



Union Pacific Railroad Police work with local law enforcement to bring awareness



On Wednesday March 28th, the Union Pacific Railroad Police were in town for a Railroad Crossing Awareness Program.

Their main objective is to bring awareness to the public about safety when it comes to RR crossings. For several hours they worked with the Stratford Police Department, Sherman County Sheriff's Office and the Texas DPS in an effort to bring attention and awareness. Officers and Deputies were stationed at numerous RR crossings to make sure motorists obeyed the laws as the locomotives came from east and west. Several citations and several warnings were issued throughout this period. Stratford Police Officers made two separate stops where a train was coming, red lights were flashing and arms were coming down as Semi-trucks attempted to make it across the tracks. In both instances, the RR arms collided with the trailers' of the two trucks. By state law, motorists must wait until the arm is completely in the upright position and ALL red lights STOP flashing before driving over the tracks. 





Which Jug of Roundup Should I Buy

After talking with my mom a few weeks back at Home Depot along with several folks around the community, I have come to the realization that not everyone understands exactly what those big, long, extremely hard to pronounce words are on the bottles of pesticides that they buy in the store. Just as important, most homeowners do not understand what the words truly mean, nor the most important part when shopping for pesticides, the little percentages out to the side of those hard to pronounce words. Now I am not saying that you need to become a chemist in order to understand these chemicals, but if you learn the names of them by their chemical name it is much easier to go pick up a much cheaper alternative or generic. Also, it helps to understand what those percentages on the label actually mean. They are telling you the percentage of Active Ingredient (AI) that is present in the container.

Take Roundup for example, the chemical name or AI is glyphosate. Today you can find several different Roundup products on the market, Original Roundup, WeatherMax, Ultra, WeatherStick, ReadyToUse. I have even seen a product that was Roundup offering season long residual weed control. If you know anything about Roundup it has no residual control, zero. Therefore this product has another AI mixed in with it to offer the "season long" weed control.

Now let us just take the AI glyphosate, you have just added about 10,000 products that you can choose from because the generic market is so big. Glyphosate is such a tremendously popular product that everyone has a generic out on the market today. So let's try to narrow the choices down and still save you some money. Look at that percentage of AI on the label, how big is it. I have seen numbers as low as .003% all the way up to 47%. You can get products higher than that but they are generally ag products. The lower the percentage of AI, the less product that is in the container. The rest is basically water. I understand that the big jug of 47% Roundup is going to cost you \$200, but you will also only use 1 tsp per gallon versus the 13% Roundup at \$47 that uses 10 tsp per gallon. The 47% is a much larger jug by the way. Of course you don't want to buy that much pesticide if you can't use it within its useful lifetime.

So now decide how much glyphosate do you need and how much are you willing to pay. The convenient one quart spray bottles are generally the most expensive ways to purchase glyphosate. These bottles will have the lowest percentage of AI in them of any other container. Of course, if that one quart is kills your weeds easily and lasts you for 2-3 years then this may be the answer. On the other hand, if you go through at least a gallon and still have a hard time controlling weeds then consider buying a larger container with a higher percentage of AI. It will save you money in the long run. Just remember, if that container sits in your garage for 4-5 years or longer then the efficacy, or how well it works/may go down, so try not to buy more than you will use in a year.
