Lead plaintiff in FBI suit promoted
EL PASO, Texas (AP) - The ed the bureau's promotions pro FBI has obeyed a federal judge's cess to make it more open and aced a successful man who fil discrimination lawsuit against Bernardo M. Perez will take the post of deputy assistant direc tor of the FBI's laboratory divi-
sion, FBI Director William Sessions announced Tuesday. Perez will assume the job in probably in July. agent in charge of the EI Paso of fice, said Wednesday the promo tion is "a step in the right direc-
tion." He said he hopes he is promoted again later.
"It's a very promising division," Perez said. "There are a
lot of people - probably well-educated probably the most U.S. District Judge Lucius Bunton, who ruled last fall that the FBI was guilty or
discriminating against Hispanic agents, ordered the FBI three weeks ago to promote Perez within 45 days.
Perez, 49 , sued the FBI in Hispanic agents eventually joined in class-action suit. After a two-week, non-jury trial last
summer, Bunton ruled the FBI summer, discriminated against Hispanics in promotions, assignments and discipline. In addition to ordering the FBI
cess to make it more open and ac Perez was the highest-ranking
Hispanic FBI agent when he filed the suit. He contended he deserved to be ranked higher. Perez's new position is one

he now holds. He said he hopes his critics don't dismiss the promotion as undeserved. "I hope they will see this as
