

Don't Frankenstein Your Lights

When purchasing electrical decorations, make sure to shop at a reputable retailer and look for the UL Mark. Be sure to check the rating on your extension cords and do not plug in more than the recommended wattage. Use special, heavy duty extension cords for high wattage decorations such as fog machines and electrically-powered inflatable decorations.

**Inspect Decorations with Fiendish Care** 

Inspect all of your electric lights and decorations for damage or wear. Cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections may pose a fire or shock hazard. Replace damaged light strings with energy-efficient LED lights. Look for a red UL Mark to indicate that lights are certified for both indoor and outdoor use. A green UL mark indicates certification for indoor use only.

**Beware of Candles!** 

Candles, especially in a Jack O' Lantern, should be off the ground and out of children's reach. Try battery-operated LED candles for an even safer option.





#### Motivate Kids by Teaching Them 'Life is a Business'

Non-Profit Founder Offers Tips for Raising Kids to Succeed

Welfare may seem like a charitable measure for struggling families. But it's a self-perpetuating trap when it becomes the only way of life parents know how to teach their children, who then know nothing else to teach their own children, says Virgil Brannon, founder of the non-profit I Am Vision Inc.

"Living on entitlements becomes a way of life for recipients when it's handed down from one generation to the next because the family loses any tools it might have once had to forge a life based on self-discipline, achievement and challenging," says Brannon, author of Democratic Coma (www.DemocraticComa.com).

"It's no different from the child who grows up being given material thing he wants, along with excessive praise that's not deserved. One child may be from a poor family and the other from an affluent family, but both are at risk for growing up without the skills necessary for success."

Brannon's non-profit organization mentors disadvantaged children, helping them develop the values, understanding and knowledge they need to be motivated and equipped to succeed. He has found that coaching children to manage their lives as they would a business helps them not only develop good habits and skills, it also teaches them some essential business lessons:

\*Your life is your business: Our business is how we act, speak, the way we dress, how we treat ourselves and how we treat others. Like any other business, it is expected to grow and prosper and to do that, we must invest in it. Part of that is feeding the mind with the information needed to make good choices.

\*The people you meet and the friends you make are your clientele: Treat all people with the respect you would any customer or potential customer. Our relationships can elevate us if people feel their treated fairly, honestly and with respect.

\*The more you provide or produce, the more you advance: Business involves providing a service or product. Business people do not care about excuses; they care about what you have to offer them. It doesn't matter where you come from or what color you are, if you have something they need — and a reputation for integrity -- they will come to you for it.

\*Your appearance means everything: You must look the part to get the part. The secret is to look as though you already have it to obtain what you want.

Parents should teach their children to be business-like and to think like a professional, Brannon says. "That includes giving them the best education possible, including learning at home about history, civic duty and different cultures," Brannon says. "In business, people are expected to display good manners and to communicate with others, from a firm handshake to looking others in the eye and speaking clearly and correctly.





What is 4-H?

4-H is a dynamic, youth organization that provides a safe environment for kids between the ages of 8 (and in the third grade) or 9 to 18 to grow and develop life skills that will follow them into adulthood. 4-H offers learning experiences in such areas as animal, food & nutrition, science, photography, health, and leadership through hands-on, fun, educational monthly club and project meetings.

What does 4-H cost?

In Texas, if a youth enrolls in 4-H between September 1st and October 31st, the fee is only \$20.00 for the year. After October 31st the cost increases to \$25.00. This fee covers a young persons membership fee at the state level, however, depending on the project(s) the 4-H members wishes to participate in, additional cost could be incurred.


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

For more than 105 years, the 4-H Program of Texas has been engaging youth in activities that help develop skills for a lifetime. These skills range from communication to community service and from goal setting to leadership. Regardless of the skill learned, the benefits gathered from a young person participating in the 4-H Program are priceless.

The 4-H Program is nationwide youth development program that has more than 6.5 million youth involved in it annually. Administered in Texas by the A8LIVI AgriLife Extension Service of the Texas A&M System, 4-H serves youth in all 254 counties in the state through a network of 250 County Extension Offices. 4-H is managed jointly by both a professional and volunteer staff. Texas 4-H, the largest 4-H program in the country, has more than 660,000 youth participants and more than 32,800 yolunteers working together to deliver the

more than 95 projects, opportunities, and events offered annually through the program.

4-H is unique in that it offers experiences to the most urban young person and youth in rural areas-by providing the opportunity to participate in community 4-H clubs, learning experiences in school classrooms, day and overnight camps, and other special interest opportunities. Texas 4-H also serves the sons and daughters of our military personnel through the 4-H Military Program located throughout the state, primarily on military bases.

Youth members can participate in a variety of projects in the areas of technology, human sciences, animals and household pets, science and engineering, natural resources, and wildlife. Beyond the excitement of learning something new through a project, youth have the opportunity to participate in leadership conferences, travel the world, become involved in their community through service, and meet new friends in a safe and comfortable setting. A young person's experiences in 4-H makes a difference for a lifetime by allowing them to grow and appreciate the importance of being a good citizen, a strong leader, and a person of ,.. character.

