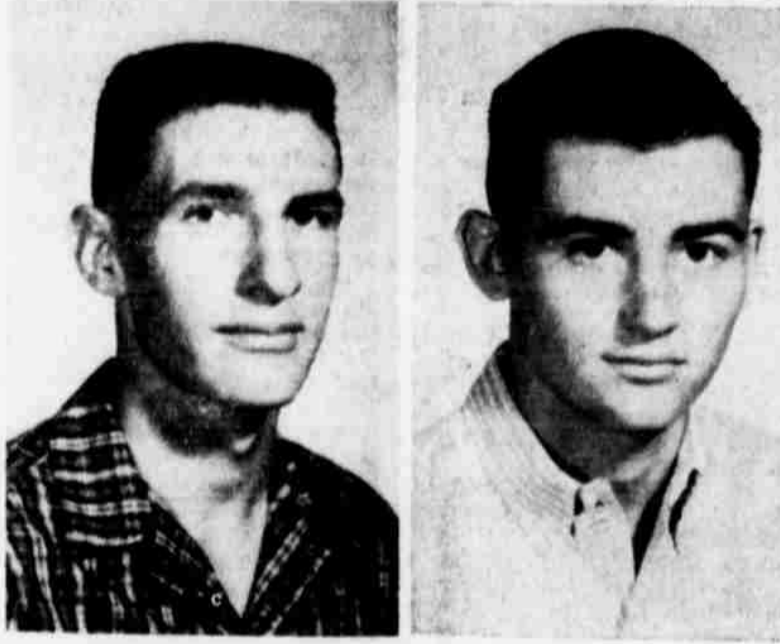

## Haskell Horse Show Is Scheduled Saturday

### Stonewall County Sheriff's Posse "Cops" First Place In Rodeo Parade

The fourth annual Jaycee-sponsored Rice Springs Roundup and Rodeo opened here last Thursday night with ominous thunderheads boiling overhead. Only the "grand entry" and one event was completed before a deluge of rainfall shut-down activities for the first night's performance.

A large, enthusiastic crowd was on hand Friday night, but Saturday night's performance was rained out, and was reset for Tuesday night of this week, but was again rained out, ending this year's rodeo.

The one event which was completed the first night before the "rains came" was the bareback bronc riding contest, with 11 entries on the agenda. Those qualified were Ken Speck of Seymour, Arville Brown of Illinois, Billy Cruson and Ken Norvell, both of Lewisville, Wilbert Tutt of Iowa Park, Darrell Rhodes and Cecil Richardson, both of Abilene and Johnny Reed of O'Brien.

The opening day parade, under the supervision of C. O. Holt, got underway Friday at 5:00 p. m. sharp, as the crack Haskell High School band led the visiting riding clubs, antique cars, Little Leaguers and others around the courthouse square. Haskell's Riding Club, the "much publicized" Saddle Tramps, concluded the long line of riders.

The Bar-B-Q at the Corral building at 6:30 p. m., Thursday, drew long lines of "searchers for chow." The line began forming before 6:00 and kept filling through until the rodeo officially got underway at 8 o'clock.

**Awarded Trophy**  
The Stonewall County Sheriff's Posse from Aspermont was awarded a trophy as the best visiting riding club. The Stamford Junior Riding Club was second and the Seymour Remuda, third.

**Friday Night**  
Jim Brock took first place Friday night in the bareback riding event as the rodeo went into the second night. Bulldozers replaced bulls in the arena as attempts were made to get the ground in shape but two of the events had to be postponed.

Brock was the only cowboy to qualify Friday night in the saddle bronc event.

Sidney Johnson placed second in the bareback contest and Pat Alexander was third.

In the girls barrel racing, Carol Mathus led with 31.2 seconds, followed by Donna Renfro with 32.1, Nancy Tucker with 33.4 and Sandra Hargraves with 41.5.

Due to the condition of the arena there were no calf roping or ribbon roping contests on Friday night.

