at 1-27 and Georgia in Amarillo. The 12,546 square foot facility is unique both in its purpose and functionality. Nothing like this remarkable facility exits in Texas. The purpose of the Education Center is to honor, to educate, and to inform.


The proposed facility is not a museum, but an education center intended to tell the stories of the individuals from the 26 counties in the Texas Panhandle who have died to protect our freedom. This state-of-the-art center will bring 240 years' worth of history on American conflict to the fingertips of visitors through digital archives and video interviews with veterans from the Texas Panhandle. All information is true and accurate, explained Lemert. It will all be factual, even if it's not politically correct. The group explained that the first floor of the Education Center will take visitors on an interactive and chronological journey through each conflict in which the US military has fought. The second floor will honor our local heroes and tell their personal stories in an engaging environment. Visitors will be able to search digital archives by the name of a veteran to find their story. The personalized experience is intended bring the effects of war into focus and provide a lasting understanding of how our

communities have been impacted by each US conflict.

Children from all over the Panhandle will be able to visit the Education Center, but the impact of the facility will reach even beyond our 26 counties. Lemert and Boyd explained that approximately 60 tour buses stop in Amarillo to visit the existing War Memorial, and this is expected to increase with the Education Center.

This \$8.5 million project is currently in the fundraising stage. "We are a long way from breaking ground, but we are not going to stop until it's done," Brosier said. The group has traveled to numerous communities in the Panhandle to share their stories, explain what the Education Center will be, and to invite the communities to join in then in their efforts.



Ron Murphey, 68, of Texhoma passed away Tuesday, September 13, 2016 at the Oklahoma Heart Hospital in Oklahoma City.

The son of Lloyd and Marguerite Esther (Bivins) Murphey, Ronald Scott Murphey was born June 13, 1948 in Syracuse, Kansas. Ron was raised near Cunningham, Kansas where he attended Cunningham school system graduating with the Class of 1966.

Ron attended Pratt Community College before transferring to Oklahoma Panhandle State University in Goodwell, receiving his BS degree in HPER. He obtained his Masters degree in Educational Administration from Northwestern Oklahoma State University in Alva.

Ron and Vickie Luvell Ellison were married on May 29, 1970. She preceded him in death in July 1980. Ron and Diane Mathers were married on January 1, 1982. Wheat Producers advised to take advantage of existing soil nitrogen

COLLEGE STATION - As producers across the state are planting winter wheat, it is important they consider crediting soil nitrogen in their management plans, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialist. Dr. Jake Mowrer, AgriLife Extension state soil fertility specialist in College Station, said producers can save money in fertilizer costs by taking advantage of existing soil nitrogen and still make expected yield goals.

Each year producers must determine what and how much nitrogen they will use to fertilize their crop, Mowrer said. His study is determining how soil testing can help producers know how much nitrates their soil already contains so they can credit that to their overall needs.

He said a study in the Hill Country on the effect of reducing nitrogen fertilizer applications to wheat based on soil test nitrates at depths as great as 3 feet was the first of its kind on a cool-season crop.

Previous studies on warm-season crops such as corn, sorghum and cotton suggest nitrates may be credited to 24 inches without affecting yield, Mowrer said.

"We know that crediting nitrogen fertilizer could save an estimated \$23 per acre for cotton and \$31 per acre on corn and grain sorghum. But what about wheat - how does it respond to this program?"

Working with a producer in Itasca on a project funded through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Southern Sustainable Agriculture and Research Education, he said their goal was to produce 60-bushel per acre wheat. Soil samples were taken to 48 inches prior to planting in October-2015. The soil is Houston black clay.

Nitrogen from the soil was credited in different plots down to 36 inches. The wheat was harvested June 10. The full application of nitrogen performed the same as a credit to 6 inches and 12 inches, Mowrer said.

"Our results indicate that yield in wheat was not affected by crediting nitrate-

"But remember, we can't manage the rate unless we know what is in the soil to begin with," he said. "Voluntary soil testing isn't as widespread as we would like to see it. Soil testing is a really, really important part of managing our nutrients, particularly for nitrogen for grain production or 2 pounds per acre of nitrogen for grass.

"If there is some nitrogen in the soil, we can adjust that rate," he said. "But you don't know what is there unless you test it. We recommend you can credit what you find all the way down to 2 foot."