4-H Volunteers play a vital role in the ongoing growth and development of the 4-H and Youth Development Program. They build a special relationship with youth, guiding project learning experiences and offering youth with opportunities to learn and serve their community. Volunteers also serve in a coaching and mentor role for youth, helping build confidence among youth and foster positive youth development. Volunteers also help youth achieve their personal goals and motivate them to continue participating in and

learning from the various opportunities provided through the program.

The relationships built among adult volunteers and youth also have lasting effects. As Retired General Colin Powell stated, "When adults take time to help young people through 4-H, they exert an enormous, positive influence on the lives of youth." From 4-H experiences led by volunteers, youth gain important

leadership, citizenship and life skills that can be applied to daily living, used in their community, in future jobs or when they continue their education. Although it may be years before a youth realizes and truly appreciates

the influence of the 4-H volunteers that served as positive adult role models, one can be certain that volunteers are truly making a difference for life.





#### Safe Routes To School

(NAPS)-According to an old Spanish proverb, you "make the road by walking it." Now, millions of Americans have added a new meaning to that phrase. They're walking and biking to help create safer routes and paths for walking and bicycling.

Why It's Needed

With childhood obesity rates at record highs and school systems offering fewer gym classes, recess time and school-funded sports programs, the commute to school can be a great way to get kids active. Consider this: In 1969, about 50 percent of schoolchildren walked or bicycled to school, while today, fewer than 15 percent do. Over the years, obesity rates have soared among children of all ages in the United States and approximately 25 million children and adolescents-more than 33 percent—are now overweight or obese or at risk of becoming so.

What's To Be Done The National Association for Sport and Physical Education (NASPE) recommends that elementary school students have 150 minutes of instructional physical education per week while middle and high school students have 225 minutes per week of instructional physical education. Since kids are only receiving a portion of that physical exercise time in school, they must seek alternate activities to meet these and the Surgeon General's recommended levels of physical activity in daily

To help, Safe Routes to School National Partnership has created a diverse national community of organizations that advocates for safe bicycling and walking to and from schools throughout the United States.



Walking or riding a bike to and from school can be a great way for kids to keep fit—as long as the route they take is safe and they know the rules of the road.

**Travel Safely** 

Ways to increase the safety of a child's walking or biking trip to school include:

 Teach children to cross streets at marked crossings and to always look left-right-left.

 Young bicyclists should practice the route to school with a parent and know the rules of the road, how to signal and when it is safest to walk their bike.

•Tie and tuck. Don't let shoelaces or pant legs get caught in the spokes.

 Make sure the bike's tires have enough air, the brakes and gears work, the chain isn't loose and bolts are tight.

· Bicyclists should wear light-colored clothing and reflective gear.

 Young riders should always wear their helmets. It should be properly adjusted, fitted and buckled.

See that the community provides safe, well-maintained walkways separate from vehicles and that it installs curb ramps at every intersection and at midblock crossings.

#### AgriLife Extension revamps much-used livestock pest control publication

STEPHENVILLE — One of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service's old standby livestock pest control reference publications has been updated, revamped and split in two. The first installment is now available to the public, said the effort's coordinator.

Dr. Sonja Swiger, AgriLife Extension entomologist at Stephenville, said the original publication formerly known as Managing External Parasites of Texas Livestock and Poultry B-1306, is now being released as two separate publications. The first, Managing External Parasites of Texas Cattle (E-570), is now available electronically on the AgriLife Bookstore http://agrilifebookstore.org and emphasizes pastured beef cattle. The second, Managing External Parasites of Horses, Pigs, Sheep and Goats, will follow next year. She said the poultry component was redone previously and released as Poultry Pest Management (E-445).

"The original work was written a decade or two ago," said Swiger. "It addressed external parasites that attack all livestock and was the reference most AgriLife Extension agents grabbed when questions arose concerning livestock pest control.

"But I wanted to provide more in-depth information on the insect species involved, along with pictures for visual identification, so producers would know without a doubt what they were dealing with. With all the added information, it was clear some of the livestock species had to be dropped to keep the publication manageable.'

The new publication stresses the integrated pest management approach which uses the most effective, environmentally safe strategies available, Swiger said.



(NAPS)-Sooner or later, all car batteries have to be replaced. The good news is that by taking a few simple maintenance steps, you can avoid the cost and hassle of get-ting stranded with a dead battery.

Extreme Heat and Cold Excessive heat and overcharg-ing are the two main reasons for shortened battery life. Heat causes battery fluid to evaporate, thus damaging the internal structure of the battery.

A malfunctioning component in the charging system, usually the voltage regulator, can allow too high of a charging rate, leading to slow death for a battery.

Colder temperatures can also be a problem, increasing the thickness of the engine oil, making the engine harder to turn over and the battery work harder. This makes for harder starting.

**Battery Tips** To help you get the most life out of a battery, the Car Care Council suggests the following:

· Have your battery testedand replaced if necessary—in the fall and spring. This reduces the chance a dead battery will leave you stranded on the side of the