## Robert King Named To Head Masonic Home

Former Haskell School Superintendent, Robert R. King, has been named to head the Masonic Home and School in Fort Worth. King has been superintendent of schools in Vernon since 1963, and will assume his new duties on July 1, according to an announcement by the Board of Directors of the Home and School.

Prior to his service in Vernon, King was superintendent of schools in Haskell, Rochester and Girard, Texas. He had also served in other capacities in Spur, Silverton and Girard, Texas, school systems. His school experience dates back to 1937.

As superintendent at Masonic Home and School King will supervise and be administrator of a staff of 100 persons who are teachers or otherwise provide guidance and leadership for the children living at the 212-acre facility in Fort Worth.

King is current president for District Seven of the Texas State Teachers Assn., a member of the executive committee of the Texas Association of School Administrators and is secretary of the committee on Public Education of the Grand Lodge of Texas.

King is married to the former Jo Robinson of Abilene and they have two daughters.

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## CHALLENGES OF GROWTH

### SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK

"Life is a series of challenges. From the first uncertain steps of a little child to the last few faltering steps of an old person, life is one challenge after another," states the Rev. Lewis W. Newman, D.R.E., of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Soil Stewardship Week provides annually a time when we can express unto God our gratitude for His Blessings upon our land and our willingness to be faithful stewards.

As people committed to the idea of conservation, we are continually faced with challenges such as lack of understanding, desire for profits at the risk of destruction, and distorted values that overlook the worth of the individual. We do not have to face these challenges alone. God will help his people.

With steadily gathering momentum, our nation is growing along the uncharted avenues of unprecedented growth. It is a many-sided growth, marked by the present fact and future prospect of more people and more production, more power and more problems.

Growth unleashes great new challenges to man—to his courage, his vision, his heart, and reason. The acorn of growth is a gift of God, neither new nor final. It is the fruit and the seed—the capability and opportunity—He has given us to test our maturity and our readiness to share in His plans for a richer, better world. If we use it wisely, according to His laws, we can move a step closer to the glory of His light and discover still greater vistas of challenge and fulfillment.

To see, it is necessary to look. The temptation, under the trials of daily living, is to see only what is directly at hand. Our God-given supplies of land and water are limited and He expects us to care for them as responsible stewards, using them wisely.

Today, we seem to have more than enough land and almost enough water in America. We are even plagued by surplus supplies of some farm commodities. We retire land from cultivation and put it into a Reserve. Government experts tell us we have extra acres—about 50 million—unneded for crop production during the next 10 or 15 years.

The responsible steward knows that our population in the United States may nearly double by the end of the century. At the present rate of population gain, we will need 50 per cent more agricultural production by 1980—and an estimated 120 per cent more by 2000.

Our Creator decreed there would be variety in land, with uplands and lowlands, wetlands and drylands, some fertile and some barren. He has a purpose for each and it could now be our critical task, as we join vision with prudence, to look for the right uses and see His prime purpose for each and do what must be done to comply, at last, with His plans.

To the responsible steward, growth represents a panorama of progress stretching from the past into the future, demanding judgement. For this task man's Creator has endowed him with intellect, vision, and the power of choice. It is in the exercise of this power that man can act to shape his destiny.

Little by little, man has been moving to the wiser, fuller use of his power. In the process, he has pursued knowledge as a requisite to understanding, and applied values to facts as a preface to decision.

Choice is the fruit of judgement. The prospect of wise judgement is enhanced by deliberation and careful planning. We try to identify early mistakes, build on what has been good, and chart a course which will take us, in the days and years ahead, to more fruitful, satisfying life of dignity and service under God.

Growth challenges us to plan carefully against waste, and to develop wisely for the greatest good. We establish soil and water conservation districts, resource planning commissions, zoning boards, river basin planning bodies, and other instruments to consider facts and trends, identify alternatives, and recommend choices. We plan to end soil erosion, which undermines productivity; control the horizontal sprawl of communities which can be wasteful and ugly; and preserve for ready access some areas where man may find serenity as well as recreation in nature. We seek to rid our streams of pollution and protect our forests from disease and fire. We look forward to finding and achieving the best uses for each acre and each stream.

