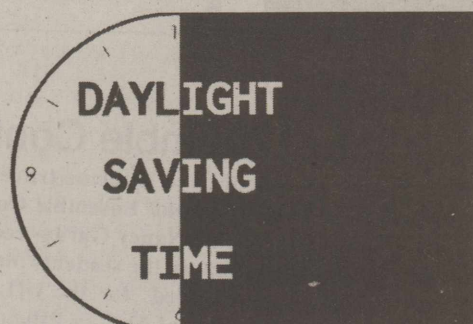

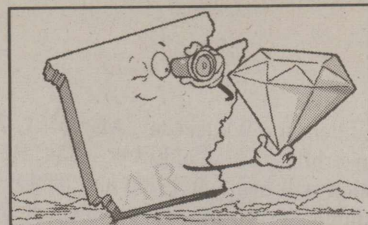

EMT-Basic course ends

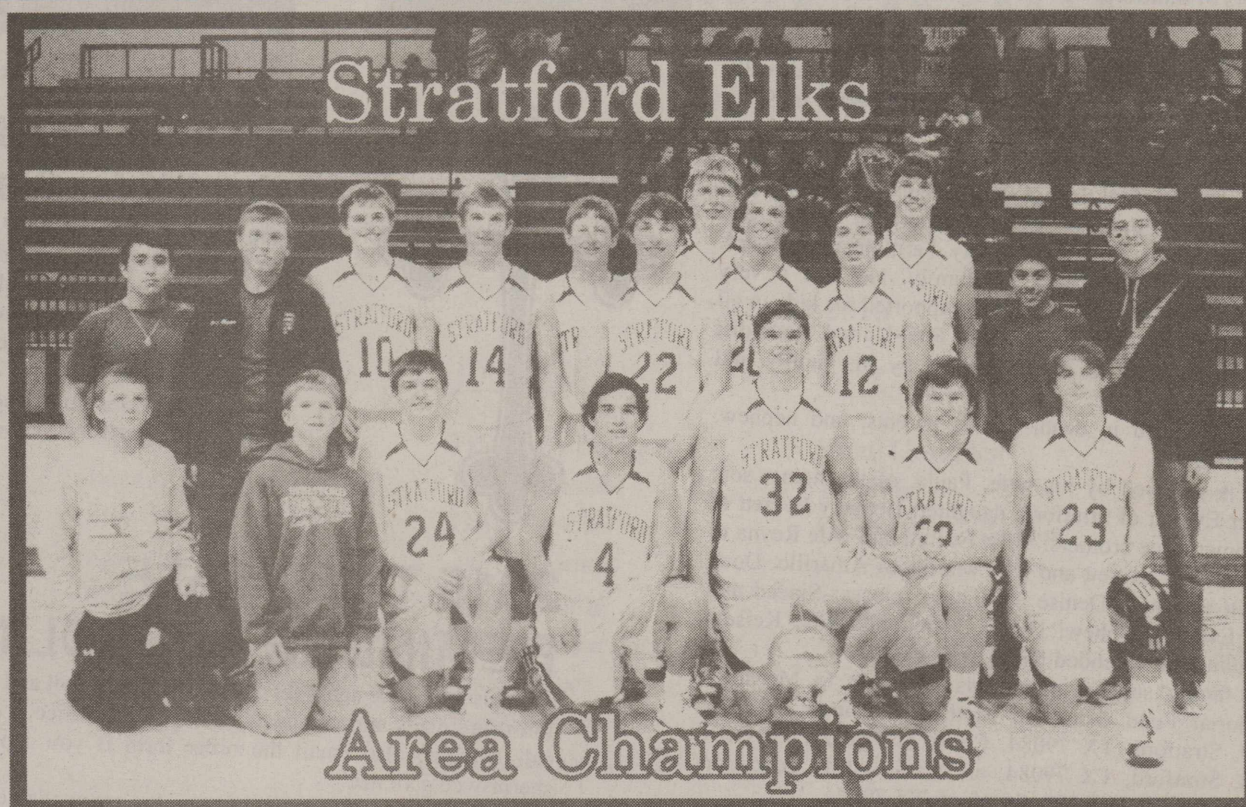
Back on October 20, this group of students committed to taking an EMT-Basic course here in Stratford. The class began with 21 students, but this hardy group of 14 students stuck it out to the end. The class ended on February 25. The students underwent 104 hours of classroom lecture, 24 hours of practical skills practice, a minimum of 20 hours making 5 ambulance runs, 32 hours spent working in a local ER, hands-on National Registry skills testing, numerous written tests, and gobs of homework. The students must now apply to take the National Registry written exam given by computer-testing in Amarillo. After passing that test, they must then apply for a Texas certification and be fingerprinted and have a criminal background check run on them. After meeting all these requirements, the local folks will be able to run on our ambulance service.

