LOS ANGELES (AP) -Teachers today tentatively agreed to end a strike that had crippled the nation's second-largest school district for more than 10 days, officials said.

The three-year pact would give teachers 8 percent annual raises and more power in deciding curricula, officials said.

"I hope this signals a new era of working together, of cooperation, rather than confrontation," said school board President Roberta Weintraub.

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements today said a deal had been reached to end the political controversy over Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower's department, saying he would sign a bill to continue the agriculture department for 12 more years.

Clements, Republican, were to veto the agriculture department "sunset" bill, the department headed by Democrat Hightower would cease to exist on Sept. 1, 1990.

Negotiators from the House, Senate and governor's office have been working on the bill for weeks. ever since the House voted to water down Hightower's authority to regulate pesticides



An inspired defense

Here is a deal from "The Best of Eddie Kantar" in which Billy Eisenberg, sitting West, put up an inspired defense against three no-trump. After a transfer sequence, in which North first showed five hearts and then bid a no-trump game, Billy got off to the best lead of the 10 of clubs.

Declarer won the king in dummy, played a diamond to the queen in his hand, and then led a low heart. Violating the principle of second hand low, West played the heart jack. The queen won in dummy, and declarer played jack of diamonds, finessing, and then another diamond. He now exited with the king of hearts. Eisenberg won the ace and continued with the nine of clubs, ducked by South, and another club to declarer's ace. A spade was now played to dummy's ace, and the good diamond was cashed. But declarer had only eight tricks, and no way to win a ninth. If he played a spade, Billy would get his partner on lead with the

Note what would have happened if West had played a low heart when declarer first led up to the queen in dummy. West would be left with the jack of hearts as the last diamond was cashed in dummy. If he kept the jack, he would be thrown in with that card to give up a trick to South's queen of spades. If he threw it away, declarer could lead a spade from dummy and cover whatever East played, eventually making a trick with a high spade. DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: What can you tell me about adult acne, rosacea? I understand there's a new drug called MetroGel that is being distributed. I'm a little leery of new drugs and would, therefore, try something more established if you can help.

DEAR READER: Rosacea is sometimes mistakenly called "adult acne." It resembles acne but is a different skin disorder, affecting people mid-dle-aged and older. The cause is

Rosacea often responds to metronidazole cream or broad-spectrum oral antibiotics, such as tetracycline. Oral isotretinoin (Accutane) has been reported to be useful. Accutane should be used only under a doctor's supervision, and not by a woman who is, or who may become, pregnant while under treatment.

The product you mention, Metro-Gel, is a new form of metronidazole. It shows promise for the treatment of rosacea. Except for allergy to the drug, there are no contraindications to its use. Perez, 49, sued the FBI in January 1987 and 310 other Hispanic agents eventually joined in class-action suit. After a two-week, non-jury trial last summer, Bunton ruled the FBI had discriminated against Hispanics in promotions, assignments and discipline.

He estimated that he injected Johnson 50 or 60 times with steroids from spring 1984 to the summer of 1988 and the sprinter had a personal supply as well. He also said Johnson told him when they first met - several months before the doctor first provided aqueous testosterone - of steroid use dating to 1981.

Astaphan's appearance on the stand, which could last five or six days, was among the most anticipated before the commission, which was formed after Johnson was stripped of the 100-meter world record and gold medal in Seoul last September after a positive steroid test.

Johnson's only public statement since the Olympics was that he never knowingly used illegal drugs to enhance his performance. He is expected among the last witnesses before the in-quiry's track and field hearings, possibly in June.

In often sensational testimony earlier this year, Johnson's coach, Charlie Francis, also outlined steroid use by the sprinter dating to 1981 up until weeks before the Seoul Olympics and said Johnson was aware of what he was doing.

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - The identity of Pete Rozelle's potential successor is being so tightly guarded that not even the NFL

commissioner knows the names

they said. Those amendments tracked Consumer groups said Lewis' consumer-backed provisions in

Insurance Committee.