Among all the challenges of growth God now sets before us, none surpasses as tests of imagination and responsibility for planning and development of His resources.

**The Good Earth**

I visited the Charlie Quattlebaum's shady retreat today. Mr. Quattlebaum is a great garden enthusiast, and the many plants gracing his yard reflects his ability as a gardener.

Large trees turn the front yard into a cool, inviting resting area. St. Augustine grass forms a green carpet beneath the trees.

Mr. Quattlebaum has propagated many plants by seeds and root cuttings. One bougainvillea plant has branched out into nine new plants, taken from cuttings.

Mrs. Quattlebaum takes great pride in her husband's cuttings and displays them with a proud twinkle in her eyes.

Geranium, cacti, oleanders and wax leaf ligustrum are a few more plants Mr. Quattlebaum has propagated from cuttings.

A peach tree in the backyard is surrounded by a lacy bed of dusty miller. Pampas plumes vie with dutch and spuria irises for attention. Dahlias, malva, digitalis, purple and orange lantana are planted in graceful beds throughout the backyard.

Mr. Quattlebaum dug a bushel basket of crocus bulbs from his back yard. These he will re-plant in the next two or three months. These bulbs give a golden yellow display in the fall. So prolific are fall crocus. Mr. Quattlebaum not only harvested the bushel basket of bulbs, but he has a long row of the flowers in his back alley turning it into a thing of beauty in the fall.

The Quattlebaums went to the river a few years back and dug two cedar trees that are now growing in their yard. These trees are much prettier than in

their natural habitat. Besides their yard, that has flowers too numerous to mention, the Quattlebaums have a large vegetable garden of rich, healthy green plants. That promise a bountiful harvest soon.

Malva is a red flower with a long red sepal that so resembles an inverted cap, the flowers are often called monkcap. The scarlet blossoms never open, but droop their heads and keep tightly folded. The red flower and sepal reminds somewhat of a bleeding heart thus malva is mistakenly called bleeding heart.

The botanical name for malva is "malvaiscus." Malva is Latin for mallow of which the flower is a member. Hibiscus, okra, cotton and althea are close cousins to the malva.

