Four counties are under complete quarantine for hog cholera, and four others are under partial quarantine in this area, reports the Department of Agriculture.

Counties under complete quarantine are Callahan, Comanche, Eastland and Erath, and under partial quarantine are Brown, Coleman, Hamilton and Mills County.

Under the quarantine, feeder pigs or breeding swine cannot be shipped across state lines from the designated areas.

If the hogs are from a healthy herd, they may be moved directly to a slaughter house.

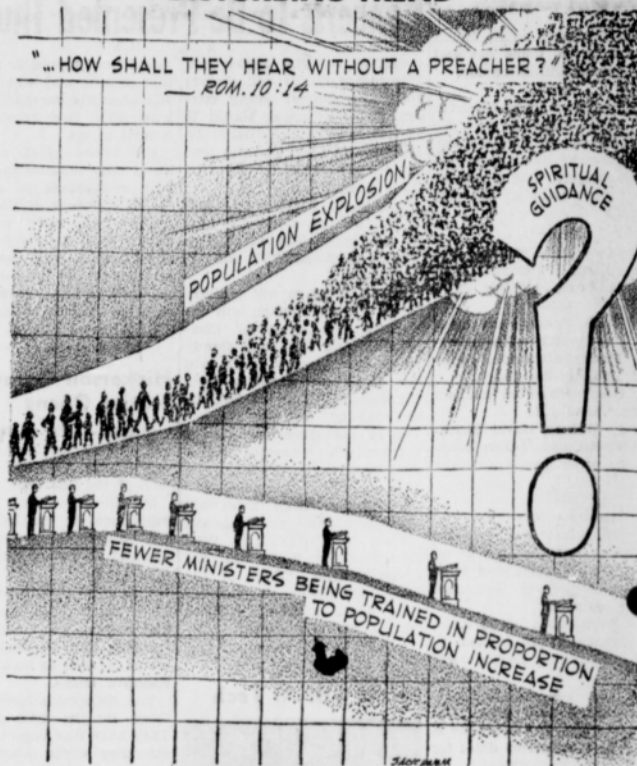

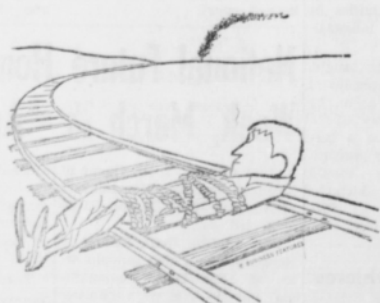

From a limited beginning in 1964, this method of accepting the farmer's word that he has followed program regulations has now become standard in all agricultural counties - nearly 2900 - across the nation.

In Callahan County, farm

program compliance by certification has been in effect since 1969.

This method of compliance is used for all crops. Photographic copies of fields and farms are provided farmers, who then use these aerial photographs to designate their set-aside, crop, and conserving base acreage when certifying that they have complied with farm program provisions.

According to Tommie Harris, Chairman of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, certification is actually the third formal step a farmer takes in participating in the feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs for 1971.

Report From Representative Hanna

It was decided it might save the state some money if the tax bill came first, and then let the appropriations committee decide which agency gets what from the money produced from that tax bill, or what ever is available.

We believe it is better to spend within some frame work, than not to have any guide when deciding on new and additional services and functions for the state to perform.

D., but in the same year Jesus was crucified (Acts 1:1,2; 2:47).

Can one be a member of the church of Christ without joining some denomination? What about Peter, Paul or James? Were they members of the true church without being members of a denomination? What denomination were they members of? Which one did they join? Not any, of course! There were no denominations then. If they could be members of the Lord's church then without being members of a denomination, why cannot people now be members of the Lord's church without being members of any denomination? They can! By obeying the same gospel which the apostles preached.
