# Local man testifies in own defense

A 40-year-old Snyder man testified in his own defense Wednesday that he was provoked to strike a city policeman during the early morning hours of last May 20 because officers were handling his son too roughly during a public intoxication arrest.

On trial for aggravated assault on a policeman, Catarino R. "Cat" Guerrero of 2700 Ave. J told a nine-woman, three-man jury in 132nd District Court that he had gone outside about 1 a.m. with a two-by-four board because a neighborhood man was chasing his son, Jimmy, with a club.

Guerrero said he was walking his son, who lived on the same block, home when police arrived and his son started running. Jimmy L. Guerrero, on five years' probation for a June 16, 1986, burglary of a building, was caught by officers in an alley off the 2900 Block of Ave. I, his father said.

Accused of hitting officer Chip Mitchell in the head with his fist, the defendant said the incident developed because he was hit in the head with a flashlight as he attempted to get officers to quit pushing his son's face into the

ground. Jimmy Guerrero's probation was subsequently revoked and he was sent to the Texas Department of Corrections to serve a five-year sentence because of the PI arrest that night and because he had slapped a woman on April 8, had stolen a toolbox from a Snyder man on Nov. 23, 1988, and had "scuffled" with police Sgt. Kevin Fritz during a June 24, 1988, incident, according to court

records. Catarino Guerrero, an employee of Jack's Roadboring & Pipeline Construction, testified during the second day of his trial after Mitchell and other officers testified Tuesday.

Officers were expected to testify in rebuttal following Guerrero's testimony Wednesday.

Aggravated assault on a police officer is a third-degree felony, which carries a punishment of

two or 10 years' imprisonment. The case is being prosecuted by District Attorney Ernie B. Armstrong and his assistant, Dana Cooley. Guerrero is being defended by attorney Pat Barber of Colorado City.

The Dallas Independent School District did not comply with a July 21 directive to answer questions about a request by plaintiffs in a desegregation suit, Judge Barefoot Sanders ruled Tuesday.

In his two-page order, Sanders wrote that although school officials may not have intended to disobey and risk contempt of court, they "are subject to sanctions for such non-compliance."

Sanders rejected the school board's May request to declare

Another petition "must be accompanied by a brief specifying the actual and legal grounds upon which the motion is based" the judge said, addressing concerns by plaintiffs; the Black Coalition to Maximize Education, an intervening group; and the court-appointed desegregation auditor.

"He (Sanders) wanted an answer," said Robert Thomas, the school board's attorney in the desegregation case. "They did not give it to him."

Sanders told school trustees not to make another request before Jan. 15. He has overseen the case since 1981.

The judge "sort of has a short fuse," said Edward Cloutman. attorney for the blacks and Hispanics who filed the suit on behalf of minority students. "I don't think he likes to be told 'no' by parties in a lawsuit."

Sanders' sanction was more appropriate than a contempt citation against the school district because "it treats the substance of the issues," said Cloutman.

"It seems to me they can't file again without addressing those things (the judge outlined) without facing another slap on

the wrist," he said. The judge noted that the school board's request contained no factual or legal reasons the school district should be considered

unitary. "He (the judge) tells us what he wants in another motion — a legal and factual motion. We'll have that ready when the board wants to vote on it," said

Thomas. As early as September 1987, Thomas had urged the school board to provide the judge a list of commitments to continue various desegregation efforts.

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
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
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

# Penry case sent to appellate court

TYLER, Texas (AP) — A mentally retarded man once convicted of capital murder must either be retried or have his death sentence commuted to life, a federal judge ruled.

The order, issued Tuesday by U.S. District Judge William M. Steger, was sent back to the original trial court and to the **Texas Court of Criminal Appeals** in Austin.

It gives the state 90 days to decide whether to retry Johnny Paul Penry in the killing of a Livingston woman, said court clerk Rita Robins. Penry's death sentence was vacated earlier this year by the U.S. Supreme Court.

The 5th Circuit Court of Appeals, complying with a U.S. Supreme Court decision, last week kicked the case to Steger's court with instructions to

resentence Penry. But Texas law does not allow resentencing in capital murder cases, said Curtis Mason, Penry's attorney

Mason said he filed a petition with the trial court in Trinity County asking that the court appoint an attorney for Penry,

should he be retried. The attorney also filed a petition with the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles asking that Penry's sentence be commuted to life. The board will make its recommendation to Gov. Bill Clements, who has the authority to commute Penry's sentence, Mason said.

