Self-discipline is most difficult to misster. Sacrifice for a cause, or a reason to give up one thing to gain another, is the beginning. Most athletes realize that to reach a goal they must deprive hemselves of pleasures to obtain it. This is wonderful training that is necessarily found in football, more than in any

The danger of serious injuries is extremely remote. Actually, style, too? there is more potential for serious injury to students in automobile and industrial accidents than there is in football.

(According to statistics received by the Free Press, motor, vehicle accidents are 180 times more dangerous than football, drownings are 21 times more dangerous than foutball, and firearms 20 times more dangerous than football.

Coach Everett concludes with this statement. "We have the best equipment available for your son's protection. I personally am a stickler for conditioning and can assure you that your son will be in top physical condition for every game. However, in order to obtain this, he will be required to work hard and long on the practice field. He will come home dead tired at times. But isn't this better than having him riding around in hot-rods, and, or, gangs until all hours of the night?

We coaches sincerely feel that your son's contribution to the football squad will be far overshadowed by the tootball team's contribution to your son.'




