'Can do' attitude praised

Speaker Polunsky lauds city's effort

Allan Polunsky of San Antonio, who first visited Snyder in the fall of 1987 as part of a tour of TDC board members inspecting prison site finalists, commended the city Thursday for what he called its "can do" attitude.

In reference to Snyder's effort to secure a state prison, Polunsky commented, "Your community has set an exemplary pattern for the rest of the state. It is no accident that the first new prison to open in Texas will be the Snyder unit."

Polunsky, a real estate attorney in San Antonio, was addressing the third correctional officer graduating class to be certified through Western Texas College.

Twenty-six graduates were certified in a ceremony conducted in the WTC Fine Arts Theatre.

The class brings the total to 89 individuals trained for TDC employment through the WTC program. A fourth class is now in the planning stages.

Class members from Snyder were Antonio Aguilar, Richard Lynn Brumley, Danny Kenneth Early, JoeDon Guynes, Randy Todd Lewis, Phillip David Ratliff, Daman Scott Reynolds, Ruben Medrano Ruiz, Jacky Don Simpson, David Leroy Walker and Nuel Arthur Landreth.

Capital Fund plan outlined for group

Thirty people heard a Texas Department of Commerce official describe benefits and qualifications associated with the Texas Capital Fund in a Thursday night public hearing that the Snyder City Council had called as part of its consideration of the program.

Refugio Negrete of the department's Community Development Program in Austin said the loan program, to help start new businesses or expand existing ones, has been in effect since 1983

and has loaned more than \$7 million.

Council members did not indicate during the meeting or afterwards if they will go forward with an application.

Negrete was pressed at one point in the 80-minute meeting by city legal consultant Ernie B. Armstrong, who questioned the city's monetary liability as the governmental sponsor for the program.

Specifically, he asked if the city might be required to pay off a

large amount of money to the state if a business failed.

Negrete said the department has "never reached that point" with a city or county government and probably would not if the entity had made a sincere effort to fulfill its two-year contractual obligation.

In response to his question, local businessman Don Gressett was told that any obligation to provide a certain number of jobs would not extend past the first two years, meaning that he could

Bush rallies for flag

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush, using the statue of the nation's most famous flag-raising scene as a backdrop, today urged passage and ratification of a "simple, stark and to-the-point" constitutional amendment to ban flag burning.

The president spoke before a hastily assembled crowd at a ceremony at the Iwo Jima Memorial, the statue of five Marines raising the flag on a Pacific island during World War II.

Bush used the ceremony to register his support for a Republican-drafted proposed amendment that asserts: "The Congress and the states shall have power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States."

"This flag is one of our most powerful ideas," Bush declared. "If it is not defended, it is defamed. ... It represents the fabric of our nation."

Bush said the statue behind him, a huge bronze casting of a photograph by Associated Press photographer Joe Rosenthal, was "stunning. ... Even now it humbles us, inspires us."

Bush said that the amendment drafted by Republican congressional leaders with the support of some Democrats was "simple, stark and to-the-point."

Senate Republican leader Bob

Sub visits city

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — The crew of the USS City of Corpus Christi is arriving for a Fourth of July holiday stay in the Texas city from which it got its name.

The nuclear-powered submarine was scheduled to surface in Corpus Christi Friday, with Mayor Betty Turner already aboard. Plans called for her to board the submarine at Port Aransas.

"They keep trying to talk me out of it," said Turner, with a loud laugh. "They keep telling me about all these horrible things I'll have to do, like ride out to it in a rubber raft. But they won't talk me out of it."

HUD probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Department of Housing and Urban Development is cancelling a \$500 million mortgage loan guarantee program that one official says is an "absolute disaster."

HUD Secretary Jack Kemp ordered the troubled program cancelled Thursday, as the department said the program was "riddled with abuse."

Meanwhile, a House Government Operations subcommittee today was beginning review of another HUD program—the mortgage coinsurance program—in which a recent inspector general's audit found lenders had underwritten \$700 million in loans that defaulted by mid-1988.

Generic drug

WASHINGTON (AP) — The generic version of a popular high blood pressure drug was sold to the public without undergoing full safety tests, a House subcommittee charges.

Vitarine Pharmaceuticals Inc. of Springfield Gardens, N. Y. recalled the drug, a generic version of Dyazide earlier this month because of concerns that faulty data may have been submitted for approval of the drug.

A House subcommittee, in a letter to Vitarine on Thursday, said it had learned that the company had told FDA officials that the tests were "false because of the innovator product (the original drug) was put in Vitarine capsules and simply testes against itself."

Anne Osborn, who attended Bluebonnet Girls State earlier this month, said she is now more aware of how the state government works and how bills become laws.

For a 10 day period—June 13-23—she participated in a mock government program and even campaigned successfully for city councilman Place 1 in Girls State's "City C."

Osborn, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Osborn, said she agreed to participate in Bluebonnet Girls State because "she wanted to get involved." She was chosen by the Snyder

chapter of the American Legion Auxiliary, which sponsors Girls State every year.

