

President Johnson said when he signed the bill into law, "The purpose of this law is simple. It does not give special treatment to any citizen. It does say that those who are equal before God shall now be equal in the polling booths, in the classrooms, in the factories, and in hotels, restaurants, movie theaters, and other places that provide service to the public

President Johnson said further, "We must not approach the observance and enforcement of this law in a vengeful spirit. Its purpose is not to punish. Its purpose is not to divide but to end divisions, divisions which have lasted too long. Its purpose is national, not regional. Its purpose is to promote a more abiding commitment to freedom, a more constant pursuit of justice, and a deeper respect for human dignity. We will achieve these goals because most Americans are law abiding citizens who want to do what is right.

Now that the bill has become law, I hope Texans, and all Americans, will obey it in the spirit urged by our President. To do otherwise is to reject the system which has made ours the greatest nation on earth,
