Susman was asking the ethics committee today to dismiss key charges against Wright based on different interpretations of the House rules. Supporters hope for a narrow legal victory that the speaker could parlay into political salvation.

Wright's lawyers contend he is being judged by a new, harsher standard that goes far beyond the letter of House rules. In advance of today's hearing, they gave themselves no better than an even chance of winning dismissal of at least some of the 69 counts against him.

But with Wright's political support eroding under the weight of serious ethics charges, even the speaker's supporters emphasize the importance of persuading the ethics committee to drop at least one of the two main charges.

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Simpson pleads 'no contest' LOS ANGELES (AP) - Actor


and former pro football star O.J. Simpson has pleaded no contest to a wife-beating charge and could face up to a year behind bars and a \$1,000 fine if convicted.

Simpson was accused of slapping, kicking and threatening to kill his wife, Nicole, in a New Year's Day argument at their Brentwood home.

Simpson, 41, entered the plea to one count of battery Monday through his attorney, Howard Weitzman, in West Los Angeles Municipal Court, said city attorney's spokesman Mike Qualls. Sentencing was set for Wednesday

With the no-contest plea Simpson can be judged guilty but retains the right to enter an innocent plea.

Study finds increased breast cancer among teen pill users

pills while teen-agers in the 1960s face about five times the usual risk of breast cancer before they pregnancy. reach menopause, a study concludes.

The research, conducted in Sweden, is one of several recent studies to raise concerns that the pill may increase the odds of breast cancer

While describing their findings as "alarming," the researchers cautioned that birth control pills their introduction, and newer pills may not heighten the risk of breast cancer.

The research, directed by Dr. Hakan Olsson and colleagues from University Hospital in Lund, was presented Monday at the annual meeting of the American Society of Clinical Oncology.

At the meeting, an Italian specialist described a new approach to treating breast cancer that he said could virtually eliminate the need for mastectomies, which have been the standard approach to the disease for nearly a century.

Olsson's study was conducted in southern Sweden, where the pill was widely used by teen-age girls after its introduction in the 1960s

He said that the incidence of breast cancer among women under age 40 has risen in Sweden since the advent of the pill. And while his study cannot conclusively blame the pill, "we By Peter H. Gott, M.D. have no other explanation for the increase of breast cancer in young women."

However, even if pill use during the 1960s has increased the chances of breast cancer, the risk is still relatively small among women before they reach menopause. Olsson said that the overall chance of breast cancer before menopause is about 1 percent, while the risk among early pill users is about 5 percent.



This is why sitz baths (sitting in hot water) are often used in conjunction with antibiotics. Some doctors have experimented with heated probes which, when introduced into the rectum, radiate warmth to the prostate gland. To my knowledge, these devices are not generally accepted as useful for most cases.

Chronic prostatitis can occasionally be worsened by the formation of calcium deposits (prostatic stones) within the gland. In such cases, surgery to remove the infection-causing stones may be necessary. However, in most instances, long-term antibiotic treatment is a satisfactory option for treating prostatitis and should be attempted before more aggressive therapy is considered. In my opinion, pa-

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and I am wondering if this will ever go away. Should I worry because it's taken so long?

DEAR READER: The lymph nodes act as filters that prevent infected material from spreading through the body. They also serve as factories where infection-fighting proteins (antibodies) are made. Lymph nodes usually swell in response to infection, such as chicken pox, and may take months to return to normal size. This is normal. I believe you needn't worry, as long as your daughter's pediatrician assures you that her health is good

DEAR DR. GOTT: . Why, in today's health-conscious, diet-oriented society are children fatter than ever? Is there something about those "couch potato kids" that pass their time watching TV and eating junk food?

DEAR READER: Yep, there is.

People - children included - who are sedentary and continue to eat calorie-rich foods, will gain weight. 