At Girls State, Osborn was a resident of "City C," in reality a dorm at Texas Lutheran College in Seguin. Some 48 girls were housed there, comprising the citizens of City C.

To run for public office, she had to announce her intent with a speech and then win the election.

After winning, Osborn said she and the other elected officials began to set up ordinances for their city.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in

Board of County Development members Thursday laid more plans for the Daniel Unit's July 22 open house and heard Cogdell Memorial Hospital administrator Thomas Hochwalt outline future needs of the hospital.

The luncheon meeting at Snyder County Club was also attended by members of the county commissioners court, which expressed its continued support for the hospital during 1990. Part of the facility's budget request for next year involves a \$200,000 increase in tax dollar subsidy from the county.

In a TDC-related report,

chamber of commerce executive director Bill Moss said he has received the aprons and 5,000 buttons that will be used in the celebration of the Texas Department of Corrections opening.

Moss noted that the commemorative aprons will be given to various local officials who have been involved in the TDC project in a private barbeque and reception at Western Texas College on the day before the open house.

The buttons, saying "Price Daniel Unit, 1989," will be given to "everyone who comes through

Wright's son may run for House seat

DALLAS (AP) — It's not that James Claude Wright III has not gotten his father's blessing to run for political office.

He says he just hasn't asked what dad — former House Speaker Jim Wright thinks about the possibility of his running for the House seat he is leaving on Friday.

Wright, 44, told The Dallas Morning News Thursday he has been encouraged to return to Fort Worth from the tiny northern New Mexico town of Riconada to run for his father's vacated congressional seat.

The younger Wright said he doesn't figure he would get much encouragement from his father about making a political race.

He said he has not discussed the seat with his father, but doubts he would get much encouragement because of the ethical furor that has surrounded his father in recent months.

"I think he'd rather I didn't," the younger Wright said. But, he added, "I'd hope he'd vote for me if Iran."

The younger Wright said he didn't feel he could have run for office before, when his father

held one of the most powerful political posts in the country.

"Nobody would take me serious in Texas while Dad was in office," the younger Wright said. "They'd say, 'That's Jim Wright's son.'"

But now that the elder Wright is stepping away from politics, some of his supporters are encouraging his son to take up the Democratic banner.

Others, however, have discouraged the move, the younger Wright said, adding that he hasn't made his decision yet.

The elder Wright, 66, who has represented the Tarrant County district since 1934, stepped down as House Speaker earlier this month after a federal ethics probe stirred controversy in his office. On Monday, he said he would leave his congressional seat, as promised, on Thursday.

The former speaker and his wife, Betty, were feted by Fort Worth supporters Thursday night on arriving in their hometown.

The younger Wright said he would decide about his candidacy as early as next week, after discussing the race with his wife, Sandra, over the weekend.

Assistant Secretary of the State Brad Gahm said although the younger Wright is not currently a Texas resident, he still could run for the office if he establishes a Texas residence by Aug. 12.

The younger Wright said he has lived most of his life in Fort Worth, but moved to northern New Mexico about eight years ago, working summers in the rafting business and winters at ski lodges.

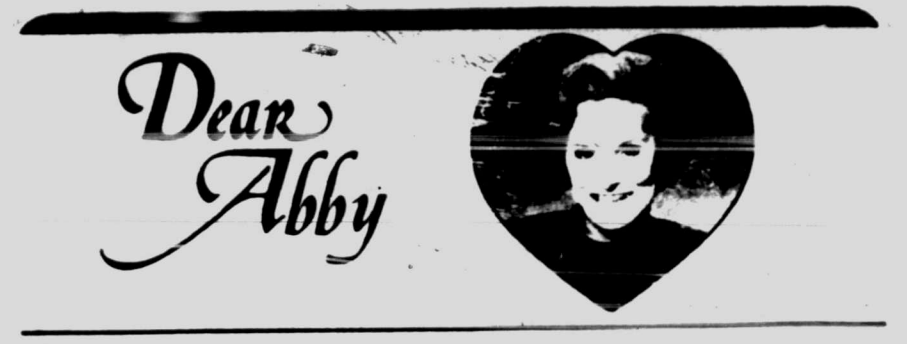
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Dear Abby

Training package developed

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — Sometimes, language barriers can be deadly.

An Odessa woman, however, offers a way to crack that language barrier, at least for police officers and crime victims or suspects.

Linda Quiroz has translated common police questions and commands and designed a classroom course complete with workbooks, video and cassette tapes to teach peace officers how to understand and speak Spanish.

The course enables officers to complete a traffic stop or gather initial details of a crime without being fluent in Spanish. The booklets also contain street talk phrases that tip police off to the presence of a weapon or a threat from a suspect.

Ms. Quiroz, a former elementary school teacher, started her own business, Bilingual Video Communications Inc., to sell the materials. But the work means more to her than a potential profit.

