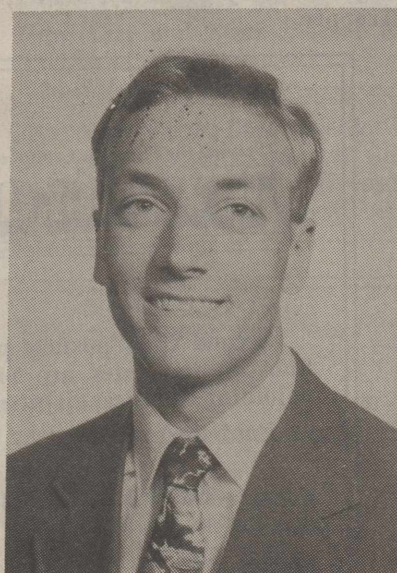
Guymon's Pioneer Day

Personnel Changes At Stratford Ambulance Service

Stratford Hospital District Board of Directors met in regular session, Thursday, April 9, 1992, at 7:00 p.m. at Coldwater Manor in Stratford, Texas. These officers and directors were present: Scott Buckles, President; Kathie Altman, Vice President; Jeanie Knight, Secretary-Treasurer; Elaine Gurley, Director and Duane Pittman, Director.

Candidates for Stratford Hospital District Board of Directors, Ricky Keener and Mary Lovett, were also present. President Scott Buckles performed introductions and gave a brief summary of Stratford Hospital District operations for their benefit.

Members of Stratford E.M.T. Association met with the Board of Directors to request clarification concerning personnel changes at Stratford Ambulance Service. Due to a shortage of personnel, Stratford Hospital District Board of Directors was asked to secure additional ambulance staff. In response to this request, Leland Lewis has been hired, on a temporary basis, as paramedic consultant. His duties will include bookkeeping for Stratford Ambulance Service.

The Board of Directors recently voted to increase compensation paid to volunteer ambulance staff. These rates are currently in effect: E.M.T.'s Local \$10 Dumas and Guymon \$20 and Amarillo \$40. Special Skills Local 13, Dumas and Guymon 26 and Amarillo 52. Paramedic Local 16, Dumas and Guymon 32 and Amarillo 64.

The rate increase was granted due to child-care expense, loss of wages, etc. during runs.

Monthly bills for Stratford Ambulance Service, Coldwater Manor, and Stratford Hospital District were presented and approved for payment. A transfer of funds from Stratford Hospital District to Stratford Ambulance Service, in the amount of \$4,850.00, was approved to cover those monthly bills. It was not necessary to transfer funds to Coldwater Manor.

It was reported that there are \$23,413.00 outstanding accounts receivable on the books for Stratford Ambulance Service. A collection agency is hired to help collect delinquent accounts. A 10% discount is available to people who pay their ambulance bills within 10 days of billing.

Coldwater Manor's new administrator, Dennis Robertson, stated he was glad to be here. He reported an increase in residents at Coldwater Manor from 31 to 35. Dennis presented a comprehensive review of monthly financial reports. Coldwater Manor had received an excellent report from Texas Department of Human Service's recent audit of patient trust funds and Medicaid vendor funds.

New wallpaper will be hung in the dining room at Coldwater Manor. Local tradespeople will be

contacted for bids. The greenhouse is being cleaned and refurbished in preparation for residents to raise flowers and vegetables.

Specifications are being drawn up for heating and air conditioning system that must be replaced at Coldwater Manor. Advertisements for bids will be published in the near future.

The Board of Directors approved requests from Shelene Turner, LVN, and Rena Cathey, LVN, for assistance to pursue R.N. degrees. In lieu of repayment of funds, they will sign an agreement to continue employment at Coldwater Manor for at least one year after certification. This program was instituted by Stratford Hospital District and Coldwater Manor in order to employ the best possible qualified nursing staff at Coldwater Manor and to meet increased OBRA Requirements.

Dr. Scott Crockett plans to begin his practice at Stratford Clinic July 6, 1992. The clinic has been purchased from Dr. Harlow by Stratford Hospital District, and will be leased to Dr. Crockett.

Some of Heathers accomplishments have been named to Who's Who Among American High School Students, Gifted and talented program, Who's Who in Math, Scholastic Banquet. Competed in Jets and UIL Contests. Member of the Stratford High school Band, 4-H.

NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST & STATEMENT OF INTENT

Notice is hereby given that Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective July 15, 1992, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by laws. The Utility has not had a general rate increase since 1979. Based upon a test year ending September 31, 1991, the increase requested over actual test year revenues is \$297,500 or 4.9%.

The changes are applicable to all areas, all customer classes, and all customers served by the Utility.

The Utility proposes to change all rates for residential, irrigation, small commercial, large commercial, including demand, energy, minimum and other charges. The proposed changes are expected to affect the classes as follows: for the 1,912 customers in the farm and home class, the proposed increase will be \$97,247 or a 8.37% change in revenues; for the 168 customers in the Texline residential class the proposed increase will be \$6,689 or a 8.61% change in revenues; for the 188

customers in the fence charger class, the proposed increase will be \$2,981 or a 15.4% change in revenues; for the 783 customers in the small commercial class, the proposed increase will be \$27,638 or a 3.17% change in revenues; for the 1,169 customers in the small irrigation class, the proposed increase will be \$55,693 or a 9.75% change in revenues; for the 164 customers in the large power class, the proposed increase will be \$66,602 or a 3.13% change in revenues; for the 103 customers in the large irrigation class, the proposed increase will be \$37,260 or a 3.10% change in revenues; for the 614 customers in the lighting class, the proposed increase will be \$3,390 or a 8.91% change in revenues.