After Lewis' ruling, Rep. Eddie Cavazos, one of those leading the charge to restore the Senate provisions, said, "I've just been rolled over by an 18-wheeler by this parliamentary procedure.

Cavazos, D-Corpus Christi, succeeded in getting several end of the debate, he urged his colleagues not to vote on the mismanagement of the State measure.

"We have a bill that has no reform, so we can't vote for it. But we have a bill that we can't kill, because the industry would like that. So the answer is the white ladder," he said referring to the white lights on the House voting board that signal a member who is present but not voting.

The bill passed 98-0, with 48 present but not voting.

Lewis defended his position, saying, "All I'm trying to do is follow the House rules right down the number."

He said amendments must be narrowly drawn in the final days of the session because lawmakers whose bills were kill-

ed in committee will try to get them passed by attaching them to non-related bills. John Hildreth, director of the

southwest regional office of Consumers Union, said Lewis' move was "unconscionable." He said it prevented House members from restoring provisions to make such reforms as subjecting the insurance industry to antitrust laws, tightening regulations of so-called Medigap insurance policies and strengthening the state's office of insurance consumer protection.

But state Rep. John Gavin, D-Wichita Falls, defended the bill that he guided through the House Insurance Committee. He denied that the measure was essentially what insurance lobbyists wanted

"I don't particularly like in-surance companies," Gavin said, but he added, "I don't want to regulate them out of the business."

Insurance reform has become one of the most controversial issues of the session, following a record number of insurance comamendments passed. But at the pany failures and legislative investigations into alleged Board of Insurance.

The House insurance bill will likely be rejected by the Senate and go to a conference committee, lawmakers said.

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox, who was on the House floor during debate on the bill, stated flatly: "The insurance lob-by prevailed today. The big companies prevailed today. The consumer went down in flames.'

Woman held in cult slavings claims innocence, torture

HOUSTON (AP) — The woman described as the high priestess of a drug smuggling cult that practiced human sacrifices at a Matamoros, Mexico-area ranch proclaimed her innocence in a prison interview and said she has been tortured by Mexican authorities.

Sara Aldrete Villareal, tears flooding her eyes and her hands clutching a tissue, told the Houston Post that she was abused by Mexican lawmen demanding details of the torturemutilation slayings of 15 people at the Santa Elena Ranch.

"The police agents, they tortured me: electric shocks, they were suffocating me," the 24-year-old Ms. Aldrete told the newspaper Wednesday during an interview behind bars at the Eastern Penitentiary in Mexico City. "They told me I wasn't saying anything worthwhile, pure filler, but that's what there was."

At least two men in custody in Matamoros in the case — Sergio Martinez Salinas and Elio Hernandez Rivera — also have claimed they were tortured and forced to sign declarations implicating themselves in the killings of University of Texas student Mark Kilroy and 14 others.

'I'm in such a difficult, such an ugly situation. I thought I would be famous in my sports, I wanted to earn a master's degree," Ms. Aldrete said in the copyright

'I swear that I had nothing to do with those rites. I never stopped being Catholic," she said.

"People have said so many things about me. People have done so many things to me," Ms. Aldrete said, insisting she was an innocent victim who knew nothing of Constanzo's crimes until after the bodies were found.

She said she didn't go to the police after learning of Con-

stanzo's crimes because he threatened to harm her family with his "witcheraft."

In her statement to authorities, Ms. Aldrete said she told Alvaro de Leon to just before their capture to "get it over with" and shoot Constanzo and Quintana, who had agreed on a death pact.

"They put that in my declaration," Ms. Aldrete said. "I was screaming, telling them to stop the shooting, but I never said

Two days after her arrival at police headquarters, Ms. Aldrete said, a group of eight police agents blindfolded her and took her to another location, where they tortured her for most of the night, she said.

She said she was given electric shocks, nearly suffocated, beaten and "almost" raped.

When she was taken to the district attorney's office, Ms. Aldrete said the agents told her: 'We are going to do to you all those things that your beloved Constanzo did to others."

Ms. Aldrete admitted she signed her confessions, but added "they did not let me read them."

"I say I am innocent," Ms. Aldrete said.