The students from Stratford who have completed the class are Kacey Bell, Richard Coborn, Nicole Davis, Silvia Garza, Courtney Hartman, Shannon Hensley, Scott Hudson, Mike McHugh, A.J. Rife, and Pamela Sandvig.

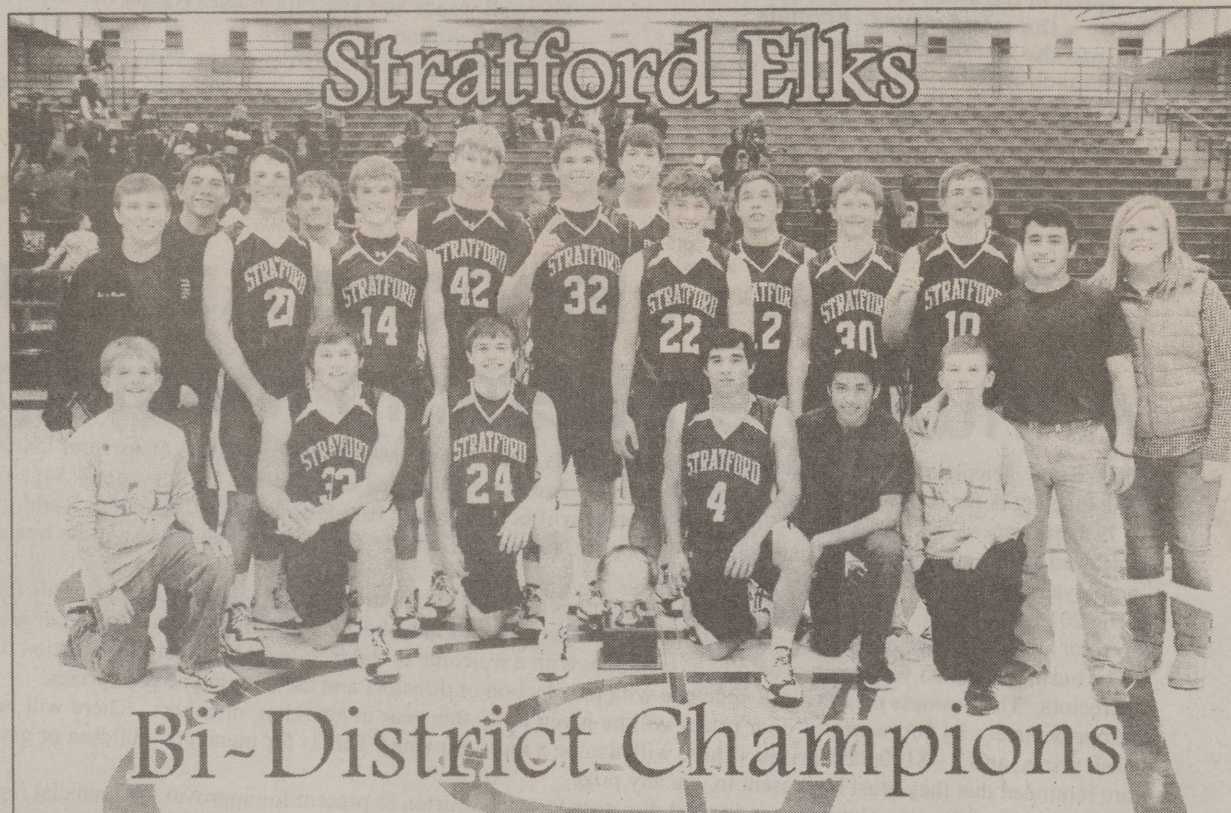

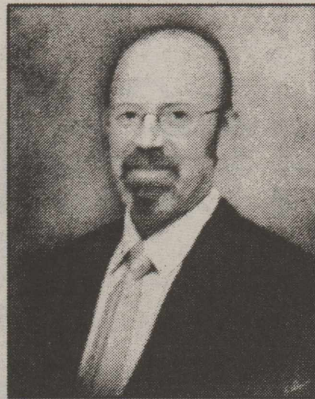

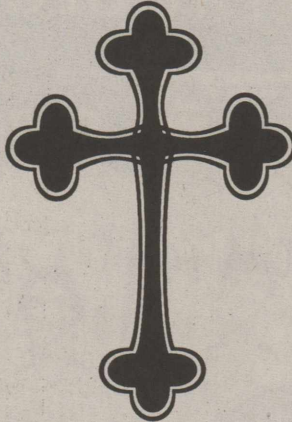
He is preceded in death by his parents; and nephew: Chris Everett.

2015 TREE SALE REMINDER - DEADLINE MARCH 19, 2015

Time is here once again for Sherman County Soil and Water Conservation district's annual Spring Tree Sale. Order forms are ready and can be picked up at our office at 418 North 4th in Stratford, or we can mail it if you give us a call. We can also email the order form if you supply us with an email address. Just call us or email us at shermawcd@xit.net.

While we try to list as many species that are available for this area, we cannot list them all. If you have any special wants or wishes as far as trees go this year, please call the office at 396-5517 ext. 3 and we will be happy to try and find what you need.

The District can also fill requests for drip irrigation supplies. We keep some drip supplies in stock, and will help in the design of your system and order exactly what is needed for you if we do not have it. Delivery is usually within three working days. You can also help your investment with the installation of weed barrier. We have this available also. This is especially important in windbreaks because we do not want the newly planted seedlings to have to fight with weeds and grass for water. The barrier will help prevent the growth of weeds and grass and keep the moisture in the ground.

If you need a Tree Order Form, want to place an order for trees, irrigation supplies, weed barrier or just have any questions regarding the trees or need help planning for your particular needs, please do not hesitate to contact the District or the NRCS at 396-5517 ext. 3.

XIT Rural Telephone Announces 64th Annual Membership Meeting

