Lions Club getting ready for this weekend

The Lion's Club is getting ready for the Sherman County Jamboree Barbeque. The Stratford Jamboree committee funds the cost of the barbeque and the Lions wrap, cook, and serves 900 lbs. of meat, 50 lbs. of beans, and 22 gallons of spiced apples. Stratford Lions donate their time and often end up spending personal money to serve the community.

All of the proceeds earned from the barbeque are deposited in the Stratford Jamboree account. It is not always a moneymaking event. Last year Stratford Jamboree lost \$793 in order to provide the barbeque for the community celebration. Whether they make money or not, the Stratford Jamboree Committee awards two \$250 vocational scholarships to deserving high school seniors.

AMARILLO - Parts of the Summer Crops Field Day will have a new look and feel this year as vegetables, high tunnels and the human health connection with agriculture are highlighted, along with traditional research projects. The Aug. 10 event is hosted annually by Texas A&M AgriLife Research, the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service and West Texas A&M

University.

This year the indoor portion of the field day also has a new location, the Cornerstone Ranch Events Center, 1 mile west of Bushland on the north side of Interstate 40.

The tours and research highlighted will still be that of AgriLife Research and the USDA-Agricultural Research Service and their research fields located west of

Registration will be from 7-8:15 a.m. There is no charge and no advanced registration needed

Bushland. Buses will be provided to take attendees on the

The program will open at 8:15 a.m. with "Connecting Agriculture with Human Health," presented by Dr. Angela Burkham, AgriLife Extension regional program director for family and consumer sciences in Amarillo. Dr. Kyle Grigsby, southwest nutrition manager with J.D. Heiskell & Co. in Friona, will follow with "Forage Quantity and Quality Considerations for Southwest

The morning tours will run from 9-11:30 a.m., and will be followed by a luncheon. An afternoon tour with two different stops will take place from 1:15-4:15 p.m.

Joseph Bunting, produce director for United Supermarkets in Lubbock, will present "From Farm to Market - How Research and Retail Can Work Together" as the keynote luncheon speech.

He will be followed by Dr. Bill McCutchen, associate director of AgriLife Research in College Station, discussing "Texas A&M AgriLife's Commitment to Vegetable R&D and Commercialization."

Morning tour stops will cover cotton boll production and lint quality, irrigation comparisons, water-use efficiency of corn, greenhouse gas monitoring from livestock operations, cattle diet effect on emissions, high 'tunnels, integrated pest management and variable rate irrigation. The afternoon tours will look at corn under limited irrigation, weed control in cotton, and corn and sorghum herbicide trials.

Three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units-two general and one integrated pest management-will be offered.

Organizations may only submit one grant application per twelve month period; however, Medical Campus Residents may submit a grant application to both the HRMC Resident Grant Program and the HRMC Community Health Grant Program in the same year.

USDA Seeks Applications for Funding to Develop Advanced Biofuels and Plant-Based Products

Development Will Contribute to America's Strong Bio economy and

Bring Jobs to Rural Areas

TEMPLE, TEXAS, July 25, 2016 - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is seeking applications for funding to help support the development of advanced biofuels, renewable chemicals and bio based

"The bio economy is a catalyst for economic development in rural America, creating new jobs and providing new markets for farmers and ranchers," Vilsack said.

"Investing in the businesses and technologies that support the production of biofuels and bio based products is not only good for farm incomes. The whole economy benefits from a more balanced, diversified and consumer-friendly energy portfolio, less dependence on foreign oil and reduced carbon emissions."

"The Bio refinery, Renewable Chemical and Bio based Product Manufacturing Assistance Program is building the foundation for a clean energy economy and protecting our environment while making America less dependent on foreign and fossil fuels and increasing rural economic growth," said Paco Valentin, USDA Rural Development Texas State Director.

The program now provides loan guarantees of up to \$250 million to develop, construct and retrofit commercial-scale bio refineries and to develop renewable chemicals and bio based product manufacturing facilities.

For this announcement, USDA will seek applications in two cycles. Applications for the first funding cycle are due October 3, 2016. Applications for the second cycle are due April 3, 2017. The first two application cycles under the new process yielded complete applications from projects producing biogas, biodiesel, cellulosic ethanol, bio based lubricants and oils, lignin cake and syrup, and fertilizers.

Eligible borrowers include individuals, corporations, federally-recognized tribes, units of state or local government, farm cooperatives and co-op organizations, associations of agricultural producers, national laboratories, and institutions of higher education, rural electric cooperatives, public power entities - or a consortium of any of these borrower types. Entities that receive program financing must provide at least 20 percent of the funding for eligible project costs.

Since 2009, USDA Rural Development @USDARD) has invested \$11 billion to start or expand 103,000 rural businesses; helped 1.1 million rural residents buy homes; funded nearly 7,000 community facilities such as schools, public safety and health care facilities; financed 185,000 miles of electric transmission and distribution lines; and helped bring high-speed Internet access to nearly 6 million rural residents and businesses.
