

Preliminary audit is now complete; intense may follow

Two representatives of a Lubbock accounting firm conducted a preliminary audit of Scurry County governmental operations Tuesday and Wednesday, and they indicated to county officials that a full-scale audit could begin around Dec. 1, if they are directed to proceed with one.

Accountants Ben Robinson and Daniel Winders of Coopers and Lybrand were brought to county commissioners court Wednesday afternoon by District Judge Gene L. Dulaney, who ordered the

preliminary audit on Oct. 16 and will make the decision about a more thorough examination of county records.

Commissioners Tommy Pate and Ted Billingsley today said although a final decision to conthey were told the four initial duct the audit has not been made, areas of interest in an operational audit would be the county airport, the county-owned Cogdell Memorial Hospital, the hospital's financial transactions with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice and the Board of County Development.

Billingsley and Pate both were disgruntled about the prospect of

an audit this morning, with Billingsley commenting, "Nuts. That's all I've got to say.

Pate called the prospective audit "a waste of taxpayers" money.

The commissioners said Robinson and Winders told them the audit, if the company and Dulaney decide to proceed with it, would probably entail 200 hours of work at a cost of \$125 per hour, or \$22,500.

"It's not in the budget," Billingsley said. "We may have to go to the bank over here (to borrow money) to pay it.

"We don't have to do anything they say," the Pct. 4 commissioner added. "We don't have to

Dulaney said this morning that the two Coopers and Lybrand men indicated to him that "a further audit in some areas" might be justified, according to the results of their preliminary work.

"An audit of this type has never been done in Scurry County," the judge said. "It's entirely different from the outside financial audit that the commissioners have done every year.

"It's an operational audit. Instead of what's been done in the past, it focuses on what could be done in the future to save

Tornado kills 19, leaves 463 injured

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP) -Rescuers crawled through collapsed homes and shops today looking for more victims of a tornado that carved a 3-mile stretch of destruction, killing 19 people, injuring 463 and leaving 1,000 homeless.

"It's like taking six to 10 city blocks and putting them in a blender and putting it on liquefy," said rescue worker Bob Caraway. He was among those called out to help dig through rubble for survivors or the bodies of

The tornado was one of a series that touched down Wednesday in an arc spanning at least seven states from the Deep South to the Midwest. The other tornadoes

caused at least 19 injuries and far-flung property damage.

In Huntsville, teams with cranes and floodlights searched for the injured or dead, hampered by wind-whipped rain and temperatures that plummeted overnight from 73 degrees into the 30s.

Gov. Guy Hunt sent 50 National Guardsmen to help. Elsewhere:

-In Georgia, 19 people were injured, four critically, and at least 200 people were evacuated after a tornado struck two mobile home parks and an interstate highway near Palmetto, about 25 miles southeast of Atlanta, authorities

Strict, low salt diet may be harmful

long believed a cause of high blood pressure, may have the opposite effect on some people on strict low-salt diets, a study says. But other doctors insist it's still better to keep your hands off the

Dr. Brent Egan, director of the hypertension unit at the Medical College of Wisconsin, said his study suggests that strictly limiting salt intake could be bad for people with normal blood pressure.

He said he believes that the American Heart Association's suggestion of limiting daily salt consumption to 7 grams, or about 1½ teaspoons, is safe. But he said further study is necessary before more stringent rules are adopted for the general population.

"I think there are some people who are harmed by severe to moderate salt restriction, at least in the short term," said Egan,

DEAR DR. GOTT: Our dentist has proposed fillings on seven of my teeth, at a cost of about \$330. I'm 60 and retired. Does this procedure make good sense at my age, or is our dentist just putting the bite on us?

DEAR READER: I'm not a dentist and, therefore, can answer you only in

general way You probably have two choices: ignore the dental condition, or do something about it. Under the first option, you're likely to end up having the teeth removed; this will require a partial plate and may herald further dental problems. The second option will cost you some dough - but probably less, in the long run, than option No. 1.

I have patients who have chosen to have all their teeth removed at an early age, to avoid the "bother." But I've never met anyone who thought store-bought teeth were as good as their natural ones.

You're relatively young and have lots of years to chew. Ask you dentist to refer you to a colleague for a second opinion

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please explain what a visual-field test is. An eye specialist has advised me to take the test because of glaucoma.