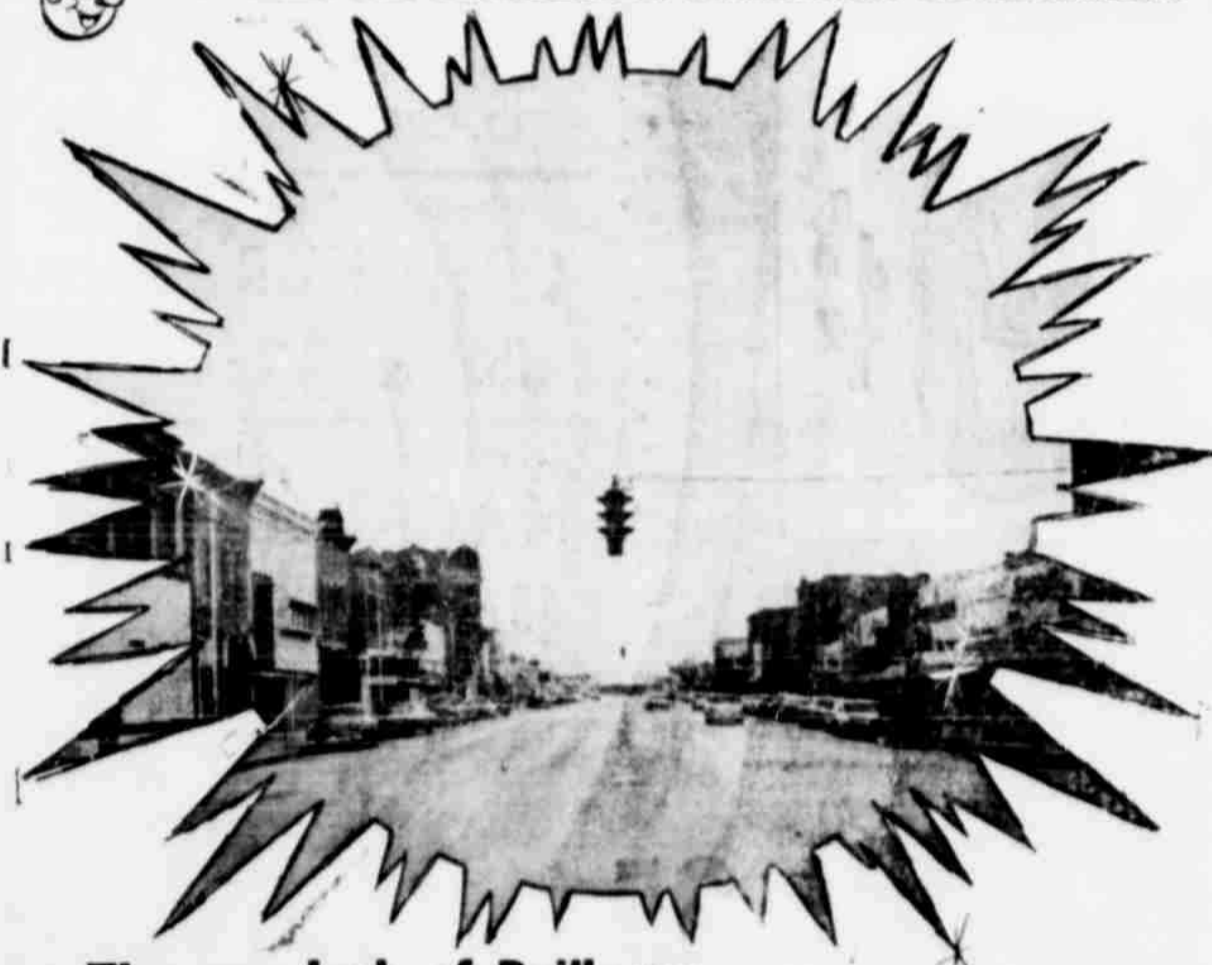

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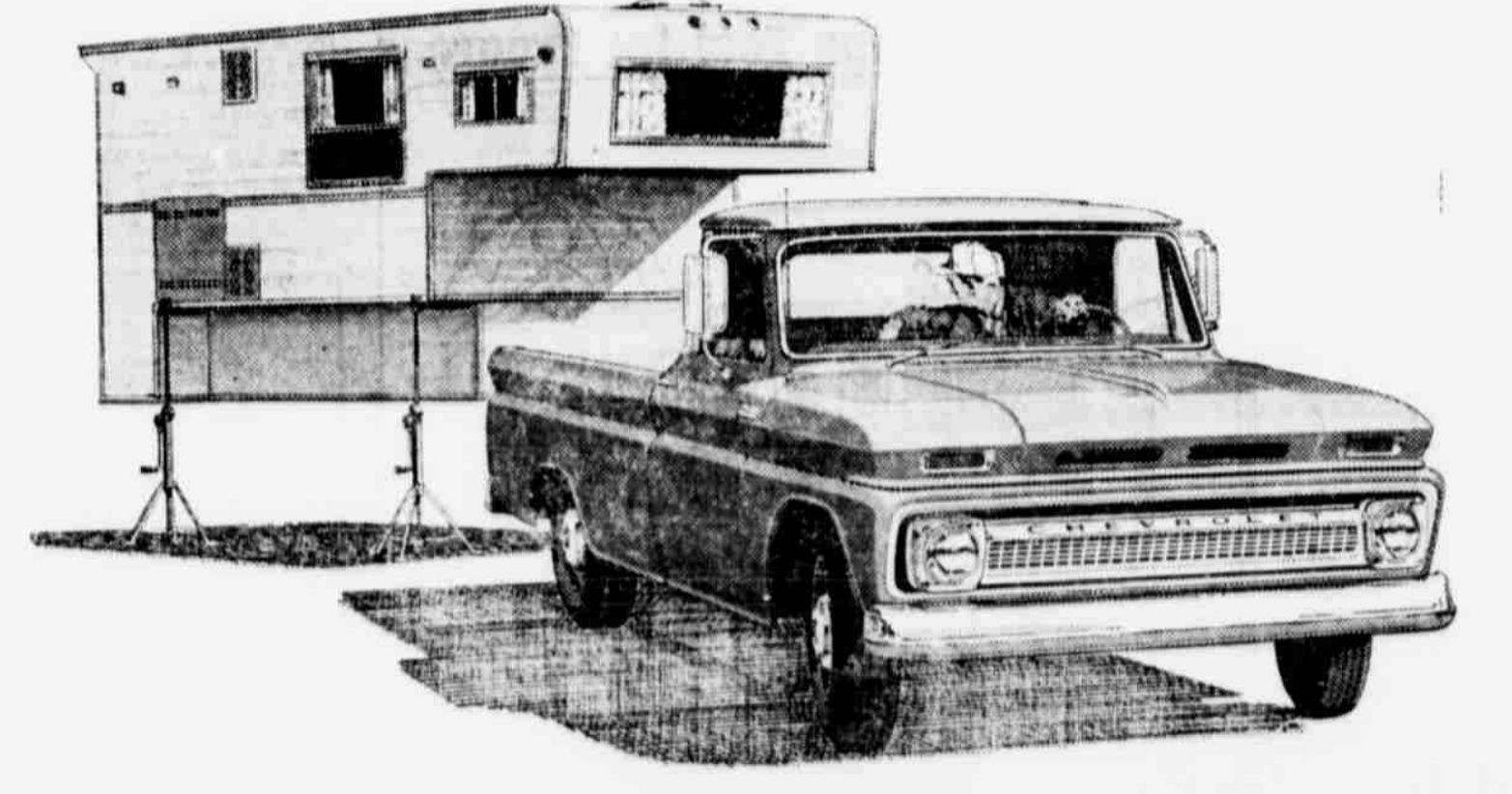

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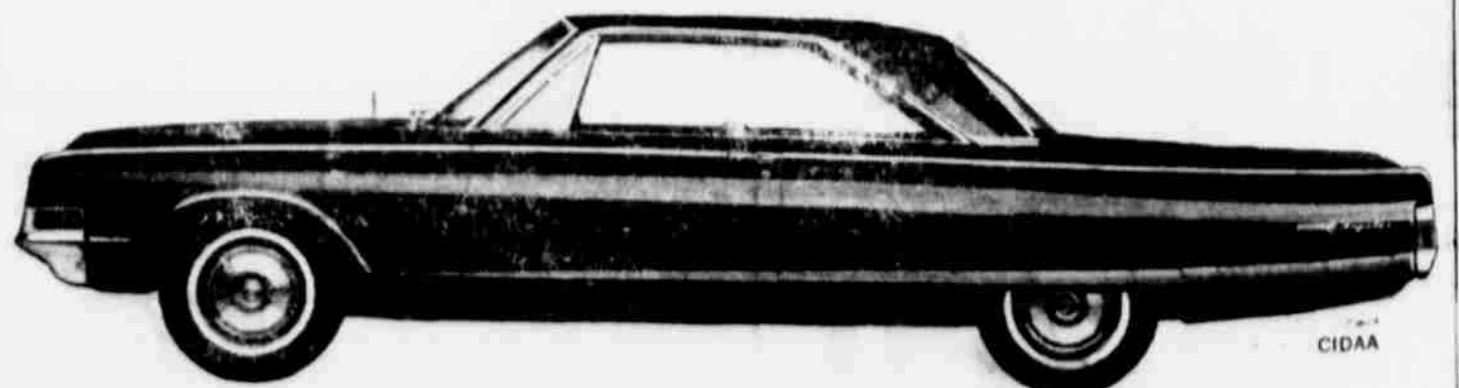

# Prattle

Prattler sees and talks to John Crawford most every day, as he makes his way to and from the post office. He still has his genial smile, and greets you with "It's a good day." Thank God, for men like Uncle "John."

