



Your cooperation is much appreciated. We thank you for your continued support of YOUR Police Department and we look forward to working hand in hand with you on this situation!!



"Resolve to be Ready" is an instant messaging system for Cities and Counties in the Texas Panhandle. This system will notify you through email or text when severe weather is in the area and is especially useful for folks living in the country who are not able to hear emergency sirens. I recently signed up for this service myself and personally it is handy and convenient and can make a nice addition to a weather radio. When living in the country you cannot here the sirens from town so it helps to let you know when the storms are getting a little severe. Along with NOAA weather information, you can get Emergency Notices and Public Safety Warnings such as wildfires, evacuations, and boil orders, or Community Alerts such as Amber Alert. Hopefully we will never need any of these. You can also choose Stratford, Texhoma, or both with selecting Sherman County. You may cancel the service at any time but hopefully you will be pleased with the information that you are receiving.



Reminder from FSA Executive Director Rebecca Hemphill

Stratford, TX) — May 14, 2012 Sherman County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Rebecca Hemphill, reminds foreign persons with an interest in agricultural lands in the United States that they are required to report their holdings and any transactions to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

"Any foreign person who acquires, transfers or holds any interest, other than a security interest, including leaseholds of 10 years or more, in agricultural land in the United States is required by law to report the transaction no later than 90 days after the date of the transaction," said Hemphill.

Foreign investors must file Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA) reports with the FSA county office that maintains reports for the county where the land is located.

"Failure to file a report, filing a late report or filing an


For AFIDA purposes, agricultural land is defined as any land used for farming, ranching or timber production, if the tracts total 10 acres or more.

Disclosure reports are also required when there are changes in land use. For example, reports are required when land use changes from nonagricultural to agricultural or from agricultural to nonagricultural. Foreign investors must also file a report when there is a change in the status of ownership such as the owner changes from foreign to non-foreign, from non-foreign to foreign or from foreign to foreign.

Data gained from these disclosures is used to prepare an annual report to the President and Congress concerning the effect of such holdings upon family farms and rural communities in the United States.





Sherman County Appraisal District Friday, March 23, 2012

The Sherman County Appraisal District Board of Directors met on Friday, March 23, 2012 in the appraisal district board room. Board members present were Roger Wells, David Jackson, Tim Hudson, Mel Yates, Tom Moore, Dana Buckles, and Valerie McAlister. Chet Everett was not present. Chief Appraiser Teresa Edmond was also present.

The meeting was called to order by Board Chairman Wells at 7:08 a.m. Yates moved to approve the minutes. Moore seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

There was no Old Business. The January and February bills were presented along with the bills for the first part of March. Hudson moved the bills be paid. Jackson seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Consideration of Service Contracts included in the 2013 budget was next on the agenda. Contracts remaining the same amount for 2013 are Rent, Insect Control, Mapping, Computer Contract, and Website. The Mineral Valuation contract amount for 2013 is the amount included in the four-year contract that was approved previously. An increase of 3% was estimated for the 2013 Audit budget amount.


Edmond presented the proposed 2013 budget and information about prior years' return to the jurisdictions and staff qualifications and several salary surveys. Edmond stated that she has reduced the estimate for social security and retirement, and added a budget item for imaging old records.

After discussion, Yates moved that the board go in to executive session. Hudson seconded the motion. The motion passed and the board went into executive session at 7:38 a.m.

Yates moved to re-convene in regular session and Hudson seconded the motion. At 8:10 a.m., the board re-convened in regular session. Everett moved to approve the preliminary 2013 budget: with 2% salary increases. Moore seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Chief Appraiser Edmond stated that a representative from Aflac Insurance has asked that the Board of Directors approve offering employees the option of buying Aflac Insurance. It would be optional insurance, the premiums would be withheld from pay checks, and the Appraisal District would then pay Aflac. After discussion, the Board agreed that the Aflac representative should talk to the employees first to determine if any are interested. If so, then the Board would consider the Chief Appraiser Edmond reported that the staff is busy working on appraisals for 2013 and collecting taxes. Work on the second phase of the State Comptroller's MAP Review of Appraisal Districts is continuing. Public Relations Policies and Manual are now a requirement.

Moore moved the meeting be adjourned. Jackson seconded the motion, and the meeting adjourned at 8:15 a.m.


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

Choo, Choo, Lollipop News A dream became a reality!!

Lollipop Junction celebrates its 20th birthday this month!!! To some folks, Lollipop has always been in Stratford, but may not know the child care center's history. What started as a dream became reality is how the community non-profit child care center is described in Stratford.

The Board of Directors for Lollipop credits its beginning to the Sherman County office of the Texas Agriculture Extension Service (now known as Texas AgriLife Extension Service) and its motto of People Helping People. County Extension Agents, Jim Allison and Susie Spurlock, served as advisors to the Sherman County Extension Program Council 1987-1990 Long Range Extension Program identification forum.

