Argee paying disgruntled workers now

by The Associated Press A general contractor handling construction work at three prison sites - including the Price Daniel Unit near Snyder - has paid more than \$90,000 to about

110 disgruntled employees. Responding to complaints from construction workers employed by subcontractors, Argee Corp. agreed to pay about 43 workers at the Hightower Unit near Dayton back wages they contended had not been paid since Aug. 4. Those workers were given \$26,030 Thursday.

Workers at prison sites in Woodville and Snyder also have been paid at recent meetings, bringing the total payout to \$93,400. Some, however, still contend they have not been compensated pro-

Argee had subcontracted with G&S Sandblasting and Allied which then hired the workers. Some of the workers contended they were not paid union scale wages or were not paid at all beginning Aug. 4.

The workers complained to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, which set up the meeting for the employees to be paid.

George Baldwin, an attorney for Argee, said the company likely will file suit against the subcontractors to recover the money paid to workers Thursday. Argee had hired both subcontractors at the Dayton site, Baldwin said, and ran into problems with both.

Baldwin said the money in question had been sent to G&S to pay workers. In the other situation, Baldwin said Allied had asked for money to meet payroll but had not shown a certified payroll or other evidence of the amount

Both subcontractors contend they never received money from Argee to pay the workers.

Ted Sellers, an administrative assistant in the office of state Sen. Temple Dickson, D-Sweetwater, has investigated the problem since Aug. 8, when workers at the Snyder prison site contacted him.

Sellers said the subcontractors had had problems there and at the prison sites in Dayton and Woodville.

"This is what's making all of it worth it seeing these people who have been waiting all this time to get paid," Sellers said. "The guys that have been hurt the most are getting their money."

Q-Is there a law in Snyder concerning the skateboard riders going down the middle of the street?

A-There are two pertinent sections in the city's traffic code, one saying that no person on roller skates or any coaster, toy vehicle or similar device may go onto any street, roadway or highway except while crossing a street in a cross-walk, like a pedestrian, and another says it is unlawful for anyone riding a bicycle, motorcycle, coaster, sled, roller skates or any vehicle of any kind to attach himself to any moving vehicle on a street, highway or roadway.

Won't testify

WASHINGTON (AP) -Former HUD Secretary Samuel Pierce did not appear today as scheduled before a House subcommittee investigating scandals at his department, and the panel's chairman said he would seek a subpoena to compel his testimony.

Pierce abruptly canceled plans to testify Thursday evening, saying he had not had time to prepare and had only recently hired an attorney.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - A printing plant worker who shot 20 co-workers had pledged to get even after being let go for mental disability last year, but his employees at the plant say.

Joseph T. Wesbecker, armed with several semiautomatic weapons, went from floor to floor shooting former co-workers at the Standard Gravure Corp., killing seven and wounding 13 before taking his own life Thursday morn-

Wesbecker, a 47-year-old pressman, was placed on permanent disability leave last year because of mental illness, police said.

"He carried a big grudge because of that," said George Oswine, a former co-worker.

Another former coworker, pressman Joe White, said Wesbecker's talk centered on guns and Soldier of Fortune magazine.

Vaccinations continue in crowded city jail

HOUSTON (AP) - Harris disease had had their spleens County Jail officials are continu- removed. ing a vaccination program for personnel and inmates to try to curb further cases of a bacterial infection that has killed two inmates at the crowded facility.

As of Thursday evening, more than 600 had received a pneumococcal vaccine. The inmates and staffers also are being treated with daily oral doses of penicillin - measures recommended by medical experts from the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta as well as city and county medical personnel, said Susan Cathey with the jail's medical

Officials Wednesday said they were offering the vaccination and antibodies to inmates at a high risk of contracting the infection, but Ms. Cathey said all inmates were being advised of the treatment.

Ms. Cathey said 17 inmates remain hospitalized — one in critical condition — while 27 others are being evaluated in the jail's infirmary. Seven, including the two deaths, were confirmed cases of pneumoccous disease,

Those at high risk of contracting the illness include those with cardiovascular disease, pulmonary disease, diabetes, alcoholism, cirrhosis, sickle cell disease, cancer, organ transplantation and those without spleens.

The two inmates who died last Thursday of pneumoccous actions were postponed.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Can you provide

DEAR READER: In addition to blood circulation, each of us has a secondary system of fluid circulation called the lymphatic system. Lymph fluid is the colorless watery liquid that fills blisters. Small amounts of it are normally present in all tissues. Lymph circulates back to the heart (and into the bloodstream) through a series of lymph channels, thin-walled tubes that are periodically interrupted by lymph nodes, balls of tissue acting as filters.

If the lymph channels are injured or the lymph nodes damaged (or removed during surgery), the lymph fluid accumulates in the part of the body supplied by these structures. Tissue swelling (edema) ensues.

I assume you had a serious fall, which damaged the lymph channels, and now the lymph is pooling in a part of your body — probably an arm or a leg, the most common locations for this to occur. This affliction is not hazardous.

However, if you are bothered by the edema - if it is painful or quite pronounced, for instance - you should be examined by a doctor, such as a vascated type of X-ray examination, called a lymphangiogram, the spe-cialist may be able to pinpoint the lymph blockage and repair it surgically. Or the specialist may suggest non-surgical therapy, such as diuretic medicine and pressurized sleeves, to relieve your edema. 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El Paso thrift sues

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — An El Paso thrift has filed a lawsuit against directors of its predecessor, El Paso Electric Co. and a New Mexico thrift alleging they participated in complex transactions that damaged the savings and loan.

The suit filed by El Paso Savings Association names former directors of El Paso Federal Savings and Loan Association, the utility and Sun Country Savings Bank of New Mexico, based in Las Cruces, N.M.

Austin businessman Al Hughes took over El Paso Federal last year and renamed it El Paso Savings Association.

The suit filed Tuesday alleges the transactions caused El Paso Federal's holding company to appear to have more capital than it actually had and disguised the condition of the institution from regulators, the lawsuit contends.

The financial condition was misrepresented by the actions of the directors, who could personally profit from stock ownership, the suit said.



The National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials says 3,783 Hispanic elected officials hold office in 37 states, an increase of 12.6 percent from



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


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

Ralston, 47, led the Mustangs to a 185-67 dual match record in his nine years at SMU.


His teams ranked among the Top 10 six consecutive seasons from 1982-87.







Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, who has introduced legislation to remove naturally occurring salt from entering the lake, said he is extremely disappointed in the administration's position.

"They have proposed a three-year payback of the federal share of the project at 10.25 per-cent interest. That amounts to no federal cost-sharing at all," said Bentsen, D-Texas. "This water problem threatens the economic base of the entire Panhandle area."

Under Bentsen's desalinization plan, local governments would spend about \$6.4 million on the project, with the Bureau of Reclamation providing about \$2 million in design and construction management expertise.

At a hearing before a Senate subcommittee Thursday, the administration acknowledged increasingly salty water could threaten the Panhandle's economic base.

The church will buy the property of the historic Gaston Avenue Baptist Church for the college campus, Criswell said.

Renovation of the property will begin after the first of the year The college, which offers undergraduate and graduate degrees with an emphasis on vocational ministries, is expected to be open by the next school year.

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
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
