Raise hike package at Senate now

WASHINGTON (AP) - A hotpotato decision on a big congressional pay raise and ethics package rests in the lap of a skittish Senate with only a few days left before Congress plans to adjourn for the year.

"Formidable, but possible," was how Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole described the task of getting his sharply divided chamber to act before Thanksgiving on the plan approved 252-174 Thursday in the House.

The House approved a plan to raise its pay, and that of other top government officials, by more than 35 percent in less than 14 months. House salaries would soar from the current \$89,500 to more than \$120,000.

With the higher pay, House members would be barred beginning in 1991 from pocketing honoraria checks for speeches before interest groups. They also would be subject to other new rules in the first major overhaul of its ethics rules in 12 years.

The House plan doesn't include a raise for the Senate unless the Senate votes to include itself. (see PAY, page 8)

Q-If the roll-back on taxes passes will it affect county employees and how many, and will taxes on houses go up?

A-These questions have been answered in a number of articles and in an open letter by county commissioners. But, since we have received a number of "ask us" questions similar to this recently, we will answer them once more. The county tax you pay on your house will not go up if taxes are rolled back. It will go down from 39.80 cents to 34.75 cents per \$100 valuation. Roughly, a person paying taxes on a house with a market value of \$50,000 would save approximately \$20. As to the effect of the roll-back and county employees, certainly the budget would have to be cut. Whether that means cutting employee salaries or reducing the county work force or doing without some county services or a combination of all three, will have to be determined after the election.

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

Three tricks go begging

If your partner opened with one no-trump, showing 15-17 high-card points, and you held an ace, wouldn't you think an opponent would have a hard time making four hearts? South was confronted with just such a situation. What's more, the opponents were Zachary Taylor the day before. vulnerable, so maybe the penalty

would be juicy. But then South asked himself why a vulnerable East would risk bidding four hearts. Perhaps he held an unusual distributional hand. Finally South chose to believe that East was on solid ground, so South bid five diamonds, not really expecting to

West led K-A of clubs and declarer

ruffed. It was not hard to figure out why West didn't lead hearts - he had none. South played two rounds of diamonds and then a third round, just in case either defender would be foolish enough to throw a spade from four of them. He played dummy's A-K-Q of spades, throwing a heart, and then played the last spade. He thought of ruffing this spade and leading a heart. He could then make the hand if West had started with a singleton ace of hearts. But that did not make any sense. So declarer threw still another heart on dummy's last spade. West won the trick but had nothing left except black cards. Whatever he led, declarer would ruff in dummy and shed his last losing heart to make the contract.

waited until the last minute to vote against a \$30,000 pay raise already made up their minds.

But others, who voted early and voted yes on the ethics package and pay raise, say the late voters were benefitting from their no vote while still profiting from the increase in salary.

'Never love your job so much you're afraid to lose it and be ready to do what is necessary,' says Rep. Albert Bustamante, who voted for the pay raise and ban on honoraria - speaking and appearance fees from special interests.

"I didn't want to be like the rest of the people, who voted no on the convenience they could hide behind a no vote. It was a little bit hypocritical, waiting until the very end, making sure that everything was safe," said Bustamante, a San Antonio Democrat.

The Texans who waited until the last minute were among dozens of House members who cast their vote on the ethics package after an overwhelming majority of their colleagues had made sure the pay raise, which boosts their salaries from \$89,500 to more than \$120,000 by 1991, would be approved.

The bill passed 252 to 174, just 10 months after intense public criticism forced the House to re-

Replacements ordered by AF

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - San Antonio Air Logistics Center officials are warning bases with C-5 cargo planes to replace four hydraulic system lines, in the wake of a fire on one of the planes at Kelly Air Force Base.

Air Force engineers determined the aluminum return lines on the plane permitted hydraulic fluid to feed the fire once it erupted, said a statement issued by the Air Logistics Center.

'Bases are instructed to remove the four aluminum return lines and replace them with stainless steel lines which will be manufactured at each base," the Kelly statement said.

No cause of the Nov. 7 fire has been pinpointed, and an Air Force Mishap Investigation is probing the incident.

Seven base employees, including civilian workers and firefighters, were injured in the C-5A blaze. All were released from hospitals by the following

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 19-yearold female recently diagnosed with Crohn's disease. I know what I'm not supposed to do, but I don't know much about the disease. Also, can I get pregnant and successfully carry the baby for nine months? I recently married and am thinking of my future.

DEAR READER: Crohn's disease, or regional enteritis is a chronic inflammatory disease of the terminal small intestine and colon, causing chronic diarrhea, fever, weight loss and poor health. The cause is unknown; treatment consists of diet, antibiotics, cortisone and - if serious complications, such as abscesses, develop — surgery.

You need to have as much information as you can get about the disease. I urge you to pester your doctor until he or she answers all your questions. For example, the issue of pregnancy is of enormous importance but cannot be addressed except by a doctor who knows your case in detail.

Crohn's disease is a serious enough problem to warrant the care of a gastroenterologist. In dealing with the practical aspects of the disease (and obtaining emotional support), you may be helped by contacting the National Foundation for Ileitis and Colitis at 112 North Hamlin Ave., Park

I have never heard of nails being sore without nail polish. I think you should be examined by a dermatologist; perhaps you have an abnormality to explain your very unusual complaint. 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


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
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
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
