

Yesterday was the 65th birthday of the 41st president of the United States. A handbook from the inauguration provides us with some interesting trivia on the "Texan" in the oval office. Bush is the fourth oldest president. Only Reagan, William Henry Harrison and James Buchanan were older

Bush, who stands 6-2, is the fourth tallest president after Lincoln, Jefferson and Lyndon B. Johnson. Bush and six presidents before him were all born between 1908 and 1924, a little data that we fail to see the importance of

Bush is 31st among college graduates who made it to the White House, 12th among Phi Beta Kappa guys, and second from Yale University

Also Monday, he welcomed U.S. proposals to reduce conventional forces on the continent, saving they offer chances for speedy agreement.

Outside Bonn's 18th-century Town Hall, the crowd chanted "Gorby! Gorby!" and waved dozens of Soviet flags and a banner saying "Keep up the good work, Gorby.

'A Soviet leader surrounded by cheering West Germans, who would have thought of that a few vears ago?" exclaimed a television commentator during a live national broadcast.

Other banners reflected the German pain at the postwar division of their nation and of the former capital, Berlin, telling Gorbachev "German unity peace in Europe" and, in English, "Gorby, make love not walls.

No German needs to be reminded of the Berlin Wall.

Most of the crowd cheered Gor bachev but many hooted disapproval when Mayor Hans Daniels, in a brief speech before a ceremonial exchange of gifts. referred to Bonn as only the temporary capital of Germany, 'substituting for Berlin.

The Kremlin leader began today with a breakfast with Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher, one of the strongest advocates of Western aid for Gor bachev's domestic reforms.

Later today, Gorbachev and Chancellor Helmut Kohl were to sign a joint declaration billed by both sides as an attempt to mend



Chemical firm offers reward

AUSTIN (AP) — The maker of the herbicide used to poison the 600-year-old Treaty Oak is offering \$10,000 for information leading to the arrest of those responsible, a company official said.

A Du Pont Corp. spokeswoman in Houston said the company regretted its product was used to harm the live oak, an Austin landmark since the city was founded in the 1800s.

"It was misused and we're outraged," said Pat Getter. "We're hoping the reward will help to flush out the vandals. A lot of people know about the tree, not just (those) in Austin. This is a state treasure."



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Roll out nectarine pie for summer

Forget the story that nectarines are a cross between a peach and plum. Nectarines are a unique fruit that originally grew wild in Asia. The California supply is appearing at produce counters now and will peak in late June through August.

The lovely red blush on nectarine skins is related to variety, not ripeness. The fruit is picked mature but firm for packing and shipping. When you get nectarines home, place them in a loosely closed paper bag for several days to complete ripening. Don't refrigerate - this interrupts the ripening process. Even ripe nectarines are most flavorful at room temperature. One pound (3 medium nectarines) makes about 2 cups sliced.

FRESH NECTARINE PIE ¹/₃ cup all-purpose flour ¹/₃ cup sugar 1/3 cup packed brown sugar

1/3 cup sliced almonds, toasted 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg 2 teaspoons lemon juice Few drops almond extract 7 cups sliced fresh nectarines (about 9 fruits) Pastry for 9-inch double-crust

1 slightly beaten egg white 1 tablespoon sugar

In a large bowl stir together flour, 1-3rd cup sugar, brown sugar, almonds, nutmeg, lemon juice and almond extract. Gently toss with nectarines. Mound fruit into pastry-lined 9-inch pie plate; adjust top crust. Seal and flute edge. Brush pastry with egg white; sprinkle with 1 tablespoon sugar. Cut slits to allow escape of steam. Cover edge of pie with foil. Bake in-375-degree F oven for 30 minutes; remove foil and bake 20 to 25 minutes more or until crust is golden. Cool on wire rack. Makes 8 servings.





Johnson admits he knew he was taking steroids

TORONTO (AP) - Ben Johnson, admitting years of steroid use in his quest to be the world's fastest man, said he knew they were banned substances but never would have taken them if he'd known about their potential side effects.

"Nobody bothered to tell me what the side effects were because they were happy to be making all this money," he told the Canadian inquiry into drugs and athletics nearly nine months after a positive test for the anabolic steroid stanozolol stripped him of the 100-meter Olympic gold medal.

Johnson, whose only previous statement since the disgrace at Seoul had been that he never knowingly used illegal drugs, still must tell the inquiry what happened in the weeks leading up to the positive test last Sept. 24.

But Monday, under oath, Johnson started what could be several days of testimony by saying for the first time that he used steroids.

"Every shot that I got with an injection from (his coach and teammates), I had in my own mind that it was banned,' he said.

Johnson said that his first use of steroids was in pill form in 1981 and 1982, the steroids Dianabol and stanozolol taken under direction of his only coach, Charlie Francis.

But by the time of the 1983 Pan American Games in Caracas, Venezuela, Johnson said he was aware that he was getting steroids, that they were banned and that he risked disqualification if they were found in his system.

He differed only from his coach and personal physician, Dr. Jamie Astaphan, on the issue of whether they informed him about potential for steroids damaging his health. "If they told me what the side effects were at that time, I wouldn't have been part of the group at all,' Johnson said. The athlete forfeited his 9.79second performance at Seoul because of the positive test, but still holds the world record of 9.83, set at Rome in 1987.



