Rain, wind sweep area

Steady rain and blowing winds, along with an unseasonable drop in temperature, blanketed the area Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning.

No letup was in sight, either, as Wednesday evening's forecast called for cloudy and cooler with a 60 percent chance of rain. The trend is expected to continue, at least through Thursday.

Snyder recorded .83 of an inch of rain as of 7:25 a.m. Wednesday, bringing the total for 1989 to 10.54 inches. Last year's rainfall total through Sept. 3 was 15.48 in-

The low Tuesday was 50 degrees, although gusting winds caused the chill factor to indicate much lower temperatures.

Highway 180 was closed between Lamesa and Gail in at least two places Tuesday evening, and remained closed Wednesday morning, it was reported. At Key, some 10 miles west of Lamesa, water was said to be four-foot deep over the highway. Water also covered the road in a low area about two miles east of Key.

Lamesa reported about 3 inches of rain while Gail received

Fluvanna also reported 2.10 inches, which was the most rainfall reported in Scurry County.

West of Snyder, toward Gail, rainfall reports indicated 1.5 inches. The Polar community, in Kent County, noted 1.2 inches.

Other area rainfall reports indicated .90 of an inch in Ira, 1 inch north of Snyder, .75 of an inch at Dunn, 1.5 inches two miles east of Dunn, 1.8 inches east of Snyder toward Roby and 1.3 inches near Loyd Mountain.

Ryan to run?

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas Rangers pitcher Nolan Ryan says in a published report today he's considering trying to topple Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower in next year's state elections.

Baseball's all-time strikeout leader told the Houston Post that he could mount a race while pitching another season for the Rangers.

The 42-year-old Ryan, before taking the mound against the Kansas City Royals Tuesday night, told the newspaper he could play and campaign at the same time, but he has yet to decide whether he will pitch, seek office or both in 1990.

The Alvin, Texas, cattle rancher publicly expressed interest in seeking statewide office as early as 1985. He said he was approached last week by the Texas Farm Bureau about running against Hightower.

Plant okaved

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Senate appropriations panel has agreed to spend \$7.5 million to clean up raw sewage pollution in the Rio Grande, which is so dirty south of Laredo the water is unsafe to touch, says Sen. Phil Gramm.

"The pollution of the Rio Grande is the most severe environmental problem in Texas and this is a major step toward dealing with it." said Gramm, R-Texas, a member of the appropriations subcommittee that approved the funds Tuesday.

The money would be used to begin construction of a \$44 million sewage treatment plant in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, across the border from Laredo. Gramm was at the sign-

ing of an agreement last month in Laredo at which U.S. and Mexican officials pledged to build the plant, four years after the issue first arose in Congress.

Hurst was 5-2 with a 1.90 earned run average with battery mate Mark Parent, who has caught most of his recent starts. But the right-hander worked just fine with Alomar, tossing his ninth complete game to tie for the NL lead and his second shutout of the season.

After getting the final out, Hurst walked off the field with his arm around Alomar in a show of appreciation.

"I wanted to be proud to catch Bruce Hurst and play for the Padres, but to catch a shutout in my first game ... was a magnifi-cent experience," said Alomar, who added a sixth-inning RBI. "I never even did that in Triple A, catch a shutout in my first game of the season.

The victory was the Padres' 16th in 19 games, and pulled them two games ahead of the thirdplace Astros with a sweep of the two-game series.





DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been hypothyroid for 12 years. I know very little about the condition and how it affects my body and my life. What happens when my thyroid gland quits

DEAR READER: A proper amount of thyroid hormone is necessary for normal body functioning; too little causes depression, heart disease, hair loss, listlessness and constipation; too much causes nervousness, weight loss, rapid pulse and weakness. Ordinarily, the thyroid gland manufactures and releases the correct amount.

In certain circumstances, however, the gland's production of hormone is excessive or, in cases such as yours, insufficient. Symptoms of thyroid malfunction depend on the degree of over- or under-production. For example, a patient may be mildly hypothyroid, meaning that the gland releases some hormone but not quite enough. Symptoms may be minimal: lassitude, lack of energy, menstrual irregularities, sluggish bowels.

Other patients may receive little or no hormone from the gland. They will experience more profound symptoms, such as fluid retention, intolerance to

cold, loss of hair, coarsening of the features, slow pulse and heart failure.

Thyroid hormone is analogous to gasoline in your car. You can't operate the vehicle for long on aviationgrade fuel (hyperthyroidism) because the engine will burn out. Conversely, you can't run your auto on kerosene (hypothyroidism) because the engine was designed to operate on higher octane.

Fortunately, both over- and underactive thyroid glands can be treated. In the first instance, doctors administer treatment to reduce the thyroid excess. In the second, physicians prescribe pills to supplement the hormone deficiency.

If you are taking thyroid supplements daily, you should have no health problems from your hypothyroidism. The pills are inexpensive and will correct your deficiency. In order to assess your thyroid needs, your physician should obtain periodic blood tests of thyroid function; he or she can then adjust the dose of your

To answer your question specifically, unless you obtain thyroid supplements, you could become quite ill if your gland stopped working. To give you more information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "In-

DEAR DR. GOTT: What effect does caffeine have on an unborn infant?

