Rites pending for drowning victim, July 4th tragedy

Services were pending Wednesday morning for a 3-year-old Snyder boy who died at Cogdell Memorial Hospital Tuesday afternoon after attempts to revive him from a drowning incident failed.

The youth was discovered in the Pal-O-Mar swimming pool located at 314 E. Hwy.

Police said Justin R. Milton nounced dead at 3:52 p.m. was reported missing by his

mother, Tammy Milton of 4400 Ave. U, No. 5B-8, who was at the pool on a family outing.

This report came at 1:16 p.m. and two Snyder police officers responding to the call found the youth unconscious in the pool.

He was taken by ambulance to the hospital, where he was pro-

The boy was born April 15, 1986.

Soviet crash

MOSCOW (AP) Defense Minister Dmitri Yazov had no explanation today for why Warsaw Pact defense forces failed to detect and shoot down a runaway MiG-23 jet fighter that crashed into a house in Belgium, killing a man.

In an interview with Tass, Yazov said investigators were en route to Kolobrzeg airfield in Poland to find out why the MiG's pilot bailed out after takeoff on a training mission, leaving the jet to fly pilotless for 560 miles.

From Poland, the investigators will fly to the crash site and discuss compensation for the death and damages with Belgian officials, the official news agency said.

"It is difficult to say why it was not shot down, why it was not detected," Yazov said. "A large-scale investigation should be carried out.

The defense minister said he believed an engine malfunction immediately after takeoff on the training flight prompted the pilot to

'As the pilot himself explained, the afterburner spontaneously switched off during the takeoff and the plane began to decelerate. Yazov said.

Flag standoff

AUSTIN (AP) - A group of disabled Vietnam veterans and students planning to burn American flags wound up in a July 4 confrontation on the steps of the Texas Capitol.

The two dozen disabled veterans had marched 212 miles across West Texas to Austin to voice outrage over reductions in veterans' medical and educational

benefits. The two dozen University of Texas students gathered to burn several United States flags to protest conditions for the homeless and the United States' role in

South America. Their chance meeting was tense, with authorities saving violence was narrowly averted.

"I m burning this flag for 213 years of history," yelled one student who later refus-

ed to identify himself. "You're here because someone fought to give you

213 years of history," replied Robert "Grizzly" Beggs, a veteran from San Angelo confined to a wheelchair. At first, the Concho

North won't go to prison

WASHINGTON (AP) federal judge today gave Oliver L. North a three-year suspended prison sentence and fined him \$150,000 for his role in covering up his involvement in the Iran-Contra affair.

U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell placed the former National Security Council aide on two years' probation and ordered him to perform 200 hours of community service administering a new program to help inner-city youth avoid involvement in drugs.

Gesell cited North's distinguished career as a Marine officer before he became a staff member at the White House during the Reagan administration.

He told North that during the Iran-Contra affair "I don't think you were a leader at all." He said North was "really a low-level subordinate who was carrying out the instructions of a few cynical superiors.'

North, who has said he will appeal his conviction on three counts, had faced a maximum of 10 years' imprisonment and fines totaling \$750,000.

Pronouncing sentence, Gesell told North:

"Along the way you came to accept the view that Congress couldn't be trusted ... that the fate of the country could be left to a small inside group not elected that was free to act as they chose while publicly professing to act differently.


But Gesell said that even though North was following orders, "you're not the fall guy for this tragic breach of the public trust.

The judge said North failed to understan "how the public service has been tarnished" by his

activities. North remained at the defense table for a few minutes after Gesell concluded the sentencing. He then walked over to his wife, Betsy, who was sitting in the front row, kissed her on the cheek and whispered in her ear. The two then smiled broadly

Transmitting viral illness to humans

DEAR DR. GOTT: Can humans get leukemia from cats? Our daughter was diagnosed with acute non-lyma cat that tested positive for feline leukemia

DEAR READER: Cat leukemia is While at the hospital, Reagan caused by a virus that is common in

felings and to my know transmitted to humans. Nonetheless, there is a lot of current interest in a transmittable viral cause of some human cancers and leukemias. Therefore, I wouldn't automatically shut the door on the possibility that your daughter's condition may be related to the cat's disease, however unlikely that association may be. To date, feline leukemia has not been shown to affect humans. To give you more information, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report "Viruses and Cancer." DEAR DR. GOTT: I've had a CAT scan, MRI and stress test for chest pain. Nothing shows positive. My doctor says I have chest strain and has even recommended a heart patch. Nothing helps. I don't want to depend on medication but don't want the pain either. Can you help?
DEAR READER: Probably not.