Another study he is working on is examining the different root systems to see if they make a difference in what nitrogen can be utilized, as well as determining if types of soils matter.

Following up on the results in the precious year's wheat study will be a top priority in the coming season, Mowrer said.

"Although topdressing with surface applications is the recommended procedure for wheat at jointing, there are new technologies for fertilizer delivery that may hold the potential for increased nitrogen-use efficiency over what we see today with stream bars and tips."



nitrogen in the soil profile to a depth of 12 inches," Mowrer said. "However, yields in this study were adversely affected when fertilizer was reduced by crediting nitrate deeper in the profile."

He said the reason for this may lie in the different efficiencies at which wheat takes up nitrogen already in the soil, as compared to nitrogen that is applied at the surface.

"At 24 and 36 inches, there was a range of 10-60 pounds of nitrogen," Mowrer said. "Surface application of a liquid fertilizer was less efficient than recovery of existing soil nitrate. This result will be explored more closely in the next growing season."

Mowrer said soil fertility is the most limiting factor in plant growth, right after water.

"We know the best you can do productionwise is determined by the amount of water. Nitrogen is the input needed for crops right behind water."

And, he said, the timing of any necessary fertilizer applications once the soil testing is done will affect the growth of wheat.

"We recommend putting out a third of the nitrogen upfront, and then right before jointing put out the other two-thirds," Mowrer said.

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



The clash of football giants Canadian and Stratford was everything it was hyped to be for the first quarter, but the Elks fell short in the remainder of the game for a 42-14 loss in the non-district game.

Quarterback Kade McBryde was 5 of 16 in passing for 119 yards and two touchdowns. A 73-yard pass reception by Daniel DeCasas accounted for the first Elk score in the first period while a fourth-quarter reception by Sergio Guerrero for six yards completed the Elks. scoring. On the ground, the Elks were limited to 77 yards with the longest run by Pedro Ortega for 10. Defensively, McBryde led with six tackles and 10 assists. Gage Brooks had a solo tackle and nine assists.

Brooks added two PATs for the Elks and also punted five times for a 38.40 yard average. Julio Duran was named the Special Teams player of the week while Carlos Gonzales was the Scout team player.




Stratford Elk #5Kade McBryde wraps up Canadian player in the Elks 14-42 loss to Canadian on Friday, September 16, 2016.







Voters who cannot obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID have additional options at the polls

AUSTIN – Today, Sherman County Clerk Gina Gray reminded Texans that voters who cannot obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID now have additional options when voting in person.

My office is working to make sure all the voters in Sherman County are ready to cast a ballot. These new options for voters who cannot obtain photo ID are currently in place and will be used in the November Election.

As provided by a court order, if a voter has a reasonable impediment to obtaining one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, the voter may vote by (1) signing a declaration at the polls explaining why the voter is unable to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, and (2) providing one of various forms of supporting documentation.

Supporting documentation can be a certified birth certificate (must be an original), a valid voter registration certificate, a copy or original of one of the following: current utility bill, bank statement, government check, or paycheck, or other government document that shows the voter's name and an address, although government documents which include a photo must be original and cannot be copies. If a voter meets these requirements and is otherwise eligible to vote, the voter will be able to cast a regular ballot in the election.

The seven forms of approved photo ID are:

- Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS
- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas license to carry a handgun issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States passport

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the approved photo ID must be current or have expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place.

Voters with a disability may continue to apply with the county registrar for a permanent exemption to showing approved photo ID (which now may be expired no more than four years) at the polls. Also, voters who (1) have a consistent religious objection to being photographed or (2) do not present one of the seven forms of approved photo ID because of certain natural disasters as declared by the President of the United States or the Texas Governor, may continue apply for a temporary exemption to showing approved photo ID at the polls.

Early voting for the November 8 Election begins October 24 and ends November 4.

The length of time for project completion is three years. The CIG projects are designed to engage EQIP-eligible producers in on-theground conservation activities such as demonstrations that will result in new technologies and approaches that can benefit similar producers regionally or nationally. CIG awards competitive grants to local and state units of governments, institutes of higher learning, non-governmental organizations, American Indian tribes and individuals.

CIG has an impressive track record of fostering innovative conservation tools and strategies. With funding from this announcement, USDA has invested \$173 million to fund 414 national CIG projects since 2009.