Bobby Nail, proprietor of one of the world's finest rubber-bridge clubs, often takes a busman's holiday. When he goes on vacation, it is usually to a North American Championships in score. Reno, he had the pleasure of executing what I will call the "cue-bidder's coup

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
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

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

He shot .509 from the field, becoming the only player other percent from the field in the same season.

Sen. Ted Lyon said the measure would decrease employer-paid workers' comp insurance premiums, increase benefits to injured workers and make sure contested claims were fair to both employees and employers.

"No single group is happy, and that probably means it's fair," said Lyon, D-Rockwall.







State funding angers group

award of \$300,000 in "seed money" for a proposed \$1 million Vietnam Veterans memorial has angered Texas vets who are trying to build a similar monument in Dallas.

"I think it's duplicative to have two memorials to Texas' Vietnam veterans," said B.G. Burkett, treasurer of The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund of Texas. "It also makes fund raising very confusing.'

The veterans group been sponsoring construction of a Dallas memorial for several years. That monument will be built in Fair Park, site of the state fairgrounds and several museums.

In 1985, the House passed a resolution endorsing his group's project, which is privately funded, Burkett said.

But the House also has approved resolutions to erect a memorial on the grounds of the state Capitol, said a spokeswoman for Rep. Frank Collazo, D-Port Arthur, sponsor of the Austin project which includes monuments to both Texas' Vietnam veterans and its Korean War veterans.

But only the Austin monument has received money from the state. In a legislative conference committee that reconciled House and Senate versions of the state budget last week, lawmakers ad-

DALLAS (AP) - A legislative ded the \$300,000 line item to be spent over the next two years.

"The problem is that this is not just a Vietnam memorial, it's a Korean and Vietnam veterans memorial," said Collazo, chairman of the Texas Veterans Memorial Committee.

Collazo said if the memorial was solely dedicated to Korean War veterans the cost difference would not be significant.

"This is going to be the state memorial," he said.

Collazo said he did not plan to look into the issue. "I met with them a couple years ago just to make sure we understood each. other on this. There wasn't anything then and there isn't anything now.

He estimated the project will cost \$750,000 to \$1 million.

Burkett said his foundation hasn't received any public money, although the Dallas City Council has donated the land for the memorial. The foundation has raised most of the \$1.2 million to construct the memorial and already has established a fund for maintenance.

Burkett said Collazo's proposal is "admirable."

"But using taxpayer money is hardly the way to go," he said.

He said instead of spending money for a second monument, officials should help raise the \$100,000 needed to complete the Fair Park memorial.

Tanker skipper indicted

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) -A grand jury has added three felony counts to the criminal charges facing the former skipper of the Exxon Valdez.

Meanwhile, a worker was killed Monday aboard a ship housing workers involved in the cleanup of the massive oil spill caused by the wreck of the tanker.

In Anchorage, Joseph Hazelwood was charged with three counts of second-degree criminal mischief, District Attorney Dwayne McConnell said.

The indictment accuses him of reckless actions before the 987foot tanker ran aground on Bligh Reef. If convicted of all three, Hazelwood could be sentenced to up to 15 years in prison and fined \$150,000, McConnell said.

Hazelwood, 42, of Huntington, N.Y., was charged in Valdez in late March with three misdemeanors: operating a boat while intoxicated, reckless endangerment and negligent pollution.

McConnell said the state will ask to have all the charges consolidated into a single trial. Hazelwood is free on \$50,000 bail on the misdemeanor charges pending a June 20 trial. No date has been set for his arraignment on the felony charges in Superior Court.

Hazelwood's blood alcohol content was illegally high nearly 11 hours after the accident, the Coast Guard said. He had turned over control of the tanker to the third mate, who was not certified to pilot the ship in Prince William Sound.

On Monday, a food worker aboard one of the vessels housing cleanup workers in Prince William Sound was crushed by a freight elevator aboard the Coastal Star, a headquarters ship anchored about 55 miles southwest of Valdez, Coast Guard Chief Mark Kennedy said.

