have to be assigned elsewhere. The so-called "second appraisal" consists of an assessment during the fall term of all district teachers, one which Austin. serves as a backup for "primary" teacher evaluation conducted by campus principals.

During the spring term, another round of second appraisals is required for teachers who have not been selected for Level II on the career ladder.

Also Thursday, trustees are expected to decide on the site for next year's home basketball games for the Snyder High School boys team.

During a work session May 30, several members of the board said they felt a change back to the local high school gymnasium would "bring the crowd back into the game.

Tornado hits

GROSSE TETE, La. (AP) - A tornado swept through a block of businesses and trailers early today, and several people were reported killed.

"There are several injuries, several fatalities,' said Kathy St. Angelo, wife of Police Chief Aubrey St. Angelo. "I can't confirm how many, how many fatalities, how many injuries. From what I understand, a whole block was laid out. It's pretty bad." St. Angelo was unavailable, she said.

Our Lady of the Lake Hospital in Baton Rouge said about 10 injured people from Grosse Tete had been brought there.

Sheriff's deputies said they could not confirm anything except that a tornado had hit Grosse Tete, a town of about 750 situated 15 miles west of the capital.

FBI hunting fugitives back to 1967



Three allegedly killed or robbed for radical causes. One was accused of killing a police officer. One was charged with poisoning his estranged wife's drink and one with bludgeoning his family.

They are six FBI fugitives wanted longer than John Emil List, the church-going accountant authorities say was arrested in Virginia last week for the 1971 fatal shootings of his wife, mother and three children in Westfield, N.J.

DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: What are steroids and what is it about them that causes all the bad effects we've been reading about lately? Is there anything good about them?

DEAR READER: Steroids are naturally occurring substances made in the body. They help balance the body's chemical reactions and, in the proper quantity, are necessary for

Supplemental steroids (by pill or injection) play an important role in treating diseases. For example, steroids such as cortisone and prednisone reduce the body's immune response, our ability to produce an inflammatory reaction. Therefore, they are used for a variety of conditions characterized by excessive inflammation, including autoimmune diseases (allergies to the patient's own body), arthritis, colitis, asthma and so forth.

Despite their proven benefits, these drugs cause unwanted side effects when used in large doses or for extended periods. These effects include cataracts, diabetes, osteoporosis, mental changes, alteration of facial characteristics, bruising and susceptibility to infection, to mention a few. Therefore, cortisone (and similar drugs) should be used only under close medical supervision and as specific therapy for certain diseases.

Other types of steroids affect the body in different ways. For instance, they promote muscle growth, alter sexual characteristics or cause positive nitrogen balance, as a way to enhance the buildup of tissues. These consequences help particular disease states, if the drugs are administered by trained medical personnel.

Many of the problems you have read about, such as the illicit use of steroids by athletes, stem from the self-administration of potent, musclebuilding compounds by people who are not versed in their use. Such people take steroids for cosmetic - not medical - reasons or to increase athletic performance. The practice is unhealthful. Like cortisone, these drugs have side-effects, including disruption of growth patterns in adolescents, liver inflammation, personality changes and (possibly) premature heart disease. Difficulties arise because the steroids are being used improperly, for the wrong reasons.



Unnatural procedure

When the declarer is confronted with particularly nasty distribution, he may be forced to play in an unnatural manner. Had South caught a par-

ticularly bad dummy, he might have had little play for four spades, but a six-card major suit plus an A-K on the side is enough to gamble the game. And dummy was quite adequate.

Declarer took the ace of hearts and immediately cashed the ace of spades. When West showed out, declarer had to hope for good fortune someplace other than in trumps. So declarer played a club back to his king and led the 10 of diamonds. West won the ace and continued with the jack of hearts to dummy's king. The king of diamonds allowed South to shed his losing heart, but he still had to lose two more trump tricks and a club

To make the contract, declarer must come to his hand with the king of clubs and continue by cashing the ace of clubs. Then he can lead up to dummy's diamond king. West wins the ace but cannot take a club trick When West continues with a heart, declarer wins in dummy, plays king of diamonds shedding a club, and then ruffs a club. He can now return to dummy with the other high spade to get rid of his losing heart on a good club.

It seems unnatural to set up a club trick for the defense before leading up to the king of diamonds, but that is the only way the contract can be made. For it is the foundation of the family and society, without which there would be neither civilization nor progress.

Don't for a minute believe that a woman has to take her husband's name to ensure the legitimacy of their children. Assuming the husband's name is a custom in the United States, not a law. If a bride retains her maiden name, neither the child's legitimacy nor birth certificate will be affected since the mother's maiden name appears on this in all cases. However, some states may request clarification if the child is not to

"We are making progress, and I think we will be able to make a vaccine eventually," said Dr. Clifford H. Lane, head of AIDS vaccine testing at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

Despite the encouraging results reported Wednesday, many important questions remain about whether this - or any vaccine can keep people from catching AIDS.

Similar vaccines have failed to prevent AIDS virus infections in chimpanzees.





Deadly twisters race across North Texas, 5 injured

By The Associated Press

A half-dozen twisters ripped through homes and a school, injuring at least five people, as strong storms spawned by an upper-level disturbance raced across North Texas.

A tornado watch was posted early today for 19 counties in South Central Texas, including the metropolitan Corpus Christi area, and another 17 counties in the southeastern part of the state, including Houston.

The National Weather Service said moist, tropical air welling up from the Gulf made conditions ripe for twisters.

Four people were injured about 6:30 p.m. Wednesday after a twister hit the Gary community in Panola County on the Texas-Louisiana border. The tornado, which some witnesses described as a mile wide, destroyed several

hour after the tornado ripped it winds.

apart, sheriff's deputy John DePresco said, adding the injuries were not serious.

"We won't have any exact numbers until early tomorrow, but we estimate that between 15 and 20 homes and other structures were destroyed in about a mile-wide path," he said late Wednesday.

Another resident, Mark White, barely escaped his mobile home before the tornado tossed it about in the air.

"We heard the noise and decided to get out of the house," White said. "We were sitting in the car on the highway, looking back, and saw trees flying in the air and our trailer rolling along over and over."

Witnesses said a tornado also struck an elementary school and homes near the intersection of two businesses at Coppell in Farm-to-Market Roads 1970 and Dallas County, causing one minor injury. 


