An expenditure of \$653,000 been approved by the exas Highway Commission highway construction durng 1965-66 along 10.8 highway miles on State Highway 24 rom the east city limits of askell to Rule, District Highway Engineer J. C. (Jake) Roberts, of Abilene, has notified officials here.

The work in this area will be under the supervision of W. F. Dixon, resident engineer, Anson, and is part of the 1965-66 consolidated highway program approved by the state highway commission in Austin last Friday.

Two projects are slated on State Highway 24 in Haskell County: Purchase of rights-ofway and widening of pavement inside Haskell from the west city limit to the east city limit. a distance of 2.3 miles at an estimated cost of \$278,000; and reconstruct grading, structures,
