#### Worthy of Cognizance And Commendation

Our legislators in Texas should be congratulated for their intelligent actions by the enactment of laws which provide for the State Board of Insurance to prompagate standard automobile policy contracts and forms , and make rates which are fair These laws provide for the State Board of Insurance to do this, and not individual communies.

Texas rates are among the lowest in the nation. There are THIRTY-SIX other states which have higher average premiums for automobile liability insurance, even though Texas ranks SIXTH in number of licensed drivers in the nation. FIFTH in population; THIRD in the number of private passenger automobile registrations; and FIRST in miles of highway

The State Board of Insurance requires that all companies use uniform policy contracts and forms so that the public can know exactly what they are buying regardless of which company sells it. This guarantees the public a uniform interpretation of their policy and that is not possible, we are informed, in most

There are no "gammick contracts" and the more than 350 companies writing automobile distirunce in Texas must the the state approved torms -not one drawn up by certain individual companies to suit their purposes

There is intense competition between insurance companies This competition takes the form of servicing facilities or as dividends which may be paid policyholders. The only difference in Texas and other states, we are told, is that the Texas statutes provide that a company must earn a profit before it can pay a dividend. This type of law protects the public by preventing companies from becoming insolvent because of unjustified rate-cut-

ting practices. The Texas rating law provides a system whereby an average set of rates are established, based on the loss experience of all insurance companies, big or small, writing business in Texas. Rates in each county and territory, we understand, are made on losses paid in that particular area.

Texas is divided into twenty-six different rating territories for the purpose of reporting and analyzing the experience of each of various types of automobile coverages. The rates for private passenger automobiles are further divided into eight classifications of drivers. This makes at least 208 divisions of experience

for the liability classes. For collision coverages, the number is increased greatly by having four different age groups, twelve different price groups, and eleven different typs of collision coverages producing some. thing in excess of 16,500 rates for collision coverages alone.

All the foregoing strongly indicates that Texas rates, controlled by actual losses paid to, or on behalf of, Texans, provide a healthy situation worthy of all Texans' cognizance and commendation.





There is one very outstanding celocia (coxcomb) of dark maroon, growing on a stem 2½ to 3 feet tall. The crest (flower head) is nearly as large as a basketball.

November and early December are really months of work in the garden. There is a great need to get plants into the ground before the earth freezes too solid to dig.

Here are a few things to be done in the next few weeks. Set out roses, shrubs, peony crowns and iris. Divide and replant daisies; dahlias may be dug, dried and stored for winter.

Be sure to keep plants moist enough, to survive this winter. Asparagus crowns may be planted now. They should be planted in rows or beds, 18 to 24 inches apart, in rich porous oil. A heavy mulching of established beds helps enrich the soil and preserve winter moisture. It also prevents the heaving soil from damaging the

Turner has turned over Mrs. Sterling's letter and the check to Danny's parents, and has written the Ira P-TA in gratitude for that group's thought-

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
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