The House on Wednesday tentatively approved a watereddown insurance reform bill.

Before debate on the bill, vocates blasted House leaders for House Speaker Gib Lewis ruled applying a parlimentary rule that he would not allow consideration of amendments to the ments aimed at tightening bill that were not related to the "solvency" of insurance com-

> Consumer groups said Lewis' action was "improper" and would end up costing insurance

policyholders more money. The decision thwarted attempts by legislators to bring up

several amendments aimed at they said.

Those amendments tracked consumer-backed provisions in the Senate version of the bill that were later removed by the House

Insurance Committee.

After Lewis' ruling, Rep. Eddie Cavazos, one of those leading the charge to restore the Senate protightening industry regulations, visions, said, "I've just been rolled over by an 18-wheeler by this parliamentary procedure.

Cavazos, D-Corpus Christi, succeeded in getting several amendments passed. But at the end of the debate, he urged his colleagues not to vote on the measure.

'We have a bill that has no reform, so we can't vote for it. But we have a bill that we can't kill, because the industry would like that. So the answer is the white ladder," he said referring to the white lights on the House voting board that signal a member who is present but not voting.

The bill passed 98-0, with 48 present but not voting.

Lewis defended his position. saying, "All I'm trying to do is follow the House rules right down the number.'

He said amendments must be narrowly drawn in the final days of the session because lawmakers whose bills were killed in committee will try to get them passed by attaching them to non-related bills.

John Hildreth, director of the southwest regional office of Consumers Union, said Lewis' move was "unconscionable." He said it prevented House members from restoring provisions to make such reforms as subjecting the insurance industry to antitrust laws, tightening regulations of so-called Medigap insurance policies and strengthening the state's office of insurance consumer protection.

But state Rep. John Gavin, D-Wichita Falls, defended the bill that he guided through the House Insurance Committee. He denied that the measure was essentially what insurance lobbyists wanted.

"I don't particularly like in- Board of Insurance. surance companies," Gavin said, but he added, "I don't want to regulate them out of the business."

Insurance reform has become one of the most controversial issues of the session, following a record number of insurance company failures and legislative investigations into alleged mismanagement of the State

The House insurance bill will likely be rejected by the Senate and go to a conference committee, lawmakers said.

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox, who was on the House floor during debate on the bill, stated flatly: "The insurance lobby prevailed today. The big companies prevailed today. The consumer went down in flames.'

Woman held in cult slayings

claims innocence, torture

HOUSTON (AP) — The woman described as the high priestess of a drug smuggling cult that practiced human sacrifices at a Matamoros, Mexico-area ranch proclaimed her innocence in a prison interview and said she has been tortured by Mexican authorities.

Sara Aldrete Villareal, tears flooding her eyes and her hands clutching a tissue, told the Houston Post that she was abused by Mexican lawmen demanding details of the torturemutilation slayings of 15 people at the Santa Elena Ranch.

"The police agents, they tortured me: electric shocks, they were suffocating me," the 24-year-old Ms. Aldrete told the newspaper Wednesday during an interview behind bars at the Eastern Penitentiary in Mexico City. "They told me I wasn't saying anything worthwhile, pure filler, but that's what there was."

stanzo's crimes because he threatened to harm her family with his "witchcraft."

In her statement to authorities, Ms. Aldrete said she told Alvaro de Leon to just before their capture to "get it over with" and shoot Constanzo and Quintana, who had agreed on a death pact.

"They put that in my declara-tion," Ms. Aldrete said. "I was screaming, telling them to stop the shooting, but I never said that.'

Two days after her arrival at police headquarters, Ms. Aldrete said, a group of eight police agents blindfolded her and took her to another location, where they tortured her for most of the night, she said.

She said she was given electric shocks, nearly suffocated, beaten and "almost" raped.

When she was taken to the district attorney's office, Ms. Aldrete said the agents told her: We are going to do to you all those things that your beloved Constanzo did to others.'

Ms. Aldrete admitted she signed her confessions, but added they did not let me read them."

"I say I am innocent," Ms. Aldrete said.


