Official notice of Haskell County's cotton quota, which has been set at 33,151 bales, was received Thursday morning by R. H. Maxwell, county agent.

It's up to us.

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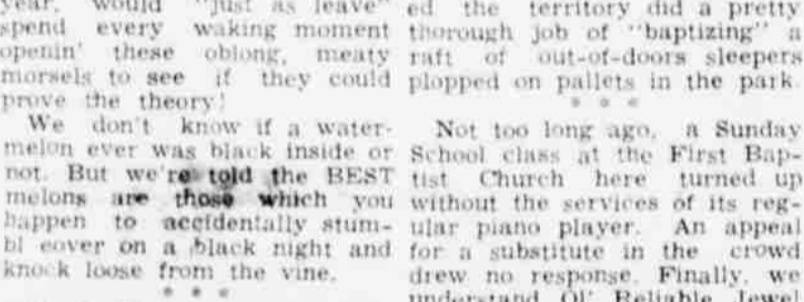
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**60 YEARS AGO**

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### Making Quite An Original Name for Self

Lakeland, Florida. University of Florida and state archaeologists believe the canoe is the only one ever found related to the warring Timucuas.

Little background is available on the Timucuas, but they reportedly ranged from Tampa northeastward to the Jacksonville area during the early 1500's. They were encountered by Ponce De Leon in 1513 and their numbers rapidly diminished through fighting and contraction of white men's diseases. The last member of the clan is believed to have died in 1750.

Larned found the canoe under six feet of muck in an area being mined for phosphate by the American Cyanamid Co. He salvaged about 16 feet of the craft, estimated to be about 20 feet long. The balance was torn away by the phosphate dredge cutting through the area.

A pole, used to propel the canoe was also found, along with several arrow heads. The pole was deteriorated, however, and flaked apart when it was moved.

In process of removal, the canoe came apart in two-foot-wide sections, but it was reassembled at Larned's Bradley, Florida home. The condition of the age-old cypress wood requires it to be watered down twice a day. Larned pointed out that cypress will endure for

centuries if it is kept moist, but tends to split and deteriorate when dried out.

The amateur archaeologist from Haskell was able to determine the origin of the relic through composition of the earth. He estimated the cypress tree was over three feet in diameter when cut sometime in the 15th century.

Expert hand craftsmanship is evident, with hull thickness constantly measuring two inches. Larned said burning coals were used to hollow out the inside as they were pressed into the wood and resulting burning ash removed. About a year was required to complete such a craft which many times lasted over 100 years. Larned reported.

The Haskell native only recently turned to exploring for Indian artifacts. He formerly spent most of his spare time looking for fossils and minerals which he has on display at a compact showplace in Bradley.

He hopes to determine the exact age of his priceless canoe through radioactive "carbon 14" testing. The time that the tree was cut can be determined with great accuracy by the test.

Haskell homelinks, mindful of the discovery of the huge Indian burial ground near Rottan recently, said Saturday they "wish Joe would come back here, put his archaeological ear to the ground, and do some 'possum' around."

A Larned "discovery" would not hurt tourist trade any, they said.

### 'Troops' Really Mass In Drowning Scare At Lake

What was reported as an almost certain tragic drowning at Lake Stamford early Sunday ended happily with "all hands safe," but only after the Haskell Sheriff's Department, Volunteer Fire Department and Holden Funeral Home attendants here had rushed to the scene at dawn to start dragging operations.

The "victim," Bill Sorenson, 32, of Midland, a Haskell County native, who lived formerly in Mattson and Rule, made his way to shore with the help of a life jacket about 3:30 a. m. Sunday after being lost three hours and floating aimlessly, unable to buck waters churned by a high wind. He walked nearly an hour up and down the south shore of the lake before hailing some fishermen who gave him a boat ride to the north side, which was a scene of frenzied activity attendant to the start of dragging operations for his body just as he appeared quite chilled, but very much alive.

Here's the way Jerry Lovett, about 30, of Stamford, Sorenson's fishing companion, told the events of midnight and early morning hours to Gene Henderson, one of the owners of Holden Funeral Home here, who went to the scene:

Sorenson and he were fishing about the middle of the lake when a pin was sheared off their motor. Sorenson, in a life jacket, jumped into the water and tried to fix it. The high wind capping the water quickly separated the boat in which Lovett remained and Sorenson. Lovett searched desperately for his companion, and finally got to shore himself in the crippled motorboat about 2:45 a. m., sounding the alarm. About 15 volunteer fishermen from Haskell, Henderson, Sheriff Garth Garrett, and his chief deputy, Pete Mercer, responded, and when nothing came of their search they were preparing the dragging operation. Mercer was the first to spot Sorenson as the motorboat of the passing fishermen carried him to the north shore. He told officers he had swum vigorously to regain the side of his boat to no avail in the high wind, then swam and floated in turn, to save his strength, but apparently was swimming away from the north shore. A flyoff was required to break a tie in Class A free flight with Lee Polansky, of Bryan, edging Dr. F. Yoder, of Odessa, by 38 seconds.

Another tie existed for third place in 1/2 A, but both models were lost on the flyoff flight, and were not found by the contest's end late Sunday.



the base of the flower and cut the length you would wish a stem. Wrap the wire with floral tape of brown or green. Put about two inches of the box, meal mixture in the bottom of a box. Stand the prepared flowers face down in the box. Then gently sift the box and meal over the blossoms until they are covered with two or three inches of it. Set this box aside for about five days. Then gently remove some of the meal mixture until you can see if the flower is thoroughly dry. If it is, be very careful and remove the rest of the meal and borax from the flower. If any grains remain, use a soft brush to dust them off.

Flowers dried in this manner look almost alive. They can be used in arrangements or to make plaques.

Another method of drying flowers is to arrange them in a vase of water and let them stay until all water has evaporated. This doesn't always work, but when it does the results are very pleasing.

There are commercial dryers for flowers, but these are very expensive. The finished flowers look no more natural than those dried in borax and meal.

Do not throw away your meal, for it can be used again and again.

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## The Good Earth

by MRS. B. F. COBB

There are so many plants and flowers growing now that can be dried for winter arrangements. With proper care, many flowers can be dried, so they retain their color.

Celastis, both the coxcomb and the plumbed variety, can be cut and hung, head down, in a dark, warm, dry place, to dry. The hot water heater closet is a good place for drying these flowers. I usually nail a wire or string across the closet just above the heater but well away from the pipe. This way several coxcombs can be hung at one time. Hang the flower-head down. Spraying lightly with hair spray or clear plastic, also helps to preserve the color and keeps the flower from shattering after it is dry.

Marigolds, zinnias, bachelor buttons, corn flowers, straw flowers, statice, larkspur and many other flowers dry well when placed in 5 parts meal, 1 part borax.

Pick the flowers at noon or as close to then as possible. At this time, the water leaves the plant for a few hours. From 10 to 3 is about the time flowers are at their driest. Pinch off the stem. Insert a wire in
