Royce will come of it?" "I'm convinced something is happening, whatever it is," said Oliver Murphy, assistant direc-tor of the Center for Elec-trochemistry at Texas A&M. "We've been going at it almost three months now by siphoning funds from other projects. Some (government) money should be thrown at this. Not billions of dollars, but millions at least."





'Aging' fighters meet once more in lucrative bout · de

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Sugar Ray Leonard and Thomas Hearns, a pair of flashy welterweights with unlimited futures when they first fought, meet again in a lucrative rematch that almost certainly will end at least one career.

Seven years and nine months after Leonard stopped Hearns in the 14th round of a classic battle for the undisputed welterweight title, the two aging fighters return to the ring at Caesars Palace for a scheduled 12-round fight for Leonard's World Boxing Council 168-pound title.

For Leonard, 33, the fight is a chance to add another \$13 million to his already bloated bank account while seeing how much of his once remarkable skill he retains.

For Hearns, it's his last chance for vindication, and perhaps his last hurrah as a fighter.

'Thomas has to win this fight," said Emanuel Steward, his longtime trainer and manager. "If not, he's finished as far as boxing goes, pure and simple.

Leonard, a 7-5 favorite when the two first met Sept. 16, 1981, enters the ring a 3-1 favorite this time. The fight, which will be televised on pay-per-view and closed circuit, is scheduled to begin about 7:45 p.m. PDT.

Leonard, who has fought only 33 rounds in four fights since the first Hearns bout, is coming off a less than spectacular ninth-round knockout of Donny Lalonde, who knocked Leonard down in the fourth round with a right hand.

Unlike the Leonard of old, he fought flat-footed against Lalonde, though he showed good hand speed and power.

"If the Ray Leonard who fought Donny Lalonde fights Monday night, he will get flattened," said Angelo Dundee, who worked Leonard's corner before splitting with the fighter in a contract dispute before the Lalonde fight.







Children may face bleak future

HOUSTON (AP) — Many children of illegal aliens who have been granted amnesty will have trouble finding legitimate work or attending college because of a flaw in immigration laws, experts say

Children who arrived in the United States after the amnesty cutoff of Jan 1, 1982, are considered illegal aliens, even though one or both parents may have qualified for amnesty.

Amnesty advocates say that unless immigration laws are changed, the situation will force many to graduate from high school to settle for menial labor jobs, where they risk being arrested and deported.

"They will be a sad group of young people in terms of opportunities available to them," said Vanna Slaughter, director of the Catholic Charities immigration counseling services program in Dallas, told The Houston Post.

U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service officials said they have no estimate of how many children are in the predicament of being illegal aliens while one or both of their parents has obtained legal immigration status by qualifying for amnesty.


Actress explains how she made it through trial



DEAR DR. GOTT: Please provide information on aplastic anemia. What are the symptoms and will the situation reverse itself?

DEAR READER: Aplastic anemia refers to a condition in which the cells in the bone marrow stop producing new blood cells. This results in a decrease in red blood corpuscles (anemia), as well as a reduction in circulating white blood cells (leukopenia) and platelets (thrombocytopenia.)

This disease is serious because blood cells play a vital role in maintaining health. Aplastic anemia is an uncommon consequence of acute viral illness (especially in children); in such cases, the bone marrow usually recovers and the situation reverses itself without treatment. Similarly, certain drugs (notably, tranquilizers and anti-convulsants) cause bone marrow malfunction; once the drug is withdrawn, the marrow cells recover.

However, some forms of aplastic anemia do not cure themselves. In particular, leukemia and acute toxic poisoning (organic phosphates, for example) require treatment, usually with bone marrow transplants from suitable donors. Some tumors, especially of the thymus gland, can cause aplastic anemia.

Patients with this type of blood disorder may experience fatigue, pallor, hemorrhage, serious infections and heart failure.

Patients with aplastic anemia should be under the care of hematologists. Such specialists can diagnose the cause of the affliction and offer appropriate therapy. DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm an 80-yearold female and have trouble with saliva flowing from the left side of my mouth. It seems to be getting worse all the time. What can I do about it?

DEAR READER: Drooling can be due to diminished strength of the lip muscles, as in patients who have had strokes, or to an increase in the production of saliva, as a result of foreign material (such as dentures) in the mouth. I suggest you see your dentist to discover the cause of your problem. If the dentist is unable to help you, request a medical examination by your doctor. I am sure that the two professionals working together can solve your problem.

People are beached by restrictions

Perfect beach weather, you say? A great day to grab your towel, shades, sunblock, the latest best seller and head for sandy shores?

Just when you thought it was safe to go back in the water, a virtual sand trap of rules and regulations awaits, governing such things as your oceanside attire, what you pack in your cooler, even whether you can toss a Frisbee.

You think Fido might enjoy a romp in the waves? Sorry, but an informal survey of beach restrictions on both coasts and some inland beaches shows that most ban dogs, at least during the summer.

"Frankly, people just don't want to put their beach blankets down next to a pile of deep doodoo,'' said East Hampton Supervisor Tony Bullock on New York's Long Island. Horses are prohibited, too.

Wayne Shattaway, a lifeguard at Jacksonville Beach in Florida, which even hired a dogcatcher to patrol the beach, said dogs can sometimes be aggressive to strangers.

"Right now Rotweilers and Dobermans are the popular dogs here. If there was just poodles on the beach, it wouldn't be a problem," he said.

Bottles and glass containers banned virtually are everywhere, restrictions on cans are almost as rampant, and if you're toting anything stronger than soft drinks, that's likely to be forbidden, too.

Frisbees are banned at Hilton Head Island, S.C., Long Island, Virginia Beach, among other places.