XIT Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has scheduled its 64th Annual Membership Meeting of its rural landline telephone members for Wednesday, March 11, 2015. The meeting is for XIT Rural Telephone members who live in the following exchanges: Middletown - 343; Texline - 362; Bunkerhill - 377; Coldwater - 384; Kerrick - 727; Stevens - 753; and Lautz - 769. The meeting will be held at the Rita Blanca Lake Coliseum. Rural members' registration will begin at 11:00 a.m. and will be followed with a noon luncheon catered by The Loose Caboose in Dalhart. Once again, members will be treated to a sit-down dinner served by XIT's management and employees.

The 2015 XIT Rural Telephone Educational Program recipients will be introduced to the membership. This is the sixteenth year for the program that offers scholarships to rural members' graduating high school seniors. Four area seniors have been chosen this year to each receive a \$4,000 scholarship.

The business session will begin promptly at 1:00 p.m. with a welcome to the membership and an introduction of guests by J.W. McClellan, President of the XIT Board of Directors. The business meeting will conclude with the election of directors and the drawing of door prizes.

Approximately \$4,000 worth of door prizes will be given away this year to attending members. There will be six grand prizes awarded: 1 - \$500 cash prize, 3 - \$300 cash prizes, and 2 - \$100 cash prizes. There will also be a kids' drawing. This is for members' children or grandchildren who are 12 years of age or younger. Members are reminded that they must be present to win any prize.

The purpose of the annual meeting is to elect directors for each district, to present for approval the financial reports for the previous fiscal year, and to transact such other business that might come before the meeting.

A quorum must be present in order for the business meeting to convene. Based upon the total number of the Cooperative's members, fifty members or two percent of the members present, whichever is larger, constitutes a quorum.

The officers and board members are: J.W. McClellan, President; Water E. Lasley, Vice President; and Gary Finch, Secretary-Treasurer. Other directors are Marcia French, Nick Olson, Steve Baskin, Gareed McBryde and Barry Poling.