During the forum, a need for an adequate child care center to assist 46% of mothers with pre-school children employed outside of the home was selected as one of the county Extension program educational objectives. At this time, child care in Stratford was provided by individuals in their homes of which very few were registered with the state regulatory agency, had limited hours and seasons of service, and no provisions for substitute care if they were sick or unavailable thus creating a hardship for young families.

To make sure the need for child care was a "real or perceived" need in the community, a team of trained Family Community Leadership members, analyzed this issue and formulated a plan of action. Members of this group included the late Jean Everett and Arnita Lane, along with others who conducted a needs assessment among employed families of major employers of the county. The results of the needs assessment '-

identified the number of children needing care, time periods involved, reasonable fees, and other desired services was shared with the public at a community forum. At the forum, a task force was appointed to further study the issue. After several months of exploring this issue, it was determined that a community day care center was needed and adopted the mission statement: "A non- profit organization to provide quality, dependable, and affordable care for minor children."

Members of this task force completed work necessary to establish Stratford Area Youth Care Agency, recognized by the IRS as a non-profit 501(c)(3) status, secured grants of-over \$32,000 to purchase, renovate, and equip the facility along with securing licensing from the state regulatory agency. The center's name, Lollipop Junction was selected by the board of directors and opened for business June 15, 1992. Trisha Tillery Keener was the first director of the center with 14 children enrolled for regular attendance. Board

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members were Michelle Lutes, Cindy Russell, Arnita Lane, Jim Taliaferro, Margaret Reed, LeRinda Wright, Jackie McIver, Steve Booth, Linda Haynes, Rev. John Wagoner, Jim Bob Brown, and Susie Spurlock.



The Stratford ISD board of trustees met in regular session on Thursday, May 10, 2012. President Joe Reinart established a quorum of members present and called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM.

Board members present: Joe Reinart, DeWain Trayler, Michelle Lutes, Greg Wright, Tres Hess, Barney Willborn and Chet Everett

Staff present: Clint Seward, Misti McBryde, Paul Uttley, Lynette Kautz, Dinah Horsford and Sabra Farabee.

Guest: Rebecca Boyd.

Mr. Seward led the invocation.

Joe Reinart read thank you notes from Paula Everett for IPads for the science labs and Harletta Carthel for the journalism field trip to News Channel 7.

Mr. Birdsong gave the superintendent report. He reported a district enrollment of 599. He passed the Sports Banquet tickets and reminded the board of the TASB workshop on Wednesday, May 16th. He passed out the calendar of events for the remainder of the year and a list of dates for the regular scheduled board meetings for 2012-2013. He informed the board that Stratford ISD will apply for all federal grants that are available.

Lynette Kautz gave the business managers report. Monthly expenditures are at 55.69%, revenue 91.90%, and tax collections are at 97.60%. Transportation cost for the month for the district was .81¢.

Mrs. McBryde gave the elementary report. All students are finishing the year end AIMSweb test. The April STAAR test went very well, the results should be posted online on May 23rd. Kindergarten parent conferences will be conducted next week followed by Pre-Kindergarten parent conferences the last week of school. The 4th grade science fair is Friday, May 18th, the 4th grade farm tour is Tuesday, May 22nd Kindergarten graduation is May 22nd, Mary Allen Play Day is May 23rd with the awards assembly on May 24th. She and Mr. Seward are finalizing the plans for this year's summer school. She reported a campus enrollment of 270.

Mr. Seward gave the junior high report. He recognized the 8th grade band and congratulated them for receiving all 1's at the District UIL contest. They were one of four bands in the area to receive all 1's on stage and in sight reading. He reported that the Junior High GT students went on an overnight trip to Alamogordo and Cloudcroft, NM. They toured the Eagle Ranch Pistachio Farm, the New Mexico History Museum and White Sands National Monument. In addition, they hiked, shopped and at lunch at the lodge in Cloudcroft. The 7th grade band also went to the UIL contest. They did not compete, but performed on stage and did very well. After the competition, the band went to see Shrek at the civic center. This was funded by the Education Foundation. The band will go to Wonderland Park for their end of the year trip. Junior High cheerleader tryouts will be on Friday, May 11th at noon followed by a junior high dance that evening. The 5th - 7th awards assembly will be on May 17th. The junior high field day will be on May 24th and junior high graduation will be that night at 8:00 PM. The STAAR tests have been completed at the junior high. Mrs. Haile's class is working on their mythology project and preparing for their Greek Feast. Mrs. Brownlee's classes are working on their end of year project.