LAS VEGAS (AP) - For 12 rounds, Sugar Ray Leonard and Thomas Hearns battled through the heat like valiant old warriors, trying somehow to find through sheer determination some of the

skills that had long ago left them. In a fight that had almost the same ebb and flow of their first bout eight years ago, the two aging fighters reached back to put on stirring displays of courage, with both hurt badly and both refusing to give in.

And when it was over Monday night, three ringside judges handed in their verdicts.

Leonard's rally was all the more implausible coming after the 11th round, when Hearns knocked him to the canvas for the second time and appeared to be gaining final control of the fight.

Hearns also put Leonard down for a count of five in the third round, the only time in Leonard's career that he has been down twice in a fight.

Hearns was wobbled by a Leonard left hook in the fifth round and Leonard pressed the attack, landing punch after punch to Hearns' head as he tried desperately to cover up in Leonard's corner.

Leonard hurt Hearns again in the ninth round, again with a left hook, and used the same punch to regain the momentum early in the 12th round and nearly finish Hearns off.

Travis, who, according to folklore, drew the famous line in the dirt of the Alamo, received staunch support from trustees Travis Bryan Jr. and Herbert Wade.

But the vote went against Travis after Trustee Wendy Costa questioned Travis' morals. Bob Calvert of the Texas State Historical Society told trustees that Travis was "a ne'er-do-well who in two weeks time happened to do something wonderful.

Ms. Branch, who was born in The trustees voted Monday 1881 in Virginia, worked her way up from a job as a maid to give Austin's Huston-Tillotson College from 1930-44.

The current Travis Elementary School will be closed in 1990 and be replaced by the school named for Ms. Branch.

Cauley commented that no Bryan school has been named in honor of a black since Kemp, Carver and Neal during the He said he supported Branch "not because she's black, but because she made significant Caesar, invaded Britain in 55 contributions" to education.

Bryan said he supported continuing the namesake because Travis "is Texas' greatest hero, in my opinion.'

Bryan replied, "He was a commander of the Alamo. He was selected to die for Texas. He wrote the letter, he drew the line. He was the main man at the Alamo.'

During the siege of the Alamo, Travis wrote a letter describing his plight and appealing for help. In addition, legend has it that, when the soldiers at the Alamo were surrounded by Mexican troops, Travis drew a line in the dirt and asked those willing to die for freedom to cross it with him.

"Other than dving at the Alamo, the rest of his life was not

Quakes dramatize threat of faults beneath Los Angeles

earthquakes that shook Los Angeles did little harm, but they scared people and highlighted the danger from recently discovered faults concealed deep beneath the nation's second-largest city.

The temblors, however, suggest the danger may be more likely to come from a series of moderate quakes than from a much-feared "big one."

"Nothing that happened today makes us fear a larger earthquake any more than we did before," said U.S. Geological Survey seismologist Lucile Jones. "What happened today should make you feel a little more relieved."

The Monday morning quakes injured one person and caused scattered minor damage downtown and in suburbs to the east, including cracked plaster, fallen ceiling tiles and broken 60-by-10-mile swath through the windows.

That quake also spurred discovery of another fault, the 40by-10-mile Torrance-Wilmington Fault, stretching from Newport Beach northwest through Long Beach, Los Angeles' Wilmington district, Torrance and Santa Monica

Scientists don't know if the two faults relieve stress only by causing numerous mild-to-moderate quakes of magnitude-4 to 6, or also during infrequent major-togreat quakes of magnitude-7 to 8, said geologist Kerry Sieh of the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena.

A major quake directly under downtown Los Angeles would be far worse than a "big one" on the more distant San Andreas Fault. about 50 miles to the north. Officials estimate a big San Andreas quake could kill up to 14,000 people, seriously injure up to 55,000 and cause \$17 billion in damage.



A rift developed between West Germany and the United States as a result, but it was resolved at last month's NATO summit, with the Western alliance agreeing that a partial reduction of such weapons could be negotiated.

Kohl appealed to Gorbachev for the Kremlin to make a unilateral cut in short-range nuclear missiles. The Soviets concede that the Warsaw Pact has an advantage in short-range forces in Europe.

Gorbachev said the Warsaw Pact would wait until a meeting of its leaders, expected next month, to give a detailed response to Bush's proposals for substantial cuts in East-bloc and Western armies in Europe by the early 1990s

On June 3, thousands of troops entered Beijing and marched on Tiananmen Square, with gunfire clearing it of thousands of students who had for three weeks occupied the 100-acre expanse that is China's symbolic center of power.

The government says nearly 300 people were killed, mostly soldiers. But Chinese witnesses and Western intelligence say the toll could be as high as 3,000, most of them civilians.

Some were crushed under armored personnel carriers.

carport at Graceland, and they had fallen into serious disrepair, said Brian Hughes of Classic Car Co. of Memphis.

Even the 1955 pink Cadillac that Presley gave his mother was in rough shape, said Hughes, whose company restored the vehicles for the museum. Like many of the display vehicles, the Caddy had to be stripped to its frame and rebuilt, he said.

However, much of the machinery inside the vehicles is still in mint condition. "If you raised the hood, the engine is just like the day Presley gave it to his mother," Hughes said.

The museum includes TV screens beside several of the vehicles showing home movies of Presley or his family.

A short film of Presley movie clips showing him with various vehicles is featured at the drivein movie set at the center of the museum. For seating, the set has 38 front seats from 1957 Chevrolets.

Graceland is operated for the financial benefit of Presley's only child, Lisa Marie, 21, who will inherit the house and tourist complex at age 25. She has agreed to leave the operation with its current management at least until she is 30.
