## Pregnant woman stabbed

daughter at $10: 10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Wednesday, said Dr. Kenneth Mattox, director of emergency surgical services at Ben Taub Hospital. The baby was later transferred to Lyndon Baines Johnson
Hospital where Hospital where she is listed in critical but stable condition. The woman's throat had been slashed, and she had been stabb-
ed several times in the chest. She also had been shot, but it was not clear how many times. The baby's father was at work when the attack occurred inside
the couple's apartment near downtown. A murder charge is pendine couple's apartment near downtown. A man arrested after the attack. ding against a man arrested after the attack
The baby girl was the couple's first child.
Two teams of physicians, assembled at the back door of Ben Taub's emergency room, jumped into action seconds after the ambulance arrived with the woman, Mattox said.

"From the time the two of them hit the back door we had heart and done a Caesarean section within 45 seconds," Mattox said.
