Fred A. Howard, 70, member of a pioneer Haskell County family which settled the Howard community, forerunner of what is now Paint Creek, died at 5:25 p. m. last Thursday in Stamford Memorial Hospital. He had been a patient there 11 days, but had been in ill health for several months.