The Prattler's son, Larry Hinds, graduating senior of Paducah High School, recently received the "Award of Excellence" for dependability, cooperation, musicianship and promising future at the annual band concert held at Paducah last week. On Monday morning of this week he received the coveted Arion Foundation Award, as the outstanding musical student at Paducah High. Larry will attend Texas Tech, Lubbock, next year and plans to enter the field of "dentistry."

A digest of the progress report of the Soil Conservation Service during 1964 reveals a very busy year.

The SCS devoted increased effort in fiscal 1964 to helping communities make broad plans for orderly use and development and resources to improve local economy.

SCS assigned project coordinators, and provided specialized technical assistance to 10 Resource Conservation and Development Projects authorized by the Secretary of Agriculture early in the year.

It provided basic data, resource maps, and consultation to many local committees and inter-agency groups engaged in resource and land use planning.

At the same time, SCS assistance to private land owners and local agencies resulted in more rapid progress in most aspects of soil and water conservation. SCS provided direct services to 1,123,801 land owners and oper-

ators, an increase of 8 per cent over the previous year. Of these, 753,425 applied one or more conservation practices, an increase of 13 per cent.

Throughout the country, co-operators did significantly more contour farming, crop residue management, strip cropping, windbreak planting, pond building, irrigation water management, and wildlife habitat improvement, than in 1963.

Yearly, Jr., Work Unit Conservationist, USDA Soil Conservation Service, concerning "Soil Stewardship Week." As Mr. Yearly pointed out, "Soil Stewardship Week provides annually a time when we can express unto God our gratitude for His blessings upon our land and our willingness to be faithful Stewards."

The general increase in conservation accomplishment in fiscal 1964 was achieved with less than 1 per cent in miltipower or funds. Between 2 and 3 million acres of cropland was converted to other uses as a result of conservation plans established on farms and ranches and in watershed projects.

Concerning the "Great Plains Conservation Program," land owners and operators signed 3,719 contracts covering complete conservation plans on 5,453,644 acres during fiscal 1964, making a total of 18,121 cost-sharing contracts on 33,882,548 acres.

The new contracts include plans for 248,628 acres of cropland conversion, or approximately a fourth of the existing cropland on the farm and ranches. Total cropland conversion planned to date in the program amounts to 1,112,333 acres, or 23 per cent of the cropland before planning.

Why all these facts and figures? Simply because the SCS and other agencies are "going all-out" in trying to preserve this precious soil... and my good readers, where would we be without the soil? It just points out that we are, and we must continue, to "save the soil"... need we say more?

## Expanded Program to Provide Rural Telephone Service In Haskell Area

An expanded and comprehensive program to provide rural telephone service to more than 40 customers residing in the exchange area of Haskell has been announced by F. A. Robinette, district manager for General Telephone Co. of the Southwest. Under the new program, rural areas within 500 feet of a public right-of-way are provided multi-party service for a flat monthly rate.

The rates are developed by zones and are based primarily on the distance from town and the concentration of customers in the particular area.

The district manager pointed out that in the past the much higher cost of new telephone lines in rural areas have often made it necessary to require applicants to contribute to the cost of construction so that an undue burden would not be placed on other customers in the exchange.

Now, under the present economic circumstances and with the assistance of detailed surveys, careful engineering and effective sales effort, all applicants for rural telephone service can be provided service without contributing to the cost of construction of new lines along the public right-of-way.

Many of the construction required to complete the rural service improvement program will be the placing of specially insulated cable underground, which eliminates service interruptions caused by severe weather conditions such as high winds, hail, ice, etc.

The district manager stressed that the important feature of the entire program is the fact that all applicants residing

within 500 feet of a public right-of-way will be served upon application for service—without additional construction charges and for only a regular monthly zoned rate.

There will be very few changes in the rate at Haskell due to the fact that we are now charging on a mileage basis and this applies to the zoning charge.