Dr. Uttley gave the high school report. He gave the monthly recognition. Ellen Daniels qualified for State by placing 3rd in Feature Writing. The One Act Play finished their season as the alternate play at the Regional competition. Shyanne Acker and Mary Ann Spurlock were named to the honorable mention All Star cast and Kammi Birdsong and Jordan Johnson were named to the all star cast. At the Regional Track

meet, Colten Rendon placed 6th in the 100 Meter Dash, Justin Mungia placed 4th in the 200 Meter Dash, Grayson Gonzalez placed 7th in the 3200 Meter Run, Casey Lantelme was 1st in Discus and 6th in Shot Put, the 4x200 Relay placed7th(Colten Rendon, Rett Schoonover, Justin Mungia and Sterling Audrain), the 4x400 Relay placed 5th (Rett Schoonover, Edgar Guerrero, Grayson Gonzalez and Justin Mungia), Jackie Gonzalez placed 7th in the 100m Hurdles, and Nohemi Ruedas placed 8th in the 3200m Run. He congratulated these students. He reported that the high school is currently taking the end of course exams. The results are expected to be back after school is out. He explained that the EOC Standards were released in April. He explained how it will be phased in over 5 years for levels 1 and 2, and 3 years for level 3. Students are grouped into cohort groups. Soybean trials help producers find earlier maturing varieties **By Kay Ledbetter**

COLLEGE STATION - Soybeans aren't something new for Texas producers, but one Texas AgriLife Extension Service expert is trying to help develop a production system that will help combat the drought and includes varieties that mature earlier.

Texas has always been the westernmost and southernmost state growing soybeans, with about 200,000-250,000 acres planted annually. Recently, though, drought conditions have caused a drop in acreage, according to Dr. Travis Miller, associate department head and Agrlife Extension program leader in the Texas A&M University soil and crop sciences department.

Soybeans are a riskier crop than sorghum or wheat, he said. But having more than \$14-per-bushel prices right now means there's good money "if you can make a crop."

Miller is participating in the Mid-South Soybean Consortium trials being planted in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas under the direction of Dr. Larry Purcell with the University of Arkansas.

Soybeans can be a determinant or indeterminate crop, he said. Indeterminate means the crop can put on blooms and continue to grow at the same time. Determinant, or late-maturing soybeans, must reach a certain photoperiod, or day length, before they bloom.

"We are looking for varieties that can be early planted and which the bloom date coincides with more favorable growing conditions," Miller said.

College Station is the southernmost trial, he said. This trial will include eight varieties mixed between determinant and indeterminate varieties, with each planted on four different dates. The earliest planted was on March 26 and the latest will be planted early in June.

"We're looking at the number of nodes per plant, plant height, bloom date - all factors that are affected by photoperiod and growing conditions," Miller said.

He said they would like to find plants that are less photoperiod sensitive to plant in regions with available sunshine and moisture.

Determinant soybeans generally grow from May to September, or about 160 days, while the indeterminate varieties can be planted as early as March and harvested in late July or early August, or less than 140 days, Miller said. The indeterminate plants will grow and set pods at the same time, allowing more height and more nodes, "and that's what pays," he said.

"It also fits our weather patterns better," Miller said. "We know we get rain in April and May and that's the ideal time to set pods, so we would be able to use the weather patterns if we find good indeterminate varieties for this region."

• The overall goal is to minimize the risk and better utilize the weather and resources that we have, he said.

- Texas soybeans are primarily grown in the upper Gulf Coast, south of Houston and around Beaumont, northeast Texas along the Red River and a smattering of irrigated acres on the High Plains, Miller said. Today is the first day of early voting for the upcoming 2012 Primary Election!

In addition to the presidential primary, a number of critical offices are currently on each party's primary ballot to determine who will be running in the general election in November. These include U.S. Senate, U.S. Representatives, two seats on the Texas Railroad Commission, justices on the state's two highest courts, all 31 State Senators, all 150 State Representatives, and a number of local district and county elected offices.

To find out in which congressional and legislative districts you reside, review your voter registration certificate, or go to the Texas Legislature Online, and fill out the Who Represents Me form on the bottom right corner of the webpage.

Early voting will continue through Friday, May 25th. Please contact your county Voter Registration Official for information about early voting locations in your community.

As you may recall, the 82nd Legislature enacted Senate Bill 14, which requires voters to present a stateissued photo ID before casting a ballot, but the U.S. Department of Justice refused to approve the application of this law. A lawsuit filed by Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott to have the law implemented immediately is currently pending in federal court. While awaiting a resolution, please be prepared with the necessary identification documentation required under current law when you go to vote.

If you will be away from your county on Election Day and during early voting or if you are unable to get to the polls, you may request a ballot by mail. The last day to apply for a ballot by mail - received, not postmarked - is Tuesday, May 22nd. For more information on how to vote by mail, please visit <u>VoteTexas.gov</u>, or contact your local election official.

And of course, you can still vote at your polling location on Primary Election Day, Tuesday, May 29,2012.