DEAR READER: Look up from your reading and focus on an object across the room. Without moving your eyes, gradually become aware of other objects in the room. This is your visual field: the area you can see around an object upon which you are

Eye specialists test visual fields in various ways. The purpose is to discover a defect, indicating an area of retinal damage. Some eye diseases cause progressive shrinking of visual fields that may not be noticeable to the patient until severe restrictions have appeared. Fortunately, diseases such as glaucoma are readily treated with modern medicine and rarely cause the visual handicaps that were so prevalent years ago.

DEAR DR. GOTT: On reading your column on recurring urinary-tract infections, I was reminded of a former neighbor who had the same problem. She began taking vitamin C every day and has had no more trouble. Perhaps this will interest your readers.

DEAR READER: Urinary-tract infections are caused by microorganisms, usually bacteria, that are not killed by vitamin C. Therefore, alafraid I shan't endorse vitamin C for the treatment of urinary infections.

Vitamin C is ascorbic acid and as an acid, may be excreted in the urine. In patients with bladder infection. acidic urine may reduce the burning and stinging that accompanies the condition. But vitamin C is neither a suitable treatment nor preventative for urinary-tract infection. Antibiotics are a better choice.

So he played K-Q of hearts. When East began thinking on the second heart, declarer resigned himself to the fact that East was going to ruff. (Too bad, but at least the opening lead had not been a club.) East would ruff and lead a club. South could win the ace and get to dummy by playing his eight of diamonds to the queen. Then he could ruff a heart and use that carefully preserved two of diamonds to get back to dummy's four-spot. Now wasn't declarer smart? Sure, but so was East. He refused to ruff the second heart. Eventually the defenders came to two club tricks, and our blithe declarer was one away.

Declarer must guard against 4-1 hearts and 3-0 diamonds. He does so by first playing the king of diamonds out of his hand. West shows out. Next come the king and queen of hearts. If East fails to ruff, declarer goes to dummy with a second diamond and plays a low heart. East had better come in with the trump jack now, or South will make all the tricks. Whatever East does, he cannot stop the small slam from making.

LULAC pledges to represent grand jurors

COLORADO CITY, Texas (AP) — Five Hispanic grand jurors, who resigned from the panel after it cleared a former policeman in the shooting of a Hispanic rape suspect, will get free legal representation, the national president of the League of **United Latin American Citizens**

The grand jurors, who quit Tuesday in protest, face possible contempt of court citations, District Attorney Frank Conard

LULAC president Jose de Lara said Wednesday the five resignations from the 12-person panel were a valid protest of the way Conard and the state attorney general's office handled the grand-jury investigation last week into the death of 27-year-old Sammy Gomez.

"They (the grand jurors) just need some legal representation, and our office stands ready to offer them (free) legal services,' de Lara said.

The five said in a brief statement that the grand jury proceedings were a "railroad job performed by the state and the district attorney's office."

The resignations came after at least four grand jurors voted not to indict former Colorado City policeman Billy Ray Williamson in the May 13, 1988, shooting death of Gomez.

Williamson, who had gone to Gomez's aunt's house to arrest him, said he shot Gomez in selfdefense after Gomez lunged at him with a knife. A grand jury quickly cleared Williamson.

After two autopsies were released that noted that Gomez was shot once from the side and twice from behind — including a shot to the base of the skull -LULAC lobbied successfully to have the case presented again to a grand jury. The panel cleared Williamson last Friday after hearing three days of testimony and deliberating six minutes.
Conard and two represen-

tatives from the state attorney general's office "were acting more as defense lawyers for the police rather than investigators," de Lara charged, adding: "We feel it was a mockery of justice, a kangaroo court - and it's no surprise.

Garland police officer shot during routine traffic stop

a suspect in the shootings of four other people-three fatally-in

east Dallas a short time later. Police identified the man early today as Daniel Joe Hittle, 39, of Garland. Hittle was captured after a gunbattle with Garland officers a short distance from the street corner where the officer

was slain. Officer Gerald Ray Walker apparently made a routine traffic stop at 11:14 p.m. Garland Police Spokesman Allan Peck said that shortly after the stop, an off-duty firefighter drove up to the scene and called for help on the officer's mobile radio.

Police found Walker, 48, lying

Walker was pronounced dead about midnight at Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas.

Police suspected the Garland and Dallas shootings were connected because the description of the suspect and the pickup was the same in both incidents, Ms. Hawkins said.

Walker, a 17-year-veteran of-ficer in the Dallas suburb was married and had one son.

Garland police believe it is the first fatal shooting of one of their officers in more than 20 years.

The pickup suspected in the of-ficer's shooting was spotted by Garland police who chased it until the vehicle crashed. The driver started shooting at the officers, police said.