The board did not act on Penry's case Tuesday because two members were absent, said Karin Armstrong, board spokeswoman in Austin. Board members will consider the case next Tuesday

Penry is 33 but has the mentality of a 7-year-old. He was convicted and sentenced to death for the slaying of Pamela Moselev Carpenter, the sister of former Washington Redskins kicker Mark Moseley.

"I can assure you, we're going to get back into this. I do not want these capital murderer inmates on the streets of our state, that's all there is to it," Clements said Tuesday. "It's not complicated."

The furlough policy prohibits leaves for people convicted of capital murder. Rossanna Salazar, Clements' press secretary, said the governor opposes furloughs for any convicted murderers.

The Texas Board of Corrections last year tightened the furlough policy, but the Express-News in San Antonio reported Sunday that prison records show some unsupervised furloughs have been approved for convicted murderers who have been denied parole.


**Board member Allan Polunsky** told the newspaper Monday that the board is taking action to stop unsupervised visits for such convicts.

"I think that they went far enough temporarily, but apparently there's been a relapse, and we need to treat the patient again," Clements said of the prison board policy.

Ms. Salazar said prison board members "had assured the governor that this type of furlough program would not occur. The governor is demanding that this practice be stopped, and that the entire furlough policy be reviewed."

### Accentuate the positive

By James Jacoby

What constitutes a positive response to a strong, forcing-to-game two-bid? Different experts have different answers. For some, eight high-card points would be required. Still others specify that responder needs a fivecard suit with two of the top three honors. Of course, with less than your agreed requirements you can always make a temporizing or waiting response, then later attempt to bid your values. It has become standard to use two diamonds in response to the artificial strong two-club opening as such a temporizing bid. The current deal shows an unusual application of the positive response as showing two of the top three honors in the bid suit.

When South opened two clubs, West overcalled with three clubs - a dangerous bid in view of his losers, but a player who has opened with a strong two-bid does not often stop at a low level to double for penalties. North expected his partner to play him for a five-card suit when he bid three diamonds, but he still came in with that bid rather than pass. That made it easy for South to go on to slam when North raised to four spades. Without the aggressive diamond response by North, it is quite unlikely that the slam would have been bid. Of course it is easy to tailor a bridge deal to fit a particular method or philosophy, but today's advice is still valid. When partner has opened with a strong forcing bid, respond positively when you can, according to your methods. That is easier than temporizing and trying to catch up later.

# Leland's widow may run for vacant seat

HOUSTON (AP) - Alison Leland, the widow of Rep. Mickey Leland, said she may run for her husband's Congressional seat during a special election set for Nov. 7

Mrs. Leland told the Houston Chronicle she has been urged to run by "a lot of my friends in Washington, a lot of members of Congress, a lot of Mickey's friends.

'I haven't ruled it out," she said Tuesday. However, she added, "I haven't had a chance to really even think" about the elec-

tion or much beyond grappling with the loss of her husband. The six-term congressman along with 15 others was killed when their plane crashed into a rugged mountainside in western Ethiopia Aug. 7 while on a famine relief mission.

The bodies of the eight Americans killed in the crash are being returned to the United States today. Leland will be buried Thursday in Houston in a private service.

Mrs. Leland said she plans to leave the city for a few days after

"I'll think about that (running in the special election) and I'll really think about everything," she said. Mrs. Leland said she has discussed the idea of her candidacy

with U.S. Reps. Lindy Boggs and Cardiss Collins, both of whom succeeded their husbands after they died in plane crashes. "They were telling me what they went through with their husbands' deaths and how they arrived at the decision to run,"

Mrs. Leland, a Houston investment banker, is eight weeks

pregnant and has a 3-year-old son, Jarrett. Gov. Bill Clements said Tuesday the special election to replace

Leland will be Nov. 7, the same day as Houston's mayoral and city council elections.

Those being mentioned as possible candidates for the 18th Congressional District seat include Houston City Councilmen Anthony Hall and Rodney Ellis; state Reps. Al Edwards, Senfronia Thompson, Ron Wilson and Harold Dutton, all Houston Democrats; Justice of the Peace Al Green; County Commissioner El Franco Lee; state Sen. Craig Washington, D-Houston; and Houston Independent School Board Trustee Elizabeth Spates, who was soundly defeated by Leland in the 1988 Democratic primary

Only Lee and Washington have told associates they won't run. Ellis, a former aide to Leland and one of his closest friends, said if Mrs. Leland decides to run, he will not.