The Utility also intends to change its service rules and regulations, including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Information concerning the proposed rate changes, including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules is available at the General Office of the Utility, located at Highway 87 North Dalhart, Texas. Inquiries should be directed to Mr. Bob Elliott, general manager.

The Utility is required to give notice of the percentage increase in base revenues which is 12.22%. The Percentage increase in base revenues is not an indication of how much your bill will increase. Rather, it is a measure of the increase needed by the Utility for its own operations, excluding payment of the cost of power purchased by the Utility from its wholesale power suppliers.

On or about May 15, 1992, the Utility will file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, a Statement of Intent to Change Rates, specifying in detail each proposed change. Requests to intervene must be filed no later than 45 days after the application filing date; Thus, the Utility anticipates the deadline for intervening and objecting to the rate changes will be June 29, 1992. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 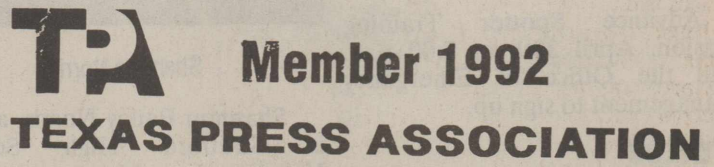

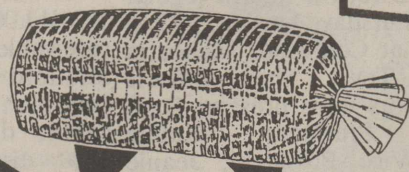
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Scot Notes

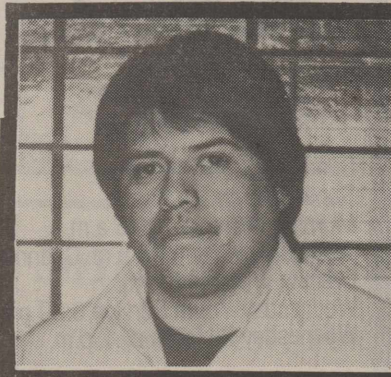

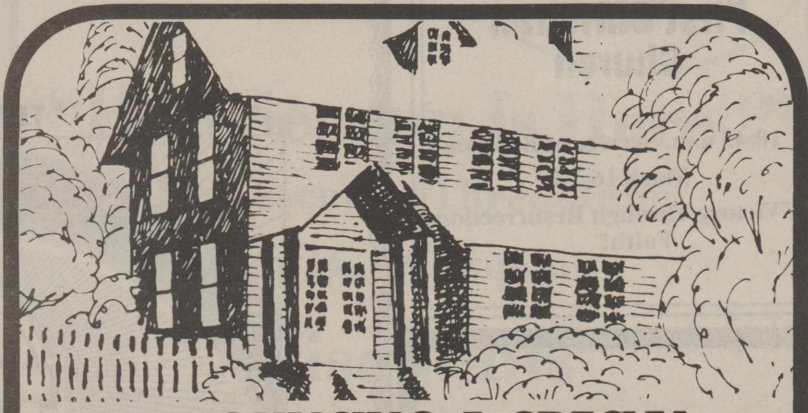

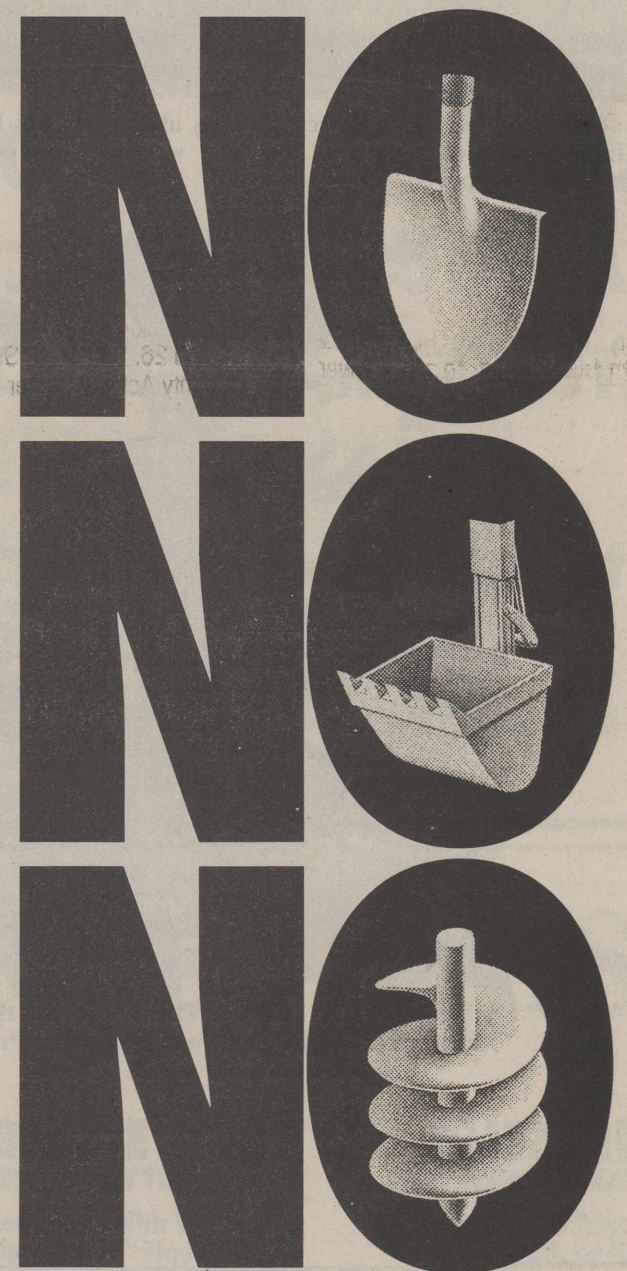
