

Voting locations open until 7 p.m.

Registered voters in Scurry County have until 7 o'clock this evening to cast their ballots in the statewide constitutional amendments election.

Polls opened at four locations at 7 a.m. The location of the precincts are as follows:

- -Precinct 1, Boxes 14, 15 and 16: Scurry County Health Unit
- -Precinct 2, Boxes 5, 6, 17 and 18: Scurry County Library.
- -Precinct 3, Boxes 7, 8, 9 and 19: Towle Park Barn.
- Precinct 4, Boxes 10, 11, 12 and 13: Senior Citizens Center.

The election date is nation-wide in scope, but the only decisions pertaining to Scurry County voters will be the 21 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Jim Wadleigh, retired owner of Wadleigh Construction Co., currently is battling health problems. Jim spends most of his time at home, but he still has that energy that was so evident in his building construction business.

Jim now reads a lot and watches a bunch of TV. When we saw him recently, he had just watched Jim Bakker and ZaZa Gabor get sentenced, and Jim mused that the worst punishment might be locking the pair up in the same cell.

Jim also told us about how he got to Snyder. A native of Denver, Jim had worked a while in Indiana and headed out for Amarillo. Starting out with \$12 in his pocket, he ended up with \$4 when he reached Scurry County.

We were repeating that story to Wadleigh's long-time friend, E.D. Walton, who panned, 'Yep, and Jim's still got three of those dollars."

Thrift as a way of life was natural for Wadleigh, whose mother participated in the war effort by

Wadleigh recently was going through the personal things of his mother, Mrs. C.A. Wadleigh of Aurora, Colo., and ran across a government pamphlet entitled "War Cook Book," printed in 1917. The effort was aimed at saving food and eliminating waste to assist in the war effort. The book reminded that women controlled "ninetenths of the consumption of food.

It directed, in the spring when the stock of potatoes runs low, to eat rice. "When the potato crop is harvested, eat potatoes, the rice is wanted for the army."

Other suggestions included two wheatless days each week and one wheatless meal per day. It also suggested one meatless day per week and one meatless meal each day.

"Be contented with simple food, simple pleasures, simple clothes. Work hard, pray hard, play word. Work, eat, recreate and sleep.,..we all have a victory to win.

DEAR READER: You have described a retinal detachment, during which the jellylike filling of the eyeball pulls portions of the retina from the back of the eye. This is a serious visual problem that comes with age. Eventually, the detachment may cause partial or complete blindness. Your best source of information is your ophthalmologist. He or she is familiar with your case and can discuss reatment options with you.

You may need referral to eye specialists at a teaching center, particularly if your eye problems are complex. Certain forms of retinal detachment can be treated with laser

To make a long story short, I was sent to an adolescent psychiatric facility, put in a padded cell and tested. They found that I had a biochemical imbalance. I was treated with anti-depressant drugs and psychotherapy, which partially solved my problem.

The point I really want to make is this: All the signs were there to read, but nobody wanted to read them.



British expert Sally Horton and her husband Mark defended carefully to defeat today's part-score contract of two hearts. Some players might have bid two diamonds over one heart with the West cards, but Sally took a conservative approach because of unfa-

vorable vulnerability. On a different auction, North might have bid more, but South would have jumped in hearts with 9 or 10 points after a takeout double, and the queen of diamonds was likely a worthless card, so North simply raised to the two-level.

After K-A of diamonds, with East signaling a doubleton, West continued with the diamond jack. South made a sensible play, discarding a low club from dummy. East played the jack of clubs, showing strength. Sally knew that the jack of clubs denied the queen. (With Q-J-10, East would play the queen.) So East must hold the club king. Armed with that knowledge, West led the nine of clubs. East won the king of clubs and returned a club. Sally took the ace of clubs. The defenders had five tricks. A fourth diamond was now played. Declarer discarded a spade from dummy, East ruffed with the 10 of hearts, and West's holding of J-8-6 was promoted to the setting trick. A nice defense, but it would not have been possible without the underlead of the ace of clubs

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush said today he hoped the U.S. decision to return \$567 million in frozen assets to Iran will help get "underbrush cleaned out" and lead to the eventual release of hostages.

"I carry the fate of the hostages with me every single day," Bush told a news conference at the White House a day before the first anniversary of hiselection He said he knew of no. time, however.

Bush convened reporters on the anniversary of his election victory and he used an introductory statement to sum up with satisfaction his first 10 months in office.

"I enjoy it; I like the challenge," he said.





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