On February 5, 2015, the Nominating Committee consisting of Allen Frerich, Tom James, Larry Kemp, Charles Traylor, Phillip Walden and Wallace Bridwell submitted nominations for three directorships. Larry Kemp was selected as chairman of the Nominating Committee. Nominations for the following districts were: District I, Dallam County - Barry Poling; District II, Hartley County - Gary Finch; and District III, Sherman County - Steve Baskin.

Members vote only for nominees from the district in which they reside, or the district in which they have telephone service. All members must be present at the annual meeting to vote since no proxy voting is permitted. Either a husband or wife is eligible to vote at the annual meeting, but only one vote is allowed per membership.

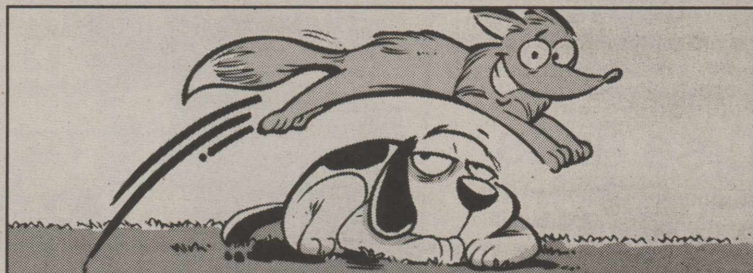

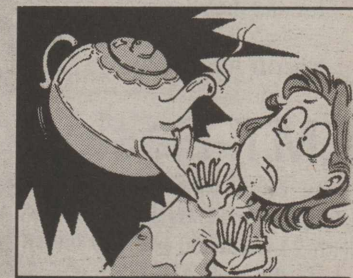

A New Creation: Capturing Every Thought

The weapons we fight with are not the weapons of the world. On the contrary, they have divine power to demolish strongholds. We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ. (2 Corinthians 10:4-5 NIV)

God gave man some of his attributes. The ability to think and reason is a God attribute. In giving man this attribute, God gave him freedom to make choices. Humans often mistake this power of choice as permission to construct theories and reasonings that reject God. When humans reject God and use the power of human thinking to build in his place other idols to worship, God allows them to reject him. He considers this rejection a "reprobate" mind. Without Christ we are "reprobates." Before accepting the grace of Christ we are in the grips of rebellion. Our minds were corrupt. We are fighting strong holds of false arguments, human reasoning, obstinance and prideful thinking.

Paul points out that without God as our focus, our thoughts lead to us away from God... "Furthermore, just as they did not think it worthwhile to retain the knowledge of God, so God gave them over to a depraved [reprobate] mind, so that they do what ought not to be done. They have become filled with every kind of wickedness, evil, greed and depravity. They are full of envy, murder, strife, deceit and malice. They are gossips, slanderers, God-haters, insolent, arrogant and boastful; they invent ways of doing evil; they disobey their parents; they have no understanding, no fidelity, no love, no mercy." (Romans 1:28-31 NIV). Each of these are thinking and behavior obstacles [strong holds] that separate us from obedience to God.

Paul compares our minds to a battlefield. He reminds us the purpose of our godlike powers (to think and make choices) are to guide us to be Christ-like. After accepting Christ, we use God's mighty weapons to capture our thoughts and train them to pursue Godliness. Paul explains our battle and list our powerful spiritual weapons: "Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people." (Ephesians 6:10-18 NIV). Paul tell us we do not war against humans but against spiritual evil. Oftentimes evil originates as just a thought that we must capture. We are to use truth, righteousness, peace, faith, salvation, the Holy Spirit and prayer to win our battles against all evil forces. Meditation: Am I training my thoughts to be obedient to God?