DEAR READER: Because caffeine crosses the placental barrier and is absorbed into the fetal circulation, it can affect an unborn child the same way it affects an adult: nervousness. jitteriness, insomnia and rapid pulse. In the vast majority of cases, this is not a problem; only when the motherto-be uses caffeine excessively will the fetus show signs of overstimulation.

district's mandatory drug testing plan is unconstitutional. The district is appealing its case to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals. **Board member David Murrell** said Tuesday that the plan, which

requires mandatory testing of all students who want to participate in extracurricular activities, is voluntary because nobody forces the students to participate in the activities.

"It's a free choice," Murrell said. "If you don't want to be drug tested, you don't have to participate.

"I don't see how a judge can rule that a public institution cannot voluntarily test students. The government has drug testing in the voluntary armed services and in the civil service," Murrell said. "It's just part of the system. How is that any different from schools?"

Gibson's Aug. 24 ruling was the result of a November 1988 lawsuit filed by then-senior Brent Brooks, who had been expelled from the school's Future Farmers of America chapter after refusing to take the test.

Democrats keep Wright's seat as Geren wins election

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) -Democrats held onto the District allegations he repeatedly 12 congressional seat they've considered their own for more than three decades by electing former congressional aide Pete Geren, a political rookie, to replace deposed House Speaker Jim Wright.

Geren took 51.03 percent of the vote Tuesday to beat Republican Dr. Bob Lanier, a TV medical commentator, who had 48.97 per-

With all precincts counted, Geren had 40,210 ballots in unofficial results. Lanier had 38,590.

Geren, an attorney and former aide to Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas, will serve the remainder of Wright's term, which expires next year.

Wright's seat came open when he resigned during an ethics investigation after 34 years in of-

"No one fills the shoes of the speaker of the house," Geren said. "It's going to be a long road back to restoring the clout and the influence that Fort Worth and Tarrant County have grown used to having.'

Lanier told supporters not to throw away his campaign signs because he'll probably run again in the spring for the regular elec-

"We don't feel like we really lost that much. I mean, we did better than anybody's done in this county for this particular party," Lanier said.

Lanier came out ahead of Geren and six other candidates in a special election Aug. 12, but a runoff was called because no candidate gained a majority.

Republicans hoped the election would be a turnaround in the 12th District, a longtime Democratic stronghold covering most of Fort Worth and Tarrant County.

However, Geren raised almost twice as much money as Lanier, who called the race an "upstream swim." Geren also had the advantage of a district gerrymandered in 1980 to favor Democrats.

Lanier, 44, a pediatric allergist and immunologist, is featured on "60-Second Housecall," a television spot syndicated to local news broadcasts in more than 40 television markets.

Geren, 37, was an aide to Bentsen from 1983 to 1985. He lost a 1986 race in the 6th District to Rep. Joe Barton, a Republican.

The voters showed little interest in the campaign. About 27 percent of the district's 287,000 registered voters went to the polls Tuesday, a slightly better turnout than election officials had predicted.

Wright resigned in June amid violated congressional ethics rules involving speaking fees and business deals.

During the congressional investigation, Wright was criticized for having groups buy his book, "Reflections of a Public Man" instead of paying him an honorarium.

While the House limits what a member can keep in fees from speaking engagements to 30 percent of the congressional salary, royalties are exempt. Wright was set up to receive 55 percent royalties on the books.

Lanier and Geren differed on accepting speaking fees. Geren said he wouldn't take honoraria from special-interest groups, because it would give the appearance of impropriety.

Lanier said the \$89,500-peryear congressional salary isn't enough and he would take the

An eight-candidate special election Aug. 12 drew only a fifth of the district's voters. Lanier won 39 percent of the vote to 32 percent for Geren.

Both candidates emphasized their endorsements and differing backgrounds. Geren, who was endorsed by Wright and Bentsen, cited his experience as a legislative aide.

Lanier received endorsements from President Bush and former Dallas Cowboys coach Tom Landry. He said he was in better touch with his constituents' concerns than his opponent.

Geren supports sending U.S. troops to Colombia to fight drug dealers, opposes restrictions on owning semiautomatic weapons and signed a pledge to vote against any new taxes. He said the war on drugs will be his first concern on Capitol Hill.

He said the city would be violating its own building code by reducing the distance between his house and the street from 24 fic. to 20 feet.

William R. Hibbs of 4515 Galveston Ave. said the public should have had the chance to express opinions before now. "We should unite together before things get this far," he said. "These people on 37th, they've definitely got a gripe."

Richard Chambers of Rt. 2, who lives on East 37th St., compared the 37th St. widening to the construction of Houston Ave. along the southwestern side of Snyder, calling Houston Ave. "this million-dollar fiasco that goes absolutely nowhere.'

Line, who lives about six months of each year in Ruidoso, N.M., also compared the 37th St. widening with the Houston Ave. project and said the highway department has been unjustified

in both proposals.