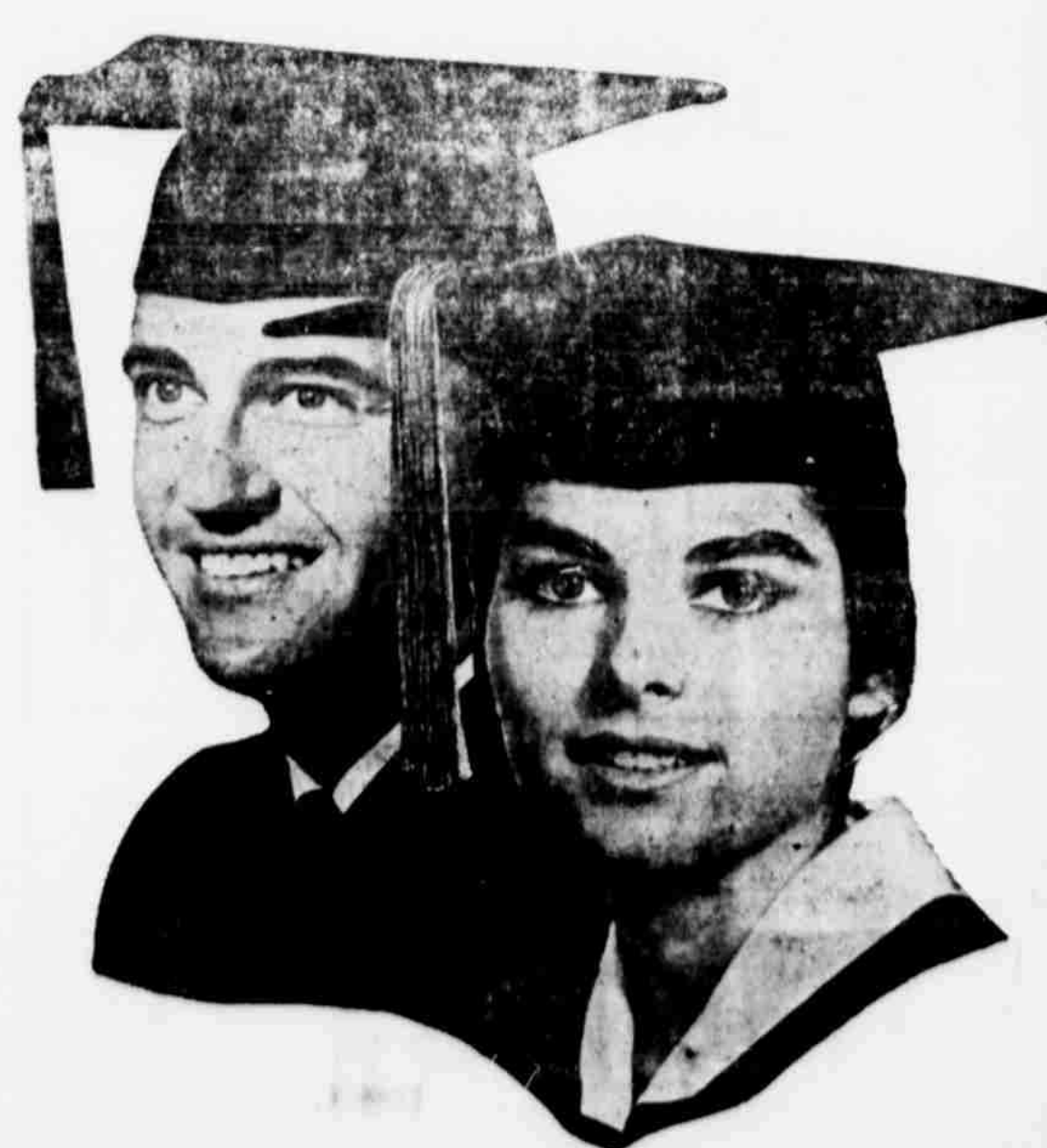