Some political observers speculated Mrs. Leland may be considering running as a "caretaker" candidate, meaning if she won, she would serve only until Leland's term ends next year. The observers speculated that could allow Ellis more time to prepare a campaign and run in the March primary for the seat. Ellis scoffed at the notion.

"It's ridiculous for anyone to question the credentials of a person who is a lawyer, an investment banker and a mother. She obviously has an outstanding set of credentials.'

# Rig hands in short supply also...

# Some drillers short on pipe

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — Drilling pipe and experienced rig hands have been topping the list of supply shortages in West Texas this summer.

Permian Basin oilmen say the industry could face a shortage of pipe and trained workers if the rig count increases significantly this year.

"I don't think there's any doubt that there's a shortage. There are no extra experienced hands here, and there are very few mills making tubular goods any more," said Charles Perry, chairman of the Petroleum Basin Petroleum Association.

The availability of drill pipe the heavy, seamless tubing that rotates the drill bit — is dwindling at an accelerating pace, according to a recent survey in Drilling magazine of Dallas.

Pipe factories have been forced t60 convert their operations to make other products because of a continued slump in the oil industry since the early 1980s boom.

While a single string of drill pipe can be used on numerous wells, it eventually will wear out and need to be replaced.

One-fifth of the rigs nationwide have no extra drill pipe, and twothirds of the rigs only have spare supplies of extra pipe, the Drilling survey said.

Not all drilling companies face

Rising interest rates help push S&Ls into the red because they have to pay more to attract deposits even though earnings on mortgages already in their portfolio remain flat.

"The operating loss figures show the extent to which this industry is still very vulnerable to interest rate fluctuations," said analyst in Alexandria, Va.

The Resolution Trust Corp. is trying to bring down the cost of \$16 billion in government funds into ailing thrifts before Sept. 30, said. Cooke said. The agency estimates that will cut losses by about \$500 million a year.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is there a procedure I can follow to keep wax from forming in my ears? The wax keeps my hearing aid from performing properly, and it's quite annoying.

DEAR READER: The cells of the ear canal produce wax that probably acts to protect the ear from foreign objects, such as insects. Ordinarily, small pieces of wax migrate to the outer portion of the canal and are washed away, thereby avoiding a buildup. A hearing aid, by plugging the ear canal, prevents this. Also, the device tends to push wax deeper into the canal. Eventually, a wax deposit may form; this can interfere with

Obviously, the wax has to be removed or your loss of hearing will

Because the wax probably lies deep in the ear canal, it should be professionally removed by either an ear spe-

cialist or a family doctor. To prevent further wax accumulation, I suggest the following:

 Clean your hearing aid regularly and remove the wax that adheres to

 Avoid trying to remove ear wax with cotton swabs. The swabs tend to push the wax in deeper inside the ear canal and can accentuate the problem. Also, it's easy to injure the eardrum by introducing objects, even soft swabs, into the ear canal.

• Try using hydrogen peroxide to clean your ears periodically. Empty about a third of a capful of the liquid into the ear canal, wait until it stops fizzing, then wash the residue away. The effervescent peroxide often bubbles wax particles out of the ear.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What causes ringing in the ears? My specialist tells me to listen to the radio all day, and I don't feel this is much of a solution.

DEAR READER: Ringing in the ears (tinnitus) has many causes, including nerve damage (from chronic exposure to loud sounds), infection, circulatory problems, tumors and wax deposits. Many people develop tinnitus for no apparent reason as they age. Unless the cause of tinnitus is identified and treated, patients may have to "learn to live with" the condition.

Before relegating you to that caregory, however, I think you should have an ear evaluation by a specialist. This may include a hearing test (audiogram) to make sure that the acoustic nerves are functioning properly. For example, tinnitus from nerve damage is often associated with difficulty hearing certain sound frequencies. This can be an important consideration in the diagnosis, because it is an untreatable condition.

Most people with tinnitus become accustomed to the high-pitched ringing or hissing in the ears; they learn to disregard it. On occasion, masking noise, such as a radio, may be destracting enough to lessen the annoyance. However, I would not recommend this until potentially treatable causes of tinnitus are ruled out.