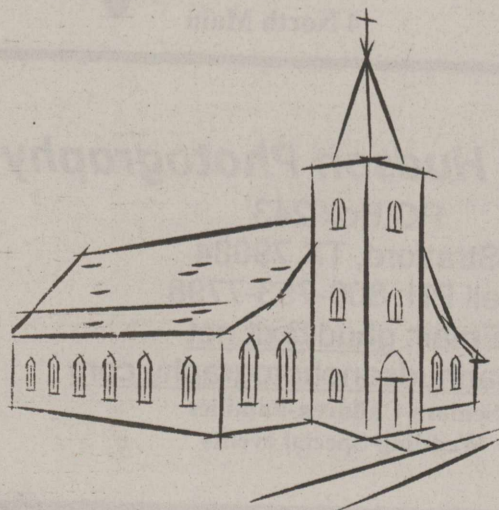

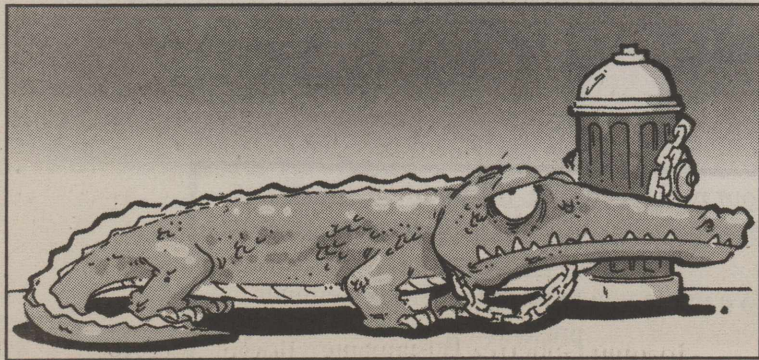


Legacy Plays White Elephant Bingo

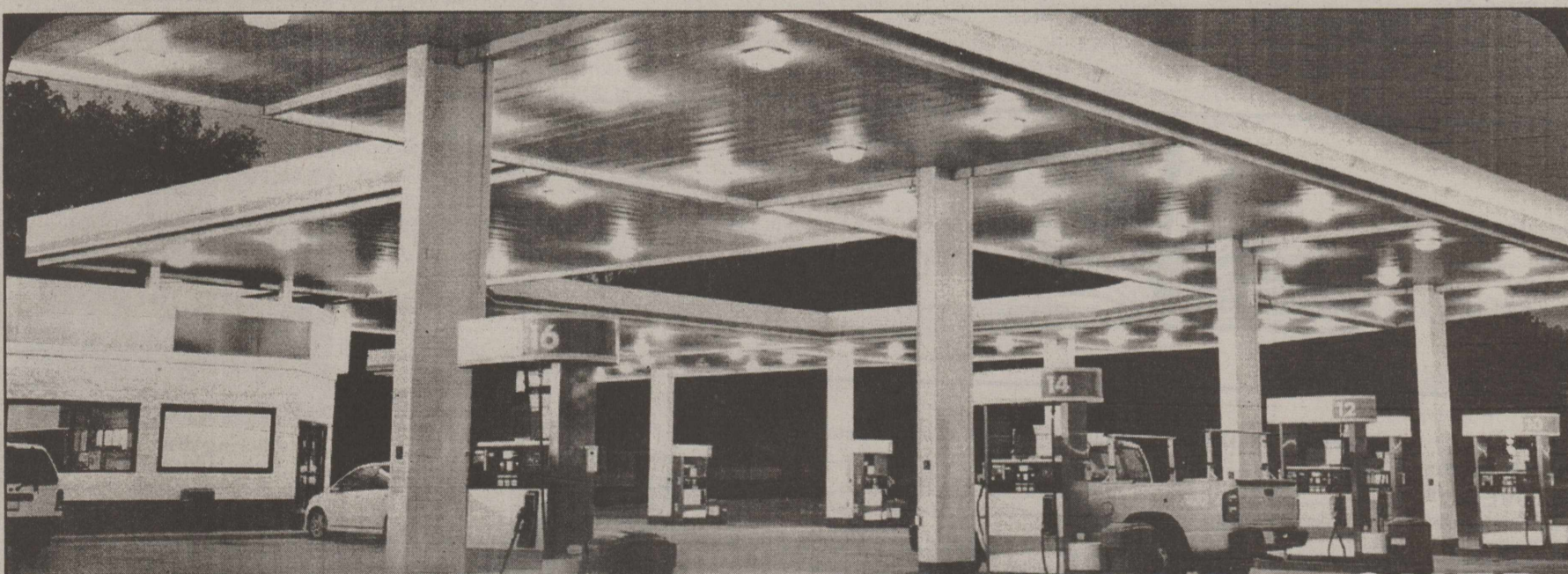