The victim's identity was being withheld until relatives could be notified.

Meanwhile, Exxon and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service announced a special rehabilitation center will be opened in Anchorage for bald eagles and other flesheating birds as the toll of wildlife continues to mount. At least 43 birds of prey are among the more than 17,000 birds confirmed dead as the result of the March 24 spill of nearly 11 million gallons of oil by the tanker. Exxon said it was giving an Anchorage veterinarian \$100,000 for the bird facility. The oil company said James Scott will be assisted by Pat Redig, director of the raptor center at the University of Minnesota. Scientists plan to attack the spill by stimulating natural bacteria to break down poisonous components, the first such largescale experimental attack, The New York Times reported in today's editions. Scientists plan to apply powdered fertilizer to about 1,500 feet of beach on Naked Island to stimulate bacteria, the Times said, quoting U.S. Environmental Protection Administration officials. The experiment will not involve recombinant or selectively bred organisms, and will rely wholly on common microbes alreadly present in Alaskan waters, the newspaper said.

Safety board ends probe into mishap

WASHINGTON (AP) -Federal safety officials are wrapping up a 13-month investigation into an aviation accident that has led to sweeping changes in maintenance of the world's aging airliner fleet.

The National Transportation Safety Board was meeting today to determine the probable cause and issue recommendations in connection with the April 27, 1988, incident in which the roof of an Aloha Airlines Boeing 737 ripped open over the Hawaiian Islands.

A stewardess was killed when she was sucked out through a gaping hole in the plane's fuselage, but the pilot managed to land the airliner safely at Kahului airport on Maui with 94 other people aboard. Sixty-one passengers and crew members were injured. The plane had been flying at 24,000 feet en route from Hilo to Honolulu.

The safety board staff examined the role of metal fatigue, aircraft design, the airlines' maintenance program, crew performance and Federal Aviation Administration directives affecting the aircraft, which was 19 years old and had logged nearly 90,000 flights.

The accident focused worldwide attention on the issue of aging airliners and led to several FAA orders for inspections and modifications. The average age of in-service airliners exceeds 13 years, and jetliners are rarely retired as the demand for air travel increases and orders for new jets have to be made years in advance.

A series of FAA directives stepping up inspections and ordering some modifications of older aircraft followed the Aloha incident.



"Today we are clearly a major source of television in America," said Bob Miron, NCTA vice chairman and president of Newhouse Broadcasting Corp president and chief executive, cited recent polls which indicate the public believes cable provides better programming in

PLAQUEMINE, La. (AP) -Oprah Winfrey brought her talk show to a community known locally as "cancer alley" to raise national consciousness on the health hazards of pollution.

The syndicated TV show was filmed Monday at the civic center in Iberville Parish, an area of many chemical plants on the Mississippi River between New Orleans and Baton Rouge.

The main topic was the miscarriage rate around the region, and the audience included parents of cancer victims, women with a history of miscarriages and representatives of chemical companies.

The federal Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta are conducting a study of the area's miscarriage rate to determine if chemicals are responsible. Some previous studies have indicated high smoking and drinking rates may share the blame for Louisiana's high cancer rates.

Prince Philip begins trust in England

UNITED NATIONS (AP) -Prince Philip has started a trust that will fund the first authorized **English translations of the Koran** and other holy books.

The \$7 million trust also will finance translations of the Eastern Orthodox Christian Bible and of texts of the Baha'i faith, Buddhism, Hinduism, Judaism, Sikhism, Taoism and the oral traditions of Australian Aborigines, the Yanamamo of South America and the Japanese Shinto faith, trust organizers said Monday.

The translation of the Koran, authorized by the Moslem World League and religious leaders in Mecca, is especially significant because most Islamic authorities believe that Arabic alone is the language of revelation.

Previous English translations often have been poor and have differed widely because of the difficulty of interpreting classical Arabic.
