GTE rates

AUSTIN (AP) - GTE Southwest Inc. says it will fight in court a \$59.2 million annual rate cut and \$128 million customer refund ordered by the Public Utility Commission, which has refused to reconsider its decision.

Before the panel voted 2-1 against reopening the case Wednesday — the second time it has made that decision — one commissioner blasted a document filed by the company to urge the PUC to take new action.

In the document, GTE said of the decision that "like revisionist history in Stalin's Russia, it rewrites the facts to suit the new party line, ignoring the truth where the truth is inconvenient."

Bond denied

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — A Canadian couple and a Swedish man remain jailed after they were denied bond for charges accusing them of conspiring to illegally export more than \$600 million worth of military equipment to Iran.

After two days of testimony, U.S. Magistrate Eduardo E. de Ases on Wednesday ordered Eileen and Ronald Hilton Arab, both 52, of Vancouver, British Columbia, and Erik Nissen, 62, of Norrkoping, Sweden, held without bond.

The trio was arrested May 25 and charged with violating the Arms Export Control Act, money laundering and conspiracy.

Hidden AIDS

BOSTON (AP) — Some people infected with the AIDS virus may elude screening tests intended to protect blood banks because they produce no telltale antibodies against the lethal virus for years, researchers reported today.

Widely used screening tests cannot see the AIDS virus directly. Instead, they search for antibodies that people produce as part of their natural reaction to infection.

Cisneros leaves public office quietly

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Buck-recently told the San Antonio ported. ing some political observers' predictions of immediate aspirations to higher office, Mayor Henry Cisneros leaves City Hall today and quietly enters private

The 41-year-old Cisneros served 14 years in the public sector, six as a city council member and the last eight as mayor of a city that grew to the country's ninth

Cisneros was a driving force in the community whose influence was felt statewide and nationwide, observers said.

"I think that if I had drafted a plan for how I wanted these eight years to go, it would not have been as ambitious," Cisneros

"I could not have predicted the levels of success that have materialized for San Antonio," he said. "It's been better and more exhilarating than I expected."

Returning to office is Lila Cockrell, who preceded Cisneros as mayor from 1975-81. She returns after winning election over six other candidates last

One of the country's top Hispanic leaders, Cisneros wooed businesses such as Sea World and the future Opryland USA to the city and bridged gaps between feuding Hispanics and Anglos.

"One way or another, he'll be back," U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, said. "And we'll be the better for it."

Cisneros' latest victory was voter approval in January of a public transportation tax to fund construction of the Alamodome stadium, which he strongly sup- more than 1 million in 1988.

But Cisneros declined to seek a fifth term after being besieged by personal problems, including a troubled marriage and the health of his son. He plans to join an asset management firm in San Antonio.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor says I have trichomoniasis. What is this and how is it treated?

DEAR READER: Trichomoniasis is a common infection in male and female reproductive tracts. It is caused by a tiny parasite, called trichomonas, that infects the vagina, the prostate gland or the bladder. Spread by sexual contact, trichomonas usually cause few, if any symptoms: slight discharge, rawness and pain. With severe infections, however, women may suffer from a pronounced vaginal irritation, resulting in copious discharge with swelling and soreness of the external genitals. Men may experience an uncomfortable penile discharge that can lead to prostate infection with pain and fever.

Diagnosis is established by a "wet prep," in which a drop of the discharge is diluted and examined under a microscope. The parasite is readily visible. Trichomonas can also be identified by culture (growing them in the lab) and are sometimes seen on routine Pap-test slides in women without symptoms.

Flagyl, a prescription pill taken for seven to 10 days, is usually effective in treating the disorder. Sexual partners, whether or not they have symptoms, should also be given a course of

DEAR DR. GOTT: I was a little annoyed you did not offer a zinc solution for the 16 year-old girl with a perspiration problem. I always had a horrible problem with perspiration until I took zinc on a daily basis. This must never be taken on an empty stomach or it will make you deathly ill; yet properly administered, it really

DEAR READER: I am sorry you were annoyed by my answer, but I'm

glad you wrote. Some patients have noted that zinc supplements will aid perspiration odor but no consistent benefit has been observed in medical studies. The Recommended Daily Allowance for zinc is 15 milligrams per day for an

adult. Doses above that level will cause stomach upset and can result in anemia (by interfering with the metabolism of copper). Huge doses can be fatal. I suggest that anyone wishing to take zinc supplements do so only under medical guidance.

Texas teenager cleared in death

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico for lack of evidence, but Martin (AP) — A district judge has ruled remained in custody. there was not enough evidence to convict a Texas teen-ager of killing a Juarez policeman a year ago and has freed the youth.

Kelly Martin, 19, of Dell City, was grinning as he walked out of the CeReSo prison about noon Tuesday after more than a year of captivity.

"You bet I'm happy! I'm 19, but I feel like I've aged to 30,' Martin said. "I can't wait to be across (the border)."

Juarez District Judge Flor Aguilar Casas acquitted Martin on Monday of murder and attempted murder charges. Martin the alley to search them," she had been accused of fatally said. morning of May 7, 1988.

A couple of hours after he had been freed, Martin, his mother Gail and attorney Miguel Angel Luevano visited the judge in her courtroom to thank her for the verdict. Martin kissed her hand after a handshake.

The judge said the conclusive evidence was a gunpowder test on Martin's hands that showed he

had not fired a gun. Martin and another teen-ager, Rawn Yates, were arrested hours after the shootings. Yates was released several days later

Martin maintained his innocence and said a friend now living in Arizona — who was never arrested - shot the officers after

Ms. Aguilar's decision could be appealed by the Chihuahua state district attorney — a decision that has yet to be made - but Martin cannot be jailed again unless he returns voluntarily to Mexico, the judge said.