"As a Hispanic with a language background, I feel responsible to these departments to develop a program that helps in dealing with Hispanics," she said.

"Hispanics are here. We have to deal with them," she said. "All you have to do is put yourself in the other person's shoes. Could you imagine how you would feel if you were stopped by the federales in Mexico?"

A poignant example of how separate languages can lead to tragedy occurred in Odessa in March 1988.

A fire that raced through a backyard clubhouse in East Odessa claimed the life of a 2½-year-old boy. According to one witness at the scene, confusion and warnings shouted in Spanish contributed to a delayed rescue.

Lynn Graham, 30, said he remembers the boy's grandmother shouting in Spanish as the wood shack burned fiercely.

"She was all over the area looking for her grandson. It finally clicked that it was possible he still was in there."

"That's when she started screaming, 'My bambino,'" he said.

"I clicked on it, and some of the firemen clicked on it. It definitely was a delay and a bilingual crossover," Graham said.

A firefighter raced into the little shack still in flames and

brought out the boy, who was found under a pile of drapes and blankets.

No one knew where the boy was at first because the 10 kids in the backyard scattered when he arrived, he said. Graham grabbed a garden hose and began fighting the blaze.

The fire's cause was blamed on children playing with matches and a spray can.

Ms. Quiroz first considered a language course for paramedics and hospital personnel as well as police. However, she discarded the other possibilities because the medical terminology was too difficult to simplify, she said.

An Ector County Independent School District elementary language teacher for 12 years, Ms. Quiroz got the idea while teaching. Instead of developing a Spanish program for elementary students, she opted to go into business for herself.

Sales of the \$595 kit haven't been brisk for Ms. Quiroz, who implemented her marketing plan about two months ago. She hopes to sell the product nationwide.

With a bachelor's degree in Spanish and a master's degree in educational administration, Ms. Quiroz plans to teach her program this fall at Odessa College.

Family reunion set for 100th anniversary

Descendants of William Jefferson and Sarah Ann Elizabeth Richardson will gather on Big Sulphur Creek near Dunn Saturday morning to mark the 100th anniversary of the family's move to Scurry County.

The clan will meet at 10 a.m. on the creek site where the family built its first home soon after they arrived on July 5, 1889, camped on the creek that night and Richardson went into Snyder, the county seat, the following day to file on the land. Scurry County had only been organized about five years at that time.

Among the oldest persons attending Saturday's celebration will be the three remaining grandchildren of the first settlers. They are Ollie Richardson of Dunn and Lela May Williams and Eula Cary of Pampa. Richardson, 84, the youngest of the three, still lives near the old home site.

The Richardsons left Hood County on May 1, 1889, by wagon, undecided as to their destination. They began the trip with 100 head of cattle and purchased another 100 head as the traveled. The newly purchased cattle were branded with the family's "spectacle" brand and a bill of sale was secured so officers along the way would know the cattle had not been "rustled." A great-

grandson, Johnny Richardson, has the bill of sale framed and displayed in his home near Dunn.

The family traversed the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles before settling on the land in Scurry County.

The Richardsons were among the first Scurry County farmers to raise cotton. They planted seed they had brought from their former home in Hood County, planting in about every third furrow because they did not know whether cotton would grow in West Texas. They also planted sorghum with good results.

Mr. and Mrs. Richardson brought with them three sons, J. M. "Bud" Richardson, W. H. "Willie" Richardson and George Newton Richardson, as well as a daughter and son-in-law, Laura Elizabeth and Almarine Barton.

George Newton Richardson later married Sudie Amy Dunn, daughter of Alonzo Dunn, postmaster for whom the town of Dunn was named. Dunn became the trading center for farmers served by the post office and a watering shop for freight wagons operating between the railroad at Colorado City and Snyder.

About 100 family members are expected to attend the Saturday gathering. A noon meal featuring barbecued beef will be served in the Dunn Community Center, located not far from where the first family home was built.

How to avoid coming up short

After an artificial two-club opening, South eventually arrived at four hearts. North's two-diamond response was negative, and North had nothing better to do than bid two no-trump and then, belatedly, three hearts. South truly had game in hand, and promptly bid it.

The defense started with three rounds of spades, and declarer ruffed. South then led a club to dummy's jack and took a heart finesse. Next came the ace of hearts and another, but East won the king and played still another spade. That promoted East's long heart to the setting trick, since declarer was shortened once again. How should declarer do better?

Since a 4-2 heart split is quite likely, declarer should try to forestall the defenders from forcing him to ruff once again. After ruffing the third spade, declarer should lead the queen of hearts right away. If either defender takes the king, the eight of hearts in dummy can be used should another spade then be played. When East makes the best play of ducking the queen of hearts, declarer should then go to dummy's jack of clubs and take the heart finesse. The play of the ace after that will leave only the king outstanding, and declarer can proceed to cash out his high clubs, allowing East to ruff in when he chooses, but the game will be made.
