

### NOTHING IS FREE

Numbers of people, apparently, believe the government gets its money out of thin air, or from some mysterious source that has nothing to do with themselves

This, basically, was the thought of Congressman Lipscomb of California when he said: "It should come as no surprise to anyone that the money the federal government spends must ultimately come from the people, though all too often it seems. that this fact is overlooked or ignored.

One reason for this is that for income and property levies, most of the taxes we pay are hidden. Everything we buy, from an article so small as a loaf of bread to one so large as an automobile, carries a multitude of taxes levied at the raw material, manufacturing, processing, transporting, retailing and other levels. And those taxes, like all the other costs that enter into the production of goods and services, must be paid by the consumer

These are truisms that should be known to every school child. But they tend to become lost in the face of the widespread belief that government "gives" us things. The truth is that government can "give" nothing. It can take the money from the people, now or at some future date, to pay the costs and, also, it tacks on handsome sums to cover the administrative and bureaucrutic



Apricot, peach, plum and pear trees have such dark green foliage they almost appear to be black. Luscious peaches hung from the young trees, A large cottonwood tree promises shade in future years.

The south side yard is screened by mesquite, with small hackberry forming a hedge between the larger trees. Birds dropped the hackberry seed. Mrs. Thigpen will let them grow rampant until they are arge enough to trim into shade

Hawthorn, Nandina, honeysuckle and red geraniums make a pleasing picture against the south wall. A photenia at the sutheast corner of the house has promise of many years of beauty both summer and winter Two pine trees are struggling to become established after being moved twice.

Mrs. Thigpen carries out a regular schedule of watering. Every 7 to 10 days the garden is given a deep drink then left alone, for she, like myself, does not believe in lightly sprinkling

Like everyone else, Mrs. Thigpen is having trouble with chlorosis, but I believe she has it well in hand, as the foliage is darkening near the limbs. think that soon her roses will be covered with dark green foliage once more. Few trees in town are any more healthy than those in the Thigpen yard