Had North bid four hearts, East wouldsurely have tried five diamonds. The normal result then would be five diamonds doubled, played by East-West, and set 100 points. I know it is possible for the defenders to get another trick if they cash only one high heart and then play ace, king and another club, scoring a ruffing trick with North's queen of diamonds. That's a hard defense to find.

Anyway North bid only three hearts, and East bid only four diamonds. And everyone passed when South continued with four hearts. Strange bidding, but it set the stage for a clever demonstration of suit preference on defense. West led the king of diamonds, on which East played the jack. Since East had bid diamonds, he certainly could not be looking to ruff the third round of the suit. Obviously his jack of diamonds was begging West to shift to a spade. West dutifully played the four of spades at trick two, and East took the A-K and gave West a ruff to set four hearts.

All well and good, but it's too much tiptoeing through the tulips for me. I'll bid five diamonds with the East hand and take my chances. After all, sometimes the bidding goes the same way and partner's clubs are headed by the ace instead of the Q-J-10.





Juarez pushes out street vendors due to new plan

(AP) - Juarez's downtown stuff." renovation is almost complete with the virtual elimination of a maze of market stalls just south of the cathedral, officials say.

About dawn on Tuesday, three dozen commerce inspectors swept through the 18-square-block area. By noon, they had dismantled about 50 sidewalk stalls and had forced about 250 other vendors to move.

The sweep marked the beginning of the last phase of the renovation program know as Nuestro Centro Our Downtown. In about a month, officials said, downtown will be should be patched and welllighted, traffic signs and medians should be freshly painted and the police presence should be strengthened.

In addition to making the streets cleaner and safer, the revitalization program is putting some vendors out of work.

"This isn't a new Juarez, it's a hungry Juarez," said Maria Gonzalez as she and a partner dismantled and carried away their produce stand on orders from commerce inspectors. "They told me if I didn't do it myself, they would do it for me.

"Twenty-five years selling can-dy here," she said. "What am I going to do now? I don't know

Crafts demonstrated at national gathering

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Out on the lonesome plain, the scrubby brush country or the trails that connect the two, a cowboy can get mighty bored.

Hence the genesis in the 19th century of the cowboy poet, who memorized poetry and recited verses to calm the cattle.

The genre has outlasted the great cattle drives of the early 20th century, and its modern practitioners are scheduled to gather Friday for a celebration of cowboy culture and arts.

The National Cowboy Symposium and Celebration June 2-4 will draw more than 250 authorities on cowboy culture to display, discuss and demonstrate everything from team calf roping to handmade boots to Western yodeling. The event is sponsored by Texas Tech University.

Western writers and cowboy poets love and often romanticize their way of life, said Texas Tech English professor Kenneth W.

"Cowboy poets and Western fiction writers, although highly individualistic, are tradi-tionalists," he said. "They take pride in traditional values courage, dignity, integrity, rugged individualism, freedom, loyalty and honesty."

Discussion panels will examine the roles of both women and black cowboys in shaping the American West.

"We've tried to cover every aspect of this Western culture, said Alvin Davis, executive vice president of Texas Tech's Ranching Heritage Association.

In addition to panel discussions, performances by the cowboy poets and musicians will be held. Two of the nation's foremost cowboy poets, Baxter Black and Carlos Ashley, will attend, along with Western musician Red Steagall and yodeler Don Edwards.

Some newcomers will get their chance to recite their own compositions.

And Democratic Attorney General Jim Mattox said, "I think it's a tragedy for the state of Texas." He especially cited the areas of defense contracts and the \$4.4 billion superconducting super collider proposed for construction near Waxahachie but still unfunded.

But Waxahachie Mayor James Self, while concerned about loss of any support, said Texas Senators Lloyd Bensten and Phil Gramm have been more "out front" in support of the atom smasher, which could bring an estimated 4,000 construction and 3,500 permanent jobs to the town just south of Dallas.

"Whether or not (Wright's) loss is going to affect the super collider is a matter of conjecture," Self said, adding he wishes Congress would address the funding of the project as a scientific necessity and not a political

Figures for 1986, the latest year available, show the importance of federal spending in Texas. In that year, direct federal spending was \$47.58 billion, with \$16.9 billion of it in defense outlays.

In Wright's home county of Tarrant, which includes parts of two other Congressional Districts, the federal government spent \$6.67 billion. That compares, for example, with Dallas County's \$4.67 billion in federal receipts the same year. The Dallas-Fort Worth area ac-

counts for more than 60 percent of total defense outlays in the state.

But minutes later they fell silent as Wright said, "I give you Deaths 'rough'

AUSTIN (AP) - The clubbing and subsequent fire deaths of three children, apparently at the hands of their father who also died, was "one of the roughest things" a judge investigating the deaths says he's ever seen.

"I've seen a lot ... but this tops all of them," said Williamson County Justice of the Peace Jimmy Bitz, who conducted an inquest into the deaths of Illian Dunlop, 9, Ivan Dunlop, 7, and Sacha Lucia Dunlop, 5, and their father, John Donald Dunlop, 40.

Bitz said Wednesday he ruled the children's deaths homicides and their father's death a suicide.

Autopsies on the children revealed that the boys were knocked unconscious with a hammer before a fire was set with gasoline in their bedroom about 5:30 a.m. Monday, Bitz said.

Because of burns to the girl's body, head injuries could not be determined, but investigators think she too was struck, Bitz said.

"No doubt ... the children were unconscious when the fire was started," Bitz said.

All four died of carbon monoxide poisoning from the fire's fumes, Bitz said.

The children's mother, Maria Teresa Thompson, 42, couldn't push open the barricaded bedroom door after she heard one of the children scream, Bitz said. She suffered minor burns to her feet.