Chest pain can accompany many different diseases, involving the lungs, heart and chest-wall structures (ribs

discomfort. DEAR DR. GOTT: What would cause my nose to get very cold about 3 p.m. and stay that way for the rest of the evening? I'm a healthy 65-yearold female with no other problems.

DEAR READER: Although a cold nose is usually due to exposure to cold weather that constricts arteries in the skin, circulatory disturbances can cause arterial constriction even in a warm environment. Ask your doctor to help you identify the reasons for your peculiar symptoms.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is your opinion of a self-action tanning cream available commercially? I'd love to have a tan but get freckles when I sit in the sun, even though I have a dark complexion and have dark hair.

DEAR READER: Tanning lotions usually are pigments that darken the skin. They produce their effect without the benefit of ultraviolet light. To my knowledge, they are safe, except for people who occasionally exhibit allergic reactions to the compounds and develop rashes from their use. © 1989 NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 52-yearold female with hyperlipidemia. I avoid all dairy products. Do calcium tablets really work? I'm going through menopause and am very concerned about osteoporosis. Would you recommend calcium tablets for me? If so, what kind and how much?

DEAR READER: Hyperlipidemia, excessive blood cholesterol and triglycerides, is usually aided by the reduction of saturated fats in the diet. can often lower blood-fat levels by drastically curtailing their intake of eggs, red meat and dairy products.

their high fat content. Therefore, fatconscious consumers must learn to substitute other nutritious products in place of eggs, meat and dairy items.

Such foods are nutritious, despite

Grains are a good choice to make up the protein in prohibited meats and eggs. Also, fish and poultry supply plenty of natural protein.

It's more difficult to find food that naturally supplies enough calcium to compensate for diets poor in milk and cheese. For people worried about insufficient calcium intake, the easiest alternative is calcium supplements in pill form.

Dietary calcium is not the single most important factor in preventing post-menopausal bone deterioration; the female hormone estrogen, exercise and genetic considerations also play vital roles. Nonetheless, most experts agree that calcium pills are useful; what's more, they're safe and inexpensive.

Because calcium is absorbed into the body only in the presence of vitamin D, many calcium preparations contain the vitamin. About 250 International Units of vitamin D is sufficient for the average woman who eats a balanced but dairy-free diet. To help prevent osteoporosis, the average post-menopausal woman should consume about 1,500 milligrams of supplementary calcium.

Fisherman gets 3 pound piranha

JAMESTOWN, Ohio (AP) - A fisherman who cast his line for a catch he could sink his teeth into instead reeled in a fish that could sink its teeth into him.

The three-pound piranha Greg Dell'Aria caught at a stone quarry near this southwest Ohio town later devoured every goldfish in a bait shop tank where Dell'Aria had stored the fish.

"He's got teeth as big as your bottom ones," the 32-year-old fisherman said last week.

Dell'Aria said he and some friends were fishing for bass on June 26 when he caught the piranha in about three feet of water. "It blew my mind; I'll tell you that," he said.

Dell'Aria put the piranha in a tank at a friend's bait shop to keep it alive. But the friend's wife had a baby the next day, so the bait shop was closed for three

When Dell'Aria's wife finally picked up the fish four days later, she was told that "it ate all of his goldfish - cleaned him out," Dell'Aria said. By then Doug Maloney, fish

management supervisor for the state Fish and Wildlife District 5 office in Xenia, confirméd that the fish was indeed a piranha. "They were really surprised,"

Dell'Aria said. "Everybody was saying piranhas don't get thát big. But I guess if they get old enough and people feed them enough, they do.'

The fish and wildlife experts theorized that someone bought the piranha in a pet store and released it into the stone quarry.

The piranha lived for several days in a beverage cooler filled with water before it died. Dell'Aria says he will have his catch mounted.





The bidding guides the lead

Oh, if we could only rub a lamp and have a genie materialize to tell us the right opening lead! Even though there's no genie handy at the table, listening to the bidding can be a great substitute. In today's deal there is no lead that defeats the game, but the untake more tricks than most other tournament competitors

When South responded with one notrump, which in North-South's methods denied holding a four-card major, North jumped to three diamonds. Now three hearts could not be a suit so was interpreted as showing good stoppers in that major. Since North had a dou- fusion and misperceptions and ble spade stopper, he felt quite com-fortable in now bidding three notrump. When West led a club, there was nothing to the hand but to knock out the diamond ace and take 11

Even though a heart is the best lead, our choice based on the bidding would be a spade. Although East was not able to overcall at the one-level, he still might hold five spades to a high honor, plus an outside entry. (No one would rush to overcall vulnerable with a broken suit and meager, high cards.) A spade lead will hold the contract to 10 tricks, unless West decides to make the daring play of unblocking the queen of spades in the hope that East holds the jack. Then it's back to 11 from a club lead.








