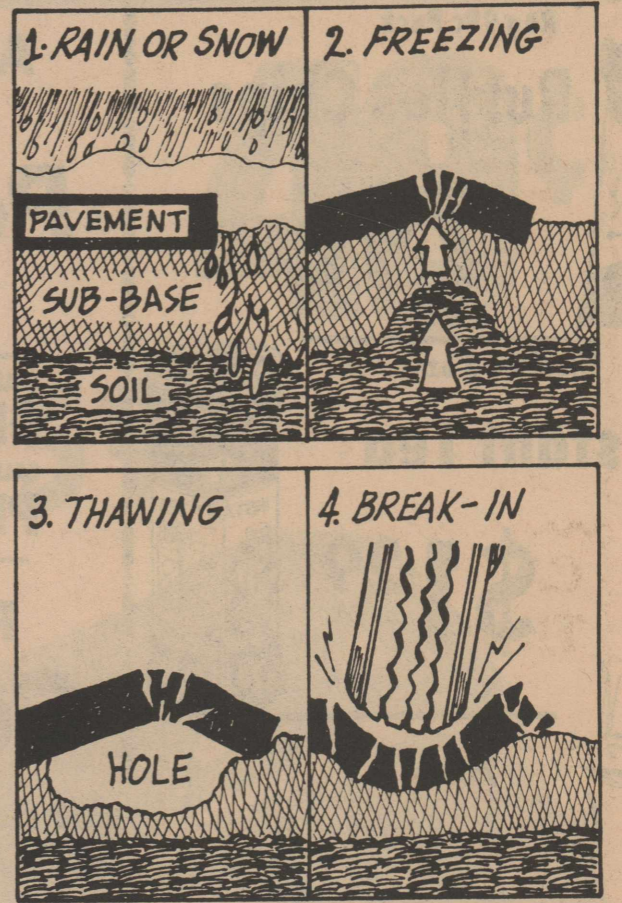
But department crews are taking the offensive by putting in extra efforts on every dry day and in the use of innovative equipment.

The department's Abilene district, for instance, is using a "port-a-patcher," a mobile recycling machine that makes pothole-patching material on the spot by using old chunks of pavement. It also saves energy—the asphaltic material is made from petroleum—in addition to permitting a speed and flexibility badly needed by maintenance forces.

An even easier method is to prevent potholes through frequent resurfacing of highways. But no state in the nation has sufficient funds to undertake such a program.

Potholes are cursed by the motorist when he examines a bent wheel or ruined tire or when he pays for a wheel alignment. They should also be roundly berated for the extra fuel they cause to be used—motorists slow down or stop to avoid them or take a longer route because of them and make that extra trip to a mechanic.

Texas has plenty of potholes after the past winter, although not the 8.2 million recently estimated by The Road Information Program in



a nationally publicized report. That's 114 in every single mile of the 72,000-mile state system. Highway maintenance men point out that TRIP estimators simply took the total amount of asphaltic material bought by the department and divided that figure by the amount needed to repair the average pothole—if there is such a thing. However, the estimators forgot that much of the material purchased by the department was used to resurface long sections of Texas highways.

which credited that state with 1.4 million such road problems. One resident of that northeastern state said there were more potholes in one Maine county than in all of Texas. He further suggested that Texans didn't know how to count potholes—that they were undoubtedly counting every pothole, even those less than 5 inches deep and 16 inches wide.

But no matter how they are measured and counted, potholes in Texas and the nation cost millions of dollars to repair—and more millions in extra fuel.

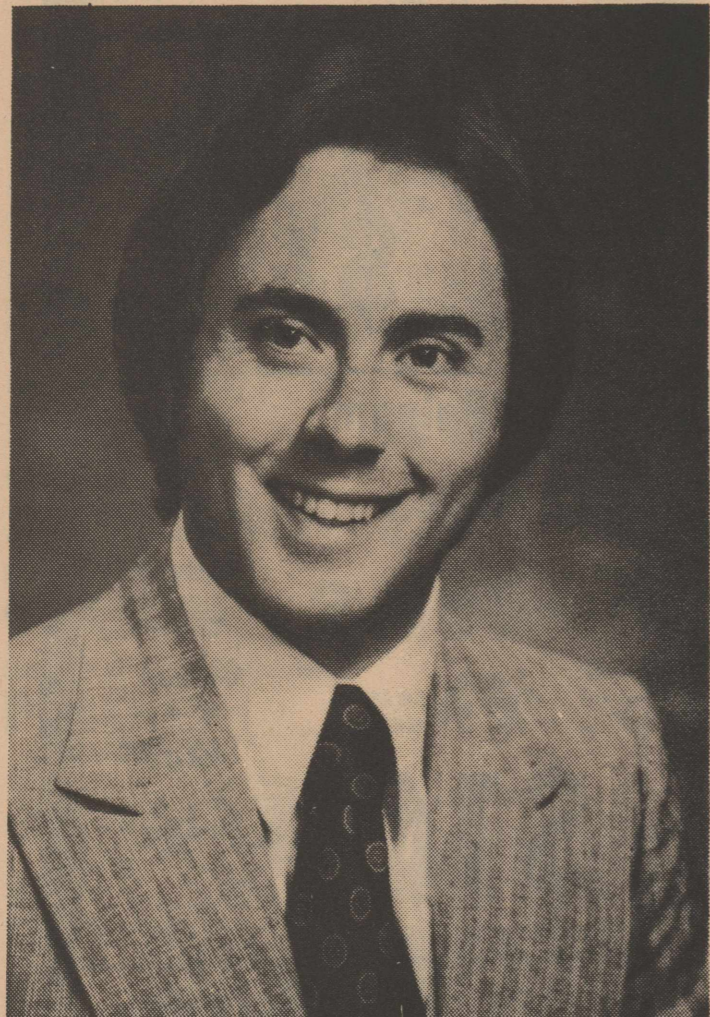

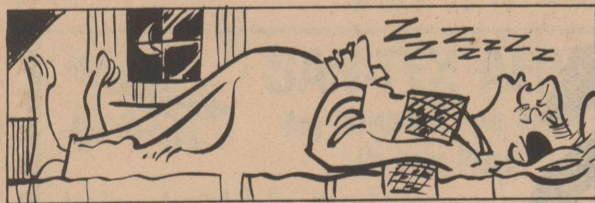

**SPS Gets Grant For Solar Plant**

Berl Springer, president and chief operating officer of Southwestern Public Service Company, has announced that the Department of Energy (DOE) has awarded a grant of approximately \$500 thousand to the General Electric Company and Southwestern Public Service Company to study the feasibility of repowering one of Southwestern's generating units with a solar system.

"This would be one of the largest solar projects in the United States," Springer said. "The grant will fund an engineering study for repowering our No. 3 generating unit at Plant X, near Earth, Texas."

The proposed solar system would utilize a liquid metal-cooled central receiver to repower the 100,000 kilowatt gas-fired unit at Plant X and would be designed to

supply 60 percent of the thermal energy required for the full output of the generating unit.
